Associations of "Adversely" (30 Words)

affected	Being excited or provoked to the expression of an emotion. <i>Affected areas.</i>
antithesis	A person or thing that is the direct opposite of someone or something else. <i>Figures of speech such as antithesis.</i>
antithetic	Sharply contrasted in character or purpose. <i>Hope is antithetic to despair.</i>
antithetical	Directly opposed or contrasted; mutually incompatible. <i>Practices entirely antithetical to her professed beliefs.</i>
challenger	The contestant you hope to defeat. <i>The leading team among the nine challengers.</i>
competitor	An organization or country engaged in commercial or economic competition with others. <i>Two competitors were banned for taking drugs.</i>
contradictory	A contradictory proposition. <i>Contradictory attributes of unjust justice and loving vindictiveness.</i>
controvert	Argue about (something). <i>Subsequent work from the same laboratory controverted these results.</i>
counteract	Oppose or check by a counteraction. <i>Should we deliberately intervene in the climate system to counteract global warming.</i>
counterpart	A person or thing that corresponds to or has the same function as another person or thing in a different place or situation. <i>The minister held talks with his French counterpart.</i>
disagree	Be different from one another. <i>The sea crossing disagreed with her.</i>
dissent	The act of protesting a public often organized manifestation of dissent. <i>He wasted no time in cranking out nine majority opinions as well as three dissents.</i>

dissenter	A person who dissents from some established policy.
<u>dissident</u>	Characterized by departure from accepted beliefs or standards. <i>A dissident who had been jailed by a military regime.</i>
<u>downturn</u>	A worsening of business or economic activity. <i>A downturn in the housing market.</i>
<u>enemy</u>	A personal enemy. <i>The enemy attacked at dawn.</i>
equivalent	A person or thing equal to another in value or measure or force or effect or significance etc. <i>One unit is equivalent to one glass of wine.</i>
<u>objection</u>	(law) a procedure whereby a party to a suit says that a particular line of questioning or a particular witness or a piece of evidence or other matter is improper and should not be continued and asks the court to rule on its impropriety or illegality. <i>They have raised no objections to the latest plans.</i>
objector	A person who expresses opposition to or disagreement with something. <i>Objectors claim the motorway will damage the environment.</i>
opponent	Someone who competes with or opposes another in a contest, game, or argument. <i>The news will delight opponents of GM foods.</i>
oppose	Actively resist (a person or system). <i>The senator said he would oppose the bill.</i>
opposed	Being in opposition or having an opponent. <i>The agency is being asked to do two diametrically opposed things.</i>
opposite	Of angles between opposite sides of the intersection of two lines. <i>A word that is opposite in meaning to another.</i>
<u>opposition</u>	The major political party opposed to the party in office and prepared to replace it if elected. <i>A nature culture opposition.</i>
reject	The person or thing that is rejected or set aside as inferior in quality. <i>Some of the team's rejects have gone on to prove themselves in championships.</i>
remonstrance	The act of expressing earnest opposition or protest. <i>Angry remonstrances in the Commons.</i>
reverse	The gears by which the motion of a machine can be reversed. <i>The lorry reversed into the back of a bus.</i>
rival	Be the rival of be in competition with. <i>She has no rivals as a female rock singer.</i>

- unseat** Remove (a government or person in authority) from power.
*The Republicans are trying to **unseat** the liberal Democrat.*
- vie** Compete for something; engage in a contest; measure oneself against others.
The athletes were vying for a place in the British team.
