According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “admiration” as a noun can have the following definitions:

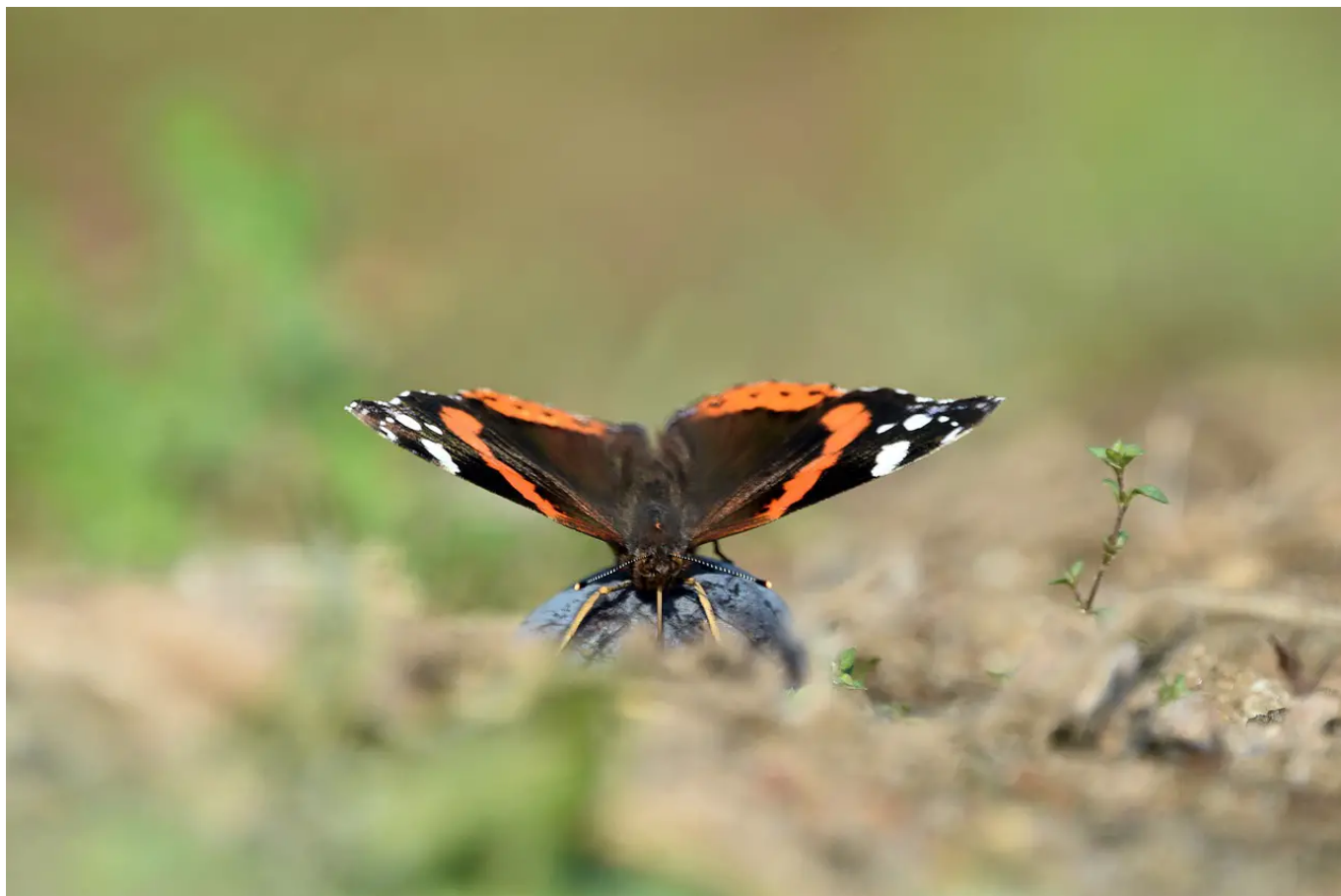
- *Something regarded as impressive or worthy of respect.*

## Synonyms of "Admiration" as a noun (23 Words)

<b><u>acclaim</u></b>	Enthusiastic approval. <i>The book met with modest <b>acclaim</b>.</i>
<b>adulation</b>	Servile flattery; exaggerated and hypocritical praise. <i>He found it difficult to cope with the <b>adulation</b> of the fans.</i>
<b>applause</b>	A demonstration of approval by clapping the hands together. <i>They gave him a round of <b>applause</b>.</i>
<b>appreciation</b>	An increase in price or value. <i>A full <b>appreciation</b> of the professor's life and work will be published in the Scotsman tomorrow.</i>
<b><u>approbation</u></b>	Approval or praise. <i>A term of <b>approbation</b>.</i>
<b>approval</b>	Acceptance as satisfactory. <i>The road schemes have been given <b>approval</b>.</i>

<b>commendation</b>	A very good result in an examination or competition. <i>The book gives <b>commendations</b> for initiative.</i>
<b>delight</b>	Something or someone that provides a source of happiness. <i>We broke into an impromptu dance to the <b>delight</b> of the crowd.</i>
<b>esteem</b>	The condition of being honored esteemed or respected or well regarded. <i>It is held in <b>esteem</b>.</i>
<b>extolment</b>	An expression of approval and commendation.
<b>high regard</b>	A public secondary school usually including grades 9 through 12.
<b>joy</b>	A thing that causes joy. <i>You ll get no <b>joy</b> out of her.</i>
<b><u>marvel</u></b>	Something that causes feelings of wonder. <i>The <b>marvels</b> of technology.</i>
<b>object of admiration</b>	A constituent that is acted upon.
<b>praise</b>	An expression of approval and commendation. <i>They sang a hymn of <b>praise</b> to God.</i>
<b><u>pride</u></b>	A group of lions forming a social unit. <i>The worst sin in a ruler was <b>pride</b>.</i>
<b>pride and joy</b>	A group of lions.
<b>regard</b>	The condition of being honored esteemed or respected or well regarded. <i>They hold dolphins in high <b>regard</b>.</i>
<b>respect</b>	The condition of being honored esteemed or respected or well regarded. <i>Out of <b>respect</b> for his privacy.</i>
<b><u>sensation</u></b>	The capacity to have physical sensations. <i>Anticipation produced in me a <b>sensation</b> somewhere between hope and fear.</i>
<b>veneration</b>	Great respect; reverence. <i>His respect for the law bordered on <b>veneration</b>.</i>
<b>wonder</b>	A thing or a quality of something that causes wonder. <i>We all eat cakes from Gisella she s a <b>wonder</b>.</i>
<b>wonderment</b>	The feeling aroused by something strange and surprising. <i>Corbett shook his head in silent <b>wonderment</b>.</i>

## Associations of "Admiration" (30 Words)

<b>admire</b>	Look at (something impressive or attractive) with pleasure. <i>I <b>admire</b> your courage.</i>
<b>admired</b>	Regarded with admiration.
<b><u>adoration</u></b>	The act of admiring strongly. <i>It was enough to earn him the <b>adoration</b> of the fans.</i>
<b><u>adore</u></b>	Worship; venerate. <i>He just <b>adored</b> his wife.</i>
<b>adored</b>	Regarded with deep or rapturous love (especially as if for a god). <i><b>Adored</b> grandchildren.</i>
<b>appreciate</b>	Recognize with gratitude; be grateful for. <i>I <b>appreciate</b> that you cannot be held totally responsible.</i>
<b>appreciation</b>	Gratitude. <i>The bank's lack of <b>appreciation</b> of their problems.</i>
<b><u>awe</u></b>	Inspire with awe. <i>The famous professor <b>awed</b> the undergraduates.</i>

<b>canonize</b>	Treat as a sacred person. <i>After he was shown to have performed a miracle the priest was <b>canonized</b>.</i>
<b>compliance</b>	The act of submitting; usually surrendering power to another. <i>All imports of timber are in <b>compliance</b> with regulations.</i>
<u>deference</u>	Courteous regard for people's feelings. <i>He addressed her with the <b>deference</b> due to age.</i>
<b>esteem</b>	The condition of being honored esteemed or respected or well regarded. <i>It is held in <b>esteem</b>.</i>
<u>glowing</u>	Highly enthusiastic. <i><b>Glowing</b> praise.</i>
<u>homage</u>	Respectful deference. <i>Daniel s films were a <b>homage</b> to her.</i>
<b>honor</b>	Bestow honor or rewards upon. <i>We <b>honor</b> checks and drafts.</i>
<b>idolatry</b>	The worship of idols; the worship of physical objects or images as gods. <i>We must not allow our <b>idolatry</b> of art to obscure issues of political significance.</i>
<u>idolize</u>	Love unquestioningly and uncritically or to excess; venerate as an idol. <i>He <b>idolized</b> his mother.</i>
<b>inviolate</b>	(of a woman) having the hymen unbroken. <i>An international memorial which must remain <b>inviolate</b>.</i>
<u>obedience</u>	The act of obeying; dutiful or submissive behavior with respect to another person. <i>Vows of poverty chastity and <b>obedience</b>.</i>
<b>obeisance</b>	Deferential respect. <i>They paid <b>obeisance</b> to the Prince.</i>
<u>obey</u>	Behave in accordance with (a general principle, natural law, etc). <i>The universe was complex but it <b>obeyed</b> certain rules.</i>
<b>rector</b>	(in the Church of England) the incumbent of a parish where all tithes formerly passed to the incumbent.
<b>respect</b>	The state of being admired or respected. <i>She was <b>respected</b> by everyone she worked with.</i>
<b>respectful</b>	Feeling or manifesting veneration. <i><b>Respectful</b> behavior.</i>
<b>revere</b>	Regard with feelings of respect and reverence consider hallowed or exalted or be in awe of. <i>C zanne s still lifes were <b>revered</b> by his contemporaries.</i>

<b>reverence</b>	Regard with feelings of respect and reverence consider hallowed or exalted or be in awe of. <i>Rituals showed honour and <b>reverence</b> for the dead.</i>
<u><a href="#">venerate</a></u>	Regard with great respect; revere. <i>We <b>venerate</b> genius.</i>
<b>veneration</b>	Religious zeal; the willingness to serve God. <i>His respect for the law bordered on <b>veneration</b>.</i>
<b>wonder</b>	Something that causes feelings of wonder. <i>Athens was a place of <b>wonder</b> and beauty.</i>
<u><a href="#">worship</a></u>	The activity of worshipping. <i>The family <b>worshipped</b> at Trinity Church.</i>
