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## Associations of "Adversely" (30 Words)

<b>affected</b>	Being excited or provoked to the expression of an emotion. <i><b>Affected</b> areas.</i>
<a href="#"><b>antithesis</b></a>	A person or thing that is the direct opposite of someone or something else. <i>Figures of speech such as <b>antithesis</b>.</i>
<b>antithetic</b>	Sharply contrasted in character or purpose. <i>Hope is <b>antithetic</b> to despair.</i>
<b>antithetical</b>	Directly opposed or contrasted; mutually incompatible. <i>Practices entirely <b>antithetical</b> to her professed beliefs.</i>
<b>challenger</b>	The contestant you hope to defeat. <i>The leading team among the nine <b>challengers</b>.</i>
<b>competitor</b>	An organization or country engaged in commercial or economic competition with others. <i>Two <b>competitors</b> were banned for taking drugs.</i>
<a href="#"><b>contradictory</b></a>	A contradictory proposition. <i><b>Contradictory</b> attributes of unjust justice and loving vindictiveness.</i>
<b>controvert</b>	Argue about (something). <i>Subsequent work from the same laboratory <b>controverted</b> these results.</i>
<b>counteract</b>	Oppose or check by a counteraction. <i>Should we deliberately intervene in the climate system to <b>counteract</b> global warming.</i>
<a href="#"><b>counterpart</b></a>	A person or thing that corresponds to or has the same function as another person or thing in a different place or situation. <i>The minister held talks with his French <b>counterpart</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><b>disagree</b></a>	Be different from one another. <i>The sea crossing <b>disagreed</b> with her.</i>
<a href="#"><b>dissent</b></a>	The act of protesting a public often organized manifestation of dissent. <i>He wasted no time in cranking out nine majority opinions as well as three <b>dissents</b>.</i>

<b>dissenter</b>	A person who dissents from some established policy.
<b><u>dissident</u></b>	Characterized by departure from accepted beliefs or standards. <i>A <b>dissident</b> who had been jailed by a military regime.</i>
<b><u>downturn</u></b>	A worsening of business or economic activity. <i>A <b>downturn</b> in the housing market.</i>
<b><u>enemy</u></b>	A personal enemy. <i>The <b>enemy</b> attacked at dawn.</i>
<b>equivalent</b>	A person or thing equal to another in value or measure or force or effect or significance etc. <i>One unit is <b>equivalent</b> to one glass of wine.</i>
<b><u>objection</u></b>	(law) a procedure whereby a party to a suit says that a particular line of questioning or a particular witness or a piece of evidence or other matter is improper and should not be continued and asks the court to rule on its impropriety or illegality. <i>They have raised no <b>objections</b> to the latest plans.</i>
<b>objector</b>	A person who expresses opposition to or disagreement with something. <i><b>Objectors</b> claim the motorway will damage the environment.</i>
<b>opponent</b>	Someone who competes with or opposes another in a contest, game, or argument. <i>The news will delight <b>opponents</b> of GM foods.</i>
<b>oppose</b>	Actively resist (a person or system). <i>The senator said he would <b>oppose</b> the bill.</i>
<b>opposed</b>	Being in opposition or having an opponent. <i>The agency is being asked to do two diametrically <b>opposed</b> things.</i>
<b>opposite</b>	Of angles between opposite sides of the intersection of two lines. <i>A word that is <b>opposite</b> in meaning to another.</i>
<b><u>opposition</u></b>	The major political party opposed to the party in office and prepared to replace it if elected. <i>A nature culture <b>opposition</b>.</i>
<b>reject</b>	The person or thing that is rejected or set aside as inferior in quality. <i>Some of the team's <b>rejects</b> have gone on to prove themselves in championships.</i>
<b>remonstrance</b>	The act of expressing earnest opposition or protest. <i>Angry <b>remonstrances</b> in the Commons.</i>
<b>reverse</b>	The gears by which the motion of a machine can be reversed. <i>The lorry <b>reversed</b> into the back of a bus.</i>
<b>rival</b>	Be the rival of be in competition with. <i>She has no <b>rivals</b> as a female rock singer.</i>

**unseat**

Remove (a government or person in authority) from power.

*The Republicans are trying to **unseat** the liberal Democrat.*

**vie**

Compete for something; engage in a contest; measure oneself against others.

*The athletes were vying for a place in the British team.*
