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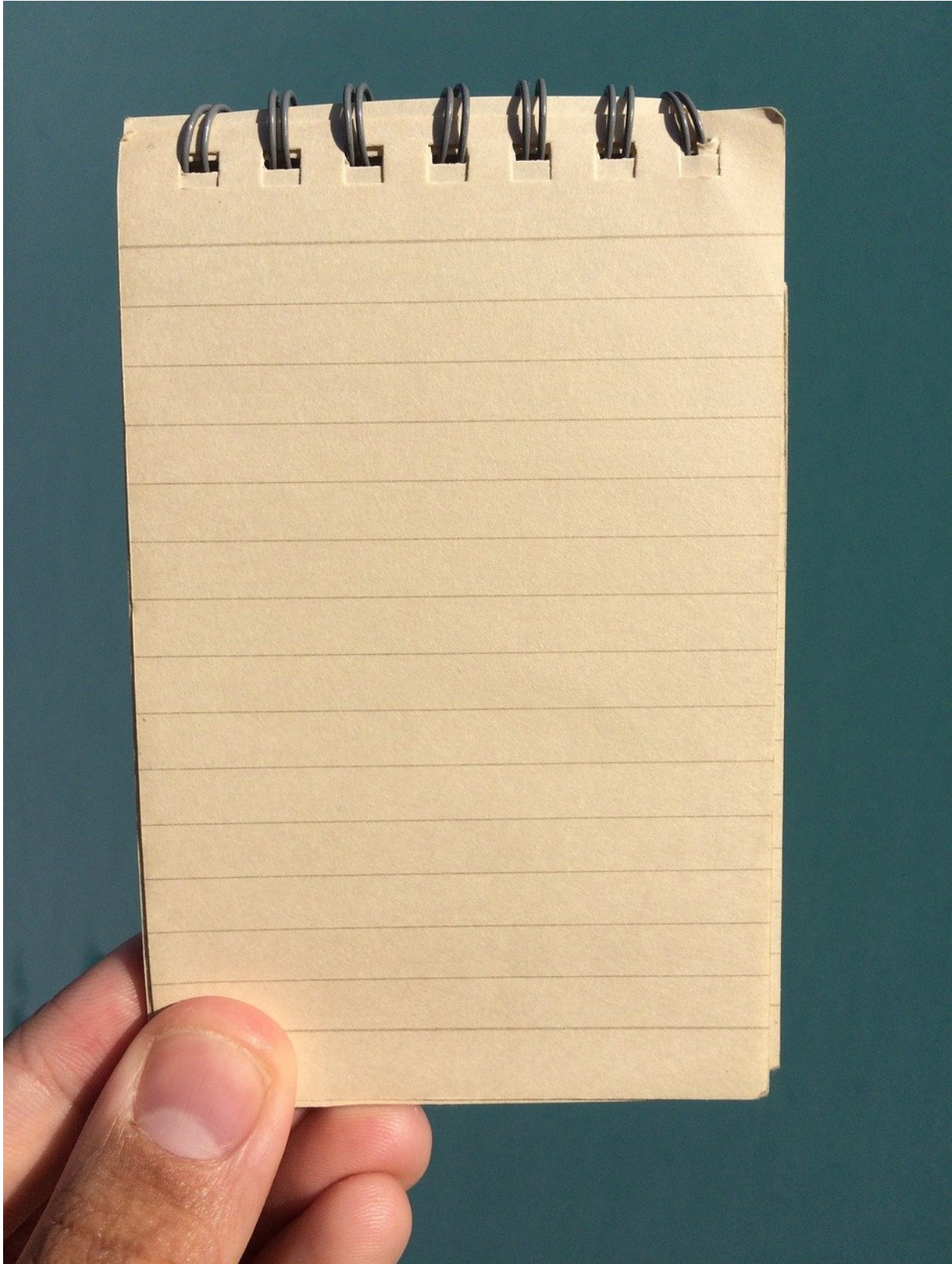

<b>avowal</b>	A statement asserting the existence or the truth of something.
<b>claim</b>	A demand or request for something considered one's due. <i>A strong legal <b>claim</b> to the property.</i>
<b>concession</b>	A point conceded or yielded. <i>They won all the <b>concessions</b> they asked for.</i>
<b><u>confession</u></b>	The religious body or Church sharing a confession of faith. <i>He signed a <b>confession</b> to both the murders.</i>
<b><u>declaration</u></b>	A written public announcement of intentions or of the terms of an agreement. <i>A <b>declaration</b> of independence.</i>
<b><u>disclosure</u></b>	The action of making new or secret information known. <i>A judge ordered the <b>disclosure</b> of the government documents.</i>
<b>divulgence</b>	The action of revealing private or sensitive information. <i>Any <b>divulgence</b> of information about undercover activities could jeopardize police operations.</i>
<b><u>entrance</u></b>	An act or instance of entering somewhere. <i>At their abrupt <b>entrance</b> he rose to his feet.</i>
<b>entrance fee</b>	Something that provides access (to get in or get out).
<b>entrance money</b>	A movement into or inward.
<b>entree</b>	Something that provides access (to get in or get out). <i>She made a graceful <b>entree</b> into the ballroom.</i>

<b>entry</b>	The action of taking up the legal right to property. <i>Sophisticated features to help ensure accurate data <b>entry</b>.</i>
<b>entry charge</b>	The act of entering.
<b>entrée</b>	The right to enter.
<b>expression</b>	Expression without words. <i>Pardon the <b>expression</b>.</i>
<b>ingress</b>	The act of entering.
<b>means of entry</b>	An instrumentality for accomplishing some end.
<b>permission to enter</b>	The act of giving a formal (usually written) authorization.
<b>price of admission</b>	The property of having material worth (often indicated by the amount of money something would bring if sold).
<b><u>profession</u></b>	A body of people engaged in a particular profession. <i>They were baptized on <b>profession</b> of faith.</i>
<b>recognition</b>	Coming to understand something clearly and distinctly. <i>The partners were delighted with the <b>recognition</b> of their work.</i>
<b><u>revelation</u></b>	The last book of the New Testament recounting a divine revelation of the future to St John. <i>The <b>revelation</b> of a plot to assassinate the king.</i>
<b>right of entry</b>	The hand that is on the right side of the body.
<b><u>ticket</u></b>	A summons issued to an offender (especially to someone who violates a traffic regulation). <i>He stood for office on a strong right wing no nonsense <b>ticket</b>.</i>

<b>abdicate</b>	(of a monarch) renounce one's throne. <i>In 1918 Kaiser Wilhelm <b>abdicated</b> as German emperor.</i>
<b><u>accede</u></b>	Agree to a demand, request, or treaty. <i>Albania <b>acceded</b> to the IMF in 1990.</i>
<b>accept</b>	Make use of or accept for some purpose. <i>The college <b>accepted</b> her as a student.</i>
<b><u>access</u></b>	Reach or gain access to. <i>How does one <b>access</b> the attic in this house.</i>
<b>accessibility</b>	The attribute of being easy to meet or deal with. <i>The restoration project involved repairing the roof and improving <b>accessibility</b>.</i>
<b><u>accessible</u></b>	Able to be reached, entered, or used by people who have a disability. <i>Most students now have computers <b>accessible</b>.</i>
<b><u>accession</u></b>	Make a record of additions to a collection, such as a library. <i>Each book must be <b>accessioned</b> and the data entered into the computer.</i>
<b>acquire</b>	Come to have (a particular reputation) as a result of one's behaviour or activities. <i>I <b>acquired</b> a strong aversion to television.</i>
<b>admittance</b>	The act of admitting someone to enter. <i>People were unable to gain <b>admittance</b> to the hall.</i>
<b>apply</b>	Apply oneself to. <i>The oil industry has failed to <b>apply</b> appropriate standards of care.</i>
<b>approval</b>	A feeling of liking something or someone good. <i>His decision merited the <b>approval</b> of any sensible person.</i>
<b>choose</b>	Pick out select or choose from a number of alternatives. <i>There are many versions to <b>choose</b> from.</i>
<b>enthrone</b>	Provide with power and authority. <i>The Queen was <b>enthroned</b> more than 50 years ago.</i>
<b>entree</b>	The act of entering. <i>She made a graceful <b>entree</b> into the ballroom.</i>
<b>entry</b>	A passage between buildings. <i><b>Entry</b> is open to people of all ages.</i>
<b>fee</b>	An interest in land capable of being inherited. <i>They were faced with legal <b>fees</b> of 3000.</i>

<b>get</b>	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>What kind of reception did you <b>get</b>.</i>
<b>in</b>	Of the tide rising or at its highest level. <i>We knocked at the door but there was no one <b>in</b>.</i>
<b>matriculation</b>	(in South Africa) a school-leaving examination taken at the end of the twelfth year. <i><b>Matriculation</b> requirements.</i>
<b>obtain</b>	Get, acquire, or secure (something). <i>Adequate insurance cover is difficult to <b>obtain</b>.</i>
<b>papacy</b>	The government of the Roman Catholic Church. <i>During the <b>papacy</b> of Pope John.</i>
<b><u>pick</u></b>	Attack with or as if with a pickaxe of ice or rocky ground for example. <i>She finally <b>picked</b> her successor.</i>
<b>preferential</b>	(of voting or an election) in which the voter puts candidates in order of preference. <i><b>Preferential</b> tariff rates.</i>
<b>preferment</b>	The act of making accusations. <i>The <b>preferment</b> went to the younger candidate.</i>
<b><u>proclamation</u></b>	The formal act of proclaiming; giving public notice. <i>The issuing by the monarch of a <b>proclamation</b> dissolving Parliament.</i>
<b><u>receptive</u></b>	Willing to consider or accept new suggestions and ideas. <i>The paper is ink <b>receptive</b>.</i>
<b>resignedly</b>	In a hopeless resigned manner.
<b><u>selective</u></b>	Tending to select; characterized by careful choice. <i>A new marine VHF radio with digital <b>selective</b> calling.</i>
<b>singly</b>	One at a time; separately or individually. <i>He talked to the players <b>singly</b> and in groups.</i>
<b><u>throne</u></b>	Put a monarch on the throne. <i>The heir to the <b>throne</b>.</i>
