
# Affiliations as a Noun

## Synonyms of "Affiliations" as a noun (3 Words)

Any process of combination (especially in solution) that depends on relatively **association** weak chemical bonding.

His **association** of his father with being beaten was too strong to break.

- **tie** The finish of a contest in which the score is tied and the winner is undecided. *The British call a railroad tie a sleeper.*
- tie-up An interruption of normal activity.





## Usage Examples of "Affiliations" as a noun

- Welcomed the affiliation of the research center with the university.
- A valuable financial affiliation.





# Associations of "Affiliations" (30 Words)

<u>affiliate</u>	A subordinate or subsidiary associate a person who is affiliated with another or with an organization. <i>The main party agreed to affiliate four Conservative associations.</i>
alliance	The act of forming an alliance or confederation. An <b>alliance</b> between medicine and morality.
<u>ally</u>	A state formally cooperating with another for a military or other purpose. <i>He s a good ally in fight.</i>
associate	Having partial rights and privileges or subordinate status. The environmental problems <b>associate</b> d with nuclear waste.
association	(ecology) a group of organisms (plants and animals) that live together in a certain geographical region and constitute a community with a few dominant species. There s nothing new in the <b>association</b> of fasting with spirituality.



<u>club</u>	Go out to nightclubs. <i>The gossip columnist got his information by visiting nightclubs every night.</i>
coalescence	The union of diverse things into one body or form or group; the growing together of parts. A sophisticated <b>coalescence</b> of melodies and harmonies.
<u>coalition</u>	The union of diverse things into one body or form or group; the growing together of parts. They had a taste of government in <b>coalition</b> with the Social Democrats.
collaboration	Something produced in collaboration with someone. <i>He faces charges of <b>collaboration</b></i> .
combination	A sequence of numbers or letters that opens a combination lock. Underneath the picture is a safe the <b>combination</b> is 210319.
combine	Combine so as to form a whole mix. One of the world s biggest food and personal products <b>combine</b> s.
confederacy	A union of political organizations. The Italian <b>confederacy</b> known as the Lombard League.
<u>confederation</u>	The act of forming an alliance or confederation. A referendum on <b>confederation</b> .
conjugation	The fusion of two gametes, especially when they are of a similar size. Immunity may be transferable by <b>conjugation</b> to other bacterial strains.
cooperation	The practice of cooperating. Their <b>cooperation</b> with us was essential for the success of our mission.
<u>correlate</u>	Bring into a mutual, complementary, or reciprocal relation. We should <b>correlate</b> general trends in public opinion with trends in the content of television news.
<u>friendship</u>	A state of mutual trust and support between allied nations. She formed close <b>friendship</b> s with women.
<u>fusion</u>	A nuclear reaction in which nuclei combine to form more massive nuclei with the simultaneous release of energy. <i>Fusion cuisine</i> .
<u>guild</u>	A group of species that have similar requirements and play a similar role within a community.
integrated	Formed or united into a whole. A more closely <b>integrated</b> economic and political system.
join	Be or become joined or united or linked. <i>Join</i> the paragraphs together.



<u>league</u>	Unite to form a league. Oscar had <b>league</b> d with other construction firms.
membership	The members or the number of members in a group. A <b>membership</b> card.
mutuality	A reciprocal relation between interdependent entities (objects or individuals or groups. <i>Co operation has been based on the principle of</i> <b>mutuality</b> .
<u>reunion</u>	The action of being brought together again as a unified whole. A school <b>reunion</b> .
synthesis	(in Hegelian philosophy) the final stage in the process of dialectical reasoning, in which a new idea resolves the conflict between thesis and antithesis. The <b>synthesis</b> of intellect and emotion in his work.
unification	An occurrence that involves the production of a union. <i>The costs of German <b>unification</b></i> .
<u>union</u>	Of trade unions. A currency <b>union</b> between the two countries.
unite	Act in concert or unite in a common purpose or belief. <i>The Democratic Patry platform</i> <b>unite</b> d several splinter groups.
<u>united</u>	Of or relating to two people who are married to each other. Women acting together in a <b>united</b> way.
