## Synonyms of "Affiliations" as a noun (3 Words)

**association** Any process of combination (especially in solution) that depends on relatively weak chemical bonding.

*His **association** of his father with being beaten was too strong to break.*

**tie** The finish of a contest in which the score is tied and the winner is undecided.  
*The British call a railroad **tie** a sleeper.*

**tie-up** An interruption of normal activity.

- *A valuable financial affiliation.*



## Associations of "Affiliations" (30 Words)

### affiliate

A subordinate or subsidiary associate a person who is affiliated with another or with an organization.

*The main party agreed to **affiliate** four Conservative associations.*

### alliance

The act of forming an alliance or confederation.

*An **alliance** between medicine and morality.*

### ally

A state formally cooperating with another for a military or other purpose.

*He s a good **ally** in fight.*

### associate

Having partial rights and privileges or subordinate status.

*The environmental problems **associated** with nuclear waste.*

### association

(ecology) a group of organisms (plants and animals) that live together in a certain geographical region and constitute a community with a few dominant species.

*There s nothing new in the **association** of fasting with spirituality.*

<b>club</b>	Go out to nightclubs. <i>The gossip columnist got his information by visiting night<b>clubs</b> every night.</i>
<b>coalescence</b>	The union of diverse things into one body or form or group; the growing together of parts. <i>A sophisticated <b>coalescence</b> of melodies and harmonies.</i>
<b>coalition</b>	The union of diverse things into one body or form or group; the growing together of parts. <i>They had a taste of government in <b>coalition</b> with the Social Democrats.</i>
<b>collaboration</b>	Something produced in collaboration with someone. <i>He faces charges of <b>collaboration</b>.</i>
<b>combination</b>	A sequence of numbers or letters that opens a combination lock. <i>Underneath the picture is a safe the <b>combination</b> is 210319.</i>
<b>combine</b>	Combine so as to form a whole mix. <i>One of the world s biggest food and personal products <b>combines</b>.</i>
<b>confederacy</b>	A union of political organizations. <i>The Italian <b>confederacy</b> known as the Lombard League.</i>
<b>confederation</b>	The act of forming an alliance or confederation. <i>A referendum on <b>confederation</b>.</i>
<b>conjugation</b>	The fusion of two gametes, especially when they are of a similar size. <i>Immunity may be transferable by <b>conjugation</b> to other bacterial strains.</i>
<b>cooperation</b>	The practice of cooperating. <i>Their <b>cooperation</b> with us was essential for the success of our mission.</i>
<b>correlate</b>	Bring into a mutual, complementary, or reciprocal relation. <i>We should <b>correlate</b> general trends in public opinion with trends in the content of television news.</i>
<b>friendship</b>	A state of mutual trust and support between allied nations. <i>She formed close <b>friendships</b> with women.</i>
<b>fusion</b>	A nuclear reaction in which nuclei combine to form more massive nuclei with the simultaneous release of energy. <i><b>Fusion</b> cuisine.</i>
<b>guild</b>	A group of species that have similar requirements and play a similar role within a community.
<b>integrated</b>	Formed or united into a whole. <i>A more closely <b>integrated</b> economic and political system.</i>
<b>join</b>	Be or become joined or united or linked. <i><b>Join</b> the paragraphs together.</i>

<b><u>league</u></b>	Unite to form a league. <i>Oscar had <b>leagued</b> with other construction firms.</i>
<b>membership</b>	The members or the number of members in a group. <i>A <b>membership</b> card.</i>
<b>mutuality</b>	A reciprocal relation between interdependent entities (objects or individuals or groups). <i>Co operation has been based on the principle of <b>mutuality</b>.</i>
<b><u>reunion</u></b>	The action of being brought together again as a unified whole. <i>A school <b>reunion</b>.</i>
<b>synthesis</b>	(in Hegelian philosophy) the final stage in the process of dialectical reasoning, in which a new idea resolves the conflict between thesis and antithesis. <i>The <b>synthesis</b> of intellect and emotion in his work.</i>
<b>unification</b>	An occurrence that involves the production of a union. <i>The costs of German <b>unification</b>.</i>
<b><u>union</u></b>	Of trade unions. <i>A currency <b>union</b> between the two countries.</i>
<b>unite</b>	Act in concert or unite in a common purpose or belief. <i>The Democratic Party platform <b>united</b> several splinter groups.</i>
<b><u>united</u></b>	Of or relating to two people who are married to each other. <i>Women acting together in a <b>united</b> way.</i>
