<b>beau</b>	A rich, fashionable young man; a dandy.
<b>dandy</b>	A sailing vessel with two masts; a small mizzen is aft of the rudderpost. <i>The Winchester Model 37 shotgun is a <b>dandy</b> at a low price.</i>
<b>esthete</b>	One who professes great sensitivity to the beauty of art and nature.
<b>fop</b>	A man who is much concerned with his dress and appearance.
<b>glamour boy</b>	Offensive and disparaging term for Black man.
<b>man about town</b>	A manservant who acts as a personal attendant to his employer.
<b>rake</b>	An implement similar to a rake used for other purposes e g by a croupier drawing in money at a gaming table. <i>Giving the lawn a <b>rake</b>.</i>

<b>anthology</b>	A collection of selected literary passages. <i>An <b>anthology</b> of European poetry.</i>
<b>author</b>	Be the author of a book or piece of writing. <i>The concept has been <b>authored</b> largely by insurance companies.</i>
<b>bard</b>	Shakespeare. <i>Our national <b>bard</b> Robert Burns.</i>
<b>biographer</b>	Someone who writes an account of a person's life. <i>An important <b>biographer</b> of contemporary artists.</i>
<b>comic</b>	A professional performer who tells jokes and performs comical acts. <i>The shop sold newspapers and children s <b>comics</b>.</i>
<b>critic</b>	A person who expresses an unfavourable opinion of something. <i><b>Critics</b> of the new legislation say it is too broad.</i>
<b>dandy</b>	Relating to or characteristic of a dandy. <i>His floppy handkerchiefs and antique cufflinks gave him the look of a <b>dandy</b>.</i>
<b>dramatist</b>	Someone who writes plays.
<b>editor</b>	A program designed to perform such editorial functions as rearrangement or modification or deletion of data. <i>You will be able to use the <b>editor</b> to make any changes you want.</i>
<b>epigram</b>	A witty saying. <i>A Wildean <b>epigram</b>.</i>
<b>famous</b>	Excellent. <i>A <b>famous</b> actor.</i>
<b>journalist</b>	Someone who keeps a diary or journal. <i>Foreign <b>journalists</b> had been expelled from the area.</i>
<b>leaflet</b>	Distribute leaflets to people or an area. <i>Election <b>leaflets</b>.</i>
<b>lyricist</b>	A person who writes the words to a popular song or musical.
<b>minstrel</b>	A performer in a minstrel show. <i>They listened to the <b>minstrels</b> singing songs of knightly prowess.</i>
<b>novelist</b>	One who writes novels.
<b>ode</b>	A lyric poem, typically one in the form of an address to a particular subject, written in varied or irregular metre.
<b>opus</b>	A musical work that has been created. <i>He was writing an <b>opus</b> on Mexico.</i>

<b>pamphleteer</b>	A writer of pamphlets (usually taking a partisan stand on public issues). <i>The right to <b>pamphleteer</b> and post bills anonymously is as important today as it was three centuries ago.</i>
<b>pen</b>	An electronic device like a pen used in conjunction with a writing surface to enter commands or data into a computer. <i>Olivia <b>penned</b> award winning poetry.</i>
<b>playwright</b>	A person who writes plays.
<b>poet</b>	A writer of poems the term is usually reserved for writers of good poetry. <i>He is more <b>poet</b> than academic because of his gift for language.</i>
<b>poetics</b>	The art of writing poetry. <i>Both <b>poetics</b> and rhetoric make use of narrative structure.</i>
<b>prose</b>	Compose in or convert into prose. <i>A <b>prose</b> passage.</i>
<b>quatrain</b>	A stanza of four lines.
<b>rhyme</b>	Compose rhymes. <i>Gravel can be interpreted as an absurd <b>rhyme</b> for travel.</i>
<b>sonnet</b>	Celebrate in a sonnet. <i>And in delightful Tones sit <b>sonneting</b>.</i>
<b>tragedian</b>	An actor who specializes in tragic roles.
<b>write</b>	Create code write a computer program. <i>Thank you and goodbye I ll <b>write</b> soon.</i>
<b>writer</b>	Writes (books or stories or articles or the like) professionally (for pay). <i>A <b>writer</b> of short stories.</i>
