Definitions of "Affiliated" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “affiliated” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *(of a subsidiary group or a person) officially attached or connected to an organization.*
- *Being joined in close association.*



Synonyms of "Affiliated" as an adjective (2 Words)

attached (of an organization) affiliated to (a larger organization).
*All art schools whether independent or **attached** to universities.*

connected Joined or linked together.
*A **connected** series of cargo holds.*



Usage Examples of "Affiliated" as an adjective

- *Affiliated clubs.*
- *Affiliated union members.*
- *Microsoft and its affiliated companies.*



Associations of "Affiliated" (30 Words)

- attached** Full of affection or fondness.
*She s cute is she **attached**.*
- bilateral** Having two sides or parts.
*A **bilateral** agreement between the United States and Japan.*
- closely** In a careful and attentive way.
*The medical sergeant follows **closely** behind the squad.*
- connected** Being joined in close association.
*All the window alarms are **connected**.*
- connection** The act of bringing two things into contact (especially for communication).
*The **connections** between social attitudes and productivity.*
- correlated** Mutually related.
- correlative** Either of two or more related or complementary variables.
*Rights whether moral or legal can involve **correlative** duties.*
- corresponding** Accompanying.
*A number of **corresponding** diagonal points.*

<u>friendship</u>	A relationship between friends. <i>Because of the friendship between our countries we had a very frank exchange.</i>
hinge	Attach with a hinge. <i>This period can be called the hinge of history.</i>
inextricable	Not permitting extrication; incapable of being disentangled or untied. <i>An inextricable situation.</i>
inherence	The state of inhering; the state of being a fixed characteristic. <i>The inherence of polysemy in human language.</i>
interaction	A mutual or reciprocal action; interacting. <i>For a shy person social interaction can be a stomach churning anxiety filled experience.</i>
interactive	Capable of acting on or influencing each other. <i>A fully interactive map of the area.</i>
interconnect	Be interwoven or interconnected. <i>The lakes are interconnected by trails filled with joggers.</i>
<u>interdependent</u>	Mutually dependent. <i>We in Europe are all increasingly interdependent.</i>
interlinear	Written or printed between the lines of a text. <i>A Greek English interlinear New Testament.</i>
intimately	In a way that involves detailed knowledge. <i>He is intimately familiar with her work.</i>
<u>involved</u>	Emotionally involved. <i>A long involved conversation.</i>
<u>involvement</u>	Emotional or personal association with someone. <i>He escaped involvement in the accident.</i>
<u>link</u>	The means of connection between things linked in series. <i>A network of routes linking towns and villages.</i>
linked	Connected by a link, as railway cars or trailer trucks.
loving	Feeling or showing love and affection. <i>A loving father.</i>
<u>mutual</u>	A mutual building society or insurance company. <i>My father hated him from the start and the feeling was mutual.</i>
positively	So as to be positive; in a positive manner. <i>The negotiations started positively with agreement on several issues.</i>

rapport

A close and harmonious relationship in which the people or groups concerned understand each other's feelings or ideas and communicate well.

*She had an instant **rapport** with animals.*

reciprocal

One of a pair of numbers whose product is 1 the reciprocal of 2 3 is 3 2 the multiplicative inverse of 7 is 1 7.

Reciprocal trade.

related

Associated with the specified item or process, especially causally.

*Income **related** benefits.*

relation

The principle that an act done at a later time is deemed by law to have occurred at an earlier time.

*The meetings helped cement Anglo American **relations**.*

relatively

Regarded in comparison with something else rather than absolutely; quite.

*The situation is **relatively** calm now.*
