Synonyms of "Admiration" as a noun (23 Words)

acclaim

Enthusiastic approval.
*The book met with modest **acclaim**.*

adulation

Servile flattery; exaggerated and hypocritical praise.
*He found it difficult to cope with the **adulation** of the fans.*

applause

A demonstration of approval by clapping the hands together.
*They gave him a round of **applause**.*

appreciation

An increase in price or value.
*A full **appreciation** of the professor's life and work will be published in the Scotsman tomorrow.*

approbation

Approval or praise.
*A term of **approbation**.*

approval

Acceptance as satisfactory.
*The road schemes have been given **approval**.*

commendation	A very good result in an examination or competition. <i>The book gives commendations for initiative.</i>
delight	Something or someone that provides a source of happiness. <i>We broke into an impromptu dance to the delight of the crowd.</i>
esteem	The condition of being honored esteemed or respected or well regarded. <i>It is held in esteem.</i>
extolment	An expression of approval and commendation.
high regard	A public secondary school usually including grades 9 through 12.
joy	A thing that causes joy. <i>You ll get no joy out of her.</i>
<u>marvel</u>	Something that causes feelings of wonder. <i>The marvels of technology.</i>
object of admiration	A constituent that is acted upon.
praise	An expression of approval and commendation. <i>They sang a hymn of praise to God.</i>
<u>pride</u>	A group of lions forming a social unit. <i>The worst sin in a ruler was pride.</i>
pride and joy	A group of lions.
regard	The condition of being honored esteemed or respected or well regarded. <i>They hold dolphins in high regard.</i>
respect	The condition of being honored esteemed or respected or well regarded. <i>Out of respect for his privacy.</i>
<u>sensation</u>	The capacity to have physical sensations. <i>Anticipation produced in me a sensation somewhere between hope and fear.</i>
veneration	Great respect; reverence. <i>His respect for the law bordered on veneration.</i>
wonder	A thing or a quality of something that causes wonder. <i>We all eat cakes from Gisella she s a wonder.</i>
wonderment	The feeling aroused by something strange and surprising. <i>Corbett shook his head in silent wonderment.</i>



Usage Examples of "Admiration" as a noun

- *I have the greatest admiration for all those involved in the project.*
- *They were lost in admiration of the scenery.*
- *A small token in admiration of your works.*
- *Her house was the admiration of everyone.*



Associations of "Admiration" (30 Words)

admire	Look at (something impressive or attractive) with pleasure. <i>I admire your courage.</i>
admired	Regarded with admiration.
<u>adoration</u>	The act of admiring strongly. <i>It was enough to earn him the adoration of the fans.</i>
<u>adore</u>	Worship; venerate. <i>He just adored his wife.</i>
adored	Regarded with deep or rapturous love (especially as if for a god). <i>Adored grandchildren.</i>
appreciate	Recognize with gratitude; be grateful for. <i>I appreciate that you cannot be held totally responsible.</i>
appreciation	Gratitude. <i>The bank s lack of appreciation of their problems.</i>
<u>awe</u>	Inspire with awe. <i>The famous professor awed the undergraduates.</i>

canonize	Treat as a sacred person. <i>After he was shown to have performed a miracle the priest was canonized.</i>
compliance	The act of submitting; usually surrendering power to another. <i>All imports of timber are in compliance with regulations.</i>
deference	Courteous regard for people's feelings. <i>He addressed her with the deference due to age.</i>
esteem	The condition of being honored esteemed or respected or well regarded. <i>It is held in esteem.</i>
glowing	Highly enthusiastic. <i>Glowing praise.</i>
homage	Respectful deference. <i>Daniel s films were a homage to her.</i>
honor	Bestow honor or rewards upon. <i>We honor checks and drafts.</i>
idolatry	The worship of idols; the worship of physical objects or images as gods. <i>We must not allow our idolatry of art to obscure issues of political significance.</i>
idolize	Love unquestioningly and uncritically or to excess; venerate as an idol. <i>He idolized his mother.</i>
inviolate	(of a woman) having the hymen unbroken. <i>An international memorial which must remain inviolate.</i>
obedience	The act of obeying; dutiful or submissive behavior with respect to another person. <i>Vows of poverty chastity and obedience.</i>
obeisance	Deferential respect. <i>They paid obeisance to the Prince.</i>
obey	Behave in accordance with (a general principle, natural law, etc). <i>The universe was complex but it obeyed certain rules.</i>
rector	(in the Church of England) the incumbent of a parish where all tithes formerly passed to the incumbent.
respect	The state of being admired or respected. <i>She was respected by everyone she worked with.</i>
respectful	Feeling or manifesting veneration. <i>Respectful behavior.</i>
revere	Regard with feelings of respect and reverence consider hallowed or exalted or be in awe of. <i>C zanne s still lifes were revered by his contemporaries.</i>

- reverence** Regard with feelings of respect and reverence consider hallowed or exalted or be in awe of.
*Rituals showed honour and **reverence** for the dead.*
- venerate** Regard with great respect; revere.
*We **venerate** genius.*
- veneration** Religious zeal; the willingness to serve God.
*His respect for the law bordered on **veneration**.*
- wonder** Something that causes feelings of wonder.
*Athens was a place of **wonder** and beauty.*
- worship** The activity of worshipping.
*The family **worshipped** at Trinity Church.*
