advantageous	Giving an advantage. Socially advantageous to entertain often.
appropriate	Suitable or proper in the circumstances. It seems that an apology is appropriate .
<u>apt</u>	(usually followed by `to') naturally disposed toward. An apt pupil.
beneficial	Promoting or enhancing well-being. The process was beneficial to both supplier and customer.
best	(superlative of `good') having the most positive qualities. <i>Her best black suit.</i>
commonsensical	Exhibiting native good judgment. Unlearned and commonsensical countryfolk were capable of solving problems that beset the more sophisticated.



<u>desirable</u>	Worth having or seeking or achieving. It is desirable to check that nothing has been forgotten.
effective	Able to accomplish a purpose functioning effectively. An air cooled motor was more effective than a witch s broomstick for rapid long distance transportation.
expedient	Serving to promote your interest. Was merciful only when mercy was expedient .
fitting	Being precisely fitting and right. A fitting reward.
gainful	Serving to increase wealth or resources; providing money or other benefit. <i>He soon found gainful employment.</i>
helpful	Useful. Helpful staff.
judicious	Having, showing, or done with good judgement or sense. The judicious use of public investment.
politic	(of a person) prudent and sagacious. A shrewd and politic reply.
<u>preferable</u>	More desirable than another. Lower interest rates were preferable to higher ones.
<u>profitable</u>	Beneficial; useful. A professionally run and profitable company.
proper	(of a person) good-looking. He finally has a proper job.
<u>prudent</u>	Acting with or showing care and thought for the future. <i>Prudent hesitation.</i>
recommended	Advised or suggested as good or suitable. The recommended daily intake of vitamins.
sensible	Able to feel or perceive. A sensible person.
sound	Vigorous or severe. Politicians have no sound grasp of technology issues.
<u>suitable</u>	Right or appropriate for a particular person, purpose, or situation. These toys are not suitable for children under five.
useful	Having a useful function. The girl felt motherly and useful .



valuable	Having worth or merit or value. A valuable antique.
well	In a satisfactory state or position. I think I m well at least I feel well .
wise	Evidencing the possession of inside information. <i>He is wise in the ways of haute couture.</i>



Usage Examples of "Advisable" as an adjective

- Early booking is advisable.
- Such action is neither necessary nor advisable.
- It is advisable to carry one of the major credit cards.
- It is advisable to telephone first.
- Extreme caution is advisable.

advised	Having the benefit of careful prior consideration or counsel. A well advised delay in carrying out the plan.
bioethics	The ethics of medical and biological research.
casuistry	The use of clever but unsound reasoning, especially in relation to moral questions; sophistry. The minister is engaging in nothing more or less than casuistry .
<u>chary</u>	Characterized by great caution and wariness. She had been chary of telling the whole truth.
<u>chaste</u>	Not having any sexual nature or intention. A chaste border of conventionalized flowers.
<u>chivalry</u>	The medieval principles governing knighthood and knightly conduct. <i>He still retained a sense of chivalry towards women.</i>
<u>conscience</u>	A person's moral sense of right and wrong, viewed as acting as a guide to one's behaviour. <i>He has no conscience about his cruelty.</i>
<u>discreet</u>	Intentionally unobtrusive. A discreet silence.
ethic	The principles of right and wrong that are accepted by an individual or a social group. <i>The Puritan ethic</i> .



<u>ethical</u>	Adhering to ethical and moral principles. Switching to more ethical products.
ethics	The moral correctness of specified conduct. Many scientists question the ethics of cruel experiments.
<u>exemplar</u>	Something to be imitated. An exemplar of success.
fine	Characterized by elegance or refinement or accomplishment. <i>Batiste is a cotton fabric with a fine weave.</i>
good	Often used as a combining form in a good or proper or satisfactory manner or to a high standard good is a nonstandard dialectal variant for well. <i>The baby can walk pretty</i> good .
goodness	The beneficial or nourishing element of food. A belief in the basic goodness of mankind.
judicious	Marked by the exercise of good judgment or common sense in practical matters. <i>The judicious</i> use of public investment.
judiciously	With good judgement or sense. Judiciously chosen words.
meekness	A disposition to be patient and long suffering. All his best friends make fun of him for his meekness .
moral	A lesson that can be derived from a story or experience. The moral of the story is to love thy neighbor.
provident	Careful in regard to your own interests. A provident father plans for his children s education.
<u>prudent</u>	Careful and sensible; marked by sound judgment. Prudent rulers.
<u>righteous</u>	Very good; excellent. <i>Righteous</i> indignation.
<u>superiority</u>	A supercilious manner or attitude. <i>He hated the white man s superiority and condescension.</i>
<u>tact</u>	Consideration in dealing with others and avoiding giving offense. The inspector broke the news to me with tact and consideration.
tactful	Having or showing skill and sensitivity in dealing with others or with difficult issues. They need a tactful word of advice.



values	Beliefs of a person or social group in which they have an emotional investment (either for or against something. <i>He has very conservatives values</i> .
virtue	(in traditional Christian angelology) the seventh-highest order of the ninefold celestial hierarchy. <i>Mike was extolling the virtues of the car.</i>
well	Often used as a combining form in a good or proper or satisfactory manner or to a high standard good is a nonstandard dialectal variant for well. <i>I should jolly well hope so.</i>
wise	Sensible or prudent. Fortunately I was already wise to the approach used in this scam.
wonderfully	In a way that inspires delight or admiration; extremely well. A wonderfully entertaining show.
