<b>materialization</b>	Something that comes into existence as a result. <i>The <b>materialization</b> of her dream.</i>
<b><u>occurrence</u></b>	An incident or event. <i>A disease of frequent <b>occurrence</b>.</i>
<b><u>origin</u></b>	A fixed point from which coordinates are measured. <i><b>Origin</b> in sensation.</i>
<b>parousia</b>	The reappearance of Jesus as judge for the Last Judgment.
<b>rise</b>	The property possessed by a slope or surface that rises. <i>The bird has a display flight of steep flapping <b>rises</b>.</i>
<b>second advent</b>	A 60th part of a minute of arc.
<b>second coming</b>	A speech seconding a motion.
<b>second coming of christ</b>	A particular point in time.
<b>surfacing</b>	Emerging to the surface and becoming apparent.

<b>early</b>	Of an early stage in the development of a language or literature. <i><b>Early</b> varieties of peas and tomatoes mature before most standard varieties.</i>
<b>emergence</b>	The becoming visible. <i>Not a day's difference between the <b>emergence</b> of the andrenas and the opening of the willow catkins.</i>
<b>first</b>	The fielding position of the player on a baseball team who is stationed at first of the bases in the infield counting counterclockwise from home plate. <i>The <b>first</b> phase of his training.</i>
<b>forthcoming</b>	Of the relatively near future. <i>Federal funds were not <b>forthcoming</b>.</i>
<b>genesis</b>	The origin or mode of formation of something. <i>This tale had its <b>genesis</b> in fireside stories.</i>
<b>germinal</b>	Providing material for future development. <i>A <b>germinal</b> idea.</i>
<b>introduction</b>	The act of starting something for the first time; introducing something new. <i>A letter of <b>introduction</b>.</i>
<b>introductory</b>	Serving as an introduction to a subject or topic; basic or preliminary. <i>We are making a special <b>introductory</b> offer of a reduced subscription.</i>
<b>oncoming</b>	The beginning or early stages. <i>She walked into the path of an <b>oncoming</b> car.</i>
<b>onset</b>	A military attack. <i>The <b>onset</b> of pneumonia.</i>
<b>originate</b>	Come into existence; take on form or shape. <i>The flight <b>originates</b> in Calcutta.</i>
<b>preamble</b>	A preliminary introduction to a statute or constitution (usually explaining its purpose). <i>He could tell that what she said was by way of a <b>preamble</b>.</i>
<b>preface</b>	Provide a book with a preface. <i>It is important to <b>preface</b> the debate with a general comment.</i>
<b>preliminary</b>	A preliminary round in a sporting competition. <i>A <b>preliminary</b> draft.</i>

<b>preparatory</b>	Serving as or carrying out preparation for a task or undertaking. <i><b>Preparatory</b> steps.</i>
<b>prologue</b>	The actor who delivers the prologue in a play. <i>I got third in the <b>prologue</b> and eighth on the hardest stage.</i>
<b>rise</b>	The property possessed by a slope or surface that rises. <i><b>Rise</b> to the occasion.</i>
<b><u>shortly</u></b>	In a short time; soon. <i>The new database will <b>shortly</b> be available for consultation.</i>
<b><u>soon</u></b>	In the near future. <i>I d just as <b>soon</b> Tim did it.</i>
<b>start</b>	The act of starting something. <i>It was off to a good <b>start</b>.</i>
<b>starting</b>	(especially of eyes) bulging or protruding as with fear. <i>With eyes <b>starting</b> from their sockets.</i>
<b><u>thereafter</u></b>	After that time. <i>It was agreed that the meeting be held annually <b>thereafter</b>.</i>
<b>upcoming</b>	About to happen; forthcoming. <i>The <b>upcoming</b> election.</i>
