- *Acceptable or valid, especially as evidence in a court of law.*



## Synonyms of "Admissible" as an adjective (14 Words)

- acceptable** Meeting requirements.  
*The water was **acceptable** for drinking.*
- allowable** Deserving to be allowed or considered.  
*Tax is payable after deduction of **allowable** expenses.*
- defensible** Justifiable by argument.  
*A fort with a **defensible** yard at its feet.*
- justifiable** Capable of being justified.  
*Their **justifiable** fears.*
- passable** (of a route or road) clear of obstacles and able to be travelled on.  
*The road is **passable**.*
- permissible** That may be permitted especially as according to rule.  
***Permissible** behavior in school.*
- reasonable** As much as is appropriate or fair; moderate.  
*It seems a **reasonable** enough request.*

- satisfactory** (of evidence or a verdict) sufficient for the needs of the case.  
*His grades were **satisfactory**.*
- sensible** Showing reason or sound judgment.  
*Even amoeba are **sensible** creatures.*
- sound** In excellent physical condition.  
*The wall is **sound**.*
- supportable** Capable of being borne though unpleasant.
- tenable** Able to be maintained or defended against attack or objection.  
*Such a simplistic approach is no longer **tenable**.*
- tolerable** Capable of being borne or endured.  
*A stimulant to make life more **tolerable**.*
- well founded** Resulting favorably.



## Usage Examples of "Admissible" as an adjective

- *The tape recording was admissible as evidence.*
- *Foreigners were admissible only as temporary workers.*
- *Admissible evidence.*

<b>acceptable</b>	Moderately good; satisfactory. <i>Pollution in the city had reached four times the <b>acceptable</b> level.</i>
<b>accepting</b>	Tolerating without protest. <i>Always more <b>accepting</b> of coaching suggestion than her teammates.</i>
<b>admittedly</b>	Used to express a concession or recognition that something is the case. <i><b>Admittedly</b> the salary was not wonderful.</i>

<b>agree</b>	Reach agreement about something after negotiation. <i>She s eaten something that didn t <b>agree</b> with her.</i>
<b>agreed</b>	Discussed or negotiated and then accepted by all parties. <i>The <b>agreed</b> date.</i>
<b>allow</b>	Allow or plan for a certain possibility concede the truth or validity of something. <i>I <b>allow</b> for this possibility.</i>
<b>allowable</b>	(of an amount of money) able to be earned or received free of tax. <i>Tax is payable after deduction of <b>allowable</b> expenses.</i>
<b>approbation</b>	Approval or praise. <i>A term of <b>approbation</b>.</i>
<b>approval</b>	A feeling of liking something or someone good. <i>They have delayed the launch to await project <b>approvals</b>.</i>
<b>approve</b>	Judge to be right or commendable; think well of. <i>I don t <b>approve</b> of romance.</i>
<b>authorization</b>	The power or right to give orders or make decisions. <i>The raising of revenue and the <b>authorization</b> of spending.</i>
<b>concede</b>	Be willing to concede. <i>He took an early lead which he never <b>conceded</b>.</i>
<b>concession</b>	The right, given by a company, to sell goods, especially in a particular place. <i>There are <b>concessions</b> on party bookings.</i>
<b>concurrence</b>	Agreement or consistency. <i>The number of possible <b>concurrences</b> in the diagram.</i>
<b>endorsement</b>	The action of endorsing someone or something. <i>A star athlete can make a lot of money from <b>endorsements</b>.</i>
<b>let</b>	A property available for rent. <i>This <b>let</b> me in for a big surprise.</i>
<b>license</b>	Grant a licence to. <i>A pub has to be <b>licensed</b> by the local justices.</i>
<b>morally</b>	In a way that is considered right according to the code of behaviour of a particular society. <i>Murder is <b>morally</b> wrong.</i>
<b>ok</b>	A state in south central United States. <i>Things are <b>okay</b>.</i>
<b>okay</b>	An endorsement. <i>She ll do <b>okay</b> on her own.</i>

<b>permissible</b>	Permitted; allowed. <i>It is <b>permissible</b> to edit and rephrase the statement.</i>
<b>permission</b>	An official document giving authorization. <i>He asked <b>permission</b> to leave.</i>
<b>permit</b>	Large game fish; found in waters of the West Indies. <i>He would not <b>permit</b> anybody access to the library.</i>
<b>ratification</b>	The action of signing or giving formal consent to a treaty, contract, or agreement, making it officially valid. <i><b>Ratification</b> of the treaty raised problems in several member states.</i>
<b>ratify</b>	Approve and express assent, responsibility, or obligation. <i>Both countries were due to <b>ratify</b> the treaty by the end of the year.</i>
<b>sanction</b>	Give sanction to. <i>The scheme was <b>sanctioned</b> by the court.</i>
<b>tolerable</b>	About average; acceptable. <i>The climate is at least <b>tolerable</b>.</i>
<b>unobjectionable</b>	Not causing disapproval. <i><b>Unobjectionable</b> behavior.</i>
<b>yes</b>	An affirmative. <i>Answering with assured and ardent <b>yeses</b>.</i>
