Synonyms of "Affiliations" as a noun (3 Words)

association Any process of combination (especially in solution) that depends on relatively weak chemical bonding.

*His **association** of his father with being beaten was too strong to break.*

tie

The finish of a contest in which the score is tied and the winner is undecided.

*The British call a railroad **tie** a sleeper.*

tie-up

An interruption of normal activity.



Usage Examples of "Affiliations" as a noun

- *Welcomed the affiliation of the research center with the university.*
- *A valuable financial affiliation.*



Associations of "Affiliations" (30 Words)

affiliate

A subordinate or subsidiary associate a person who is affiliated with another or with an organization.

*The main party agreed to **affiliate** four Conservative associations.*

alliance

The act of forming an alliance or confederation.

*An **alliance** between medicine and morality.*

ally

A state formally cooperating with another for a military or other purpose.

*He s a good **ally** in fight.*

associate

Having partial rights and privileges or subordinate status.

*The environmental problems **associated** with nuclear waste.*

association

(ecology) a group of organisms (plants and animals) that live together in a certain geographical region and constitute a community with a few dominant species.

*There s nothing new in the **association** of fasting with spirituality.*

<u>club</u>	Go out to nightclubs. <i>The gossip columnist got his information by visiting nightclubs every night.</i>
coalescence	The union of diverse things into one body or form or group; the growing together of parts. <i>A sophisticated coalescence of melodies and harmonies.</i>
<u>coalition</u>	The union of diverse things into one body or form or group; the growing together of parts. <i>They had a taste of government in coalition with the Social Democrats.</i>
collaboration	Something produced in collaboration with someone. <i>He faces charges of collaboration.</i>
combination	A sequence of numbers or letters that opens a combination lock. <i>Underneath the picture is a safe the combination is 210319.</i>
combine	Combine so as to form a whole mix. <i>One of the world s biggest food and personal products combines.</i>
confederacy	A union of political organizations. <i>The Italian confederacy known as the Lombard League.</i>
<u>confederation</u>	The act of forming an alliance or confederation. <i>A referendum on confederation.</i>
conjugation	The fusion of two gametes, especially when they are of a similar size. <i>Immunity may be transferable by conjugation to other bacterial strains.</i>
cooperation	The practice of cooperating. <i>Their cooperation with us was essential for the success of our mission.</i>
<u>correlate</u>	Bring into a mutual, complementary, or reciprocal relation. <i>We should correlate general trends in public opinion with trends in the content of television news.</i>
<u>friendship</u>	A state of mutual trust and support between allied nations. <i>She formed close friendships with women.</i>
<u>fusion</u>	A nuclear reaction in which nuclei combine to form more massive nuclei with the simultaneous release of energy. <i>Fusion cuisine.</i>
<u>guild</u>	A group of species that have similar requirements and play a similar role within a community.
integrated	Formed or united into a whole. <i>A more closely integrated economic and political system.</i>
join	Be or become joined or united or linked. <i>Join the paragraphs together.</i>

<u>league</u>	Unite to form a league. <i>Oscar had leagued with other construction firms.</i>
membership	The members or the number of members in a group. <i>A membership card.</i>
mutuality	A reciprocal relation between interdependent entities (objects or individuals or groups). <i>Co operation has been based on the principle of mutuality.</i>
<u>reunion</u>	The action of being brought together again as a unified whole. <i>A school reunion.</i>
synthesis	(in Hegelian philosophy) the final stage in the process of dialectical reasoning, in which a new idea resolves the conflict between thesis and antithesis. <i>The synthesis of intellect and emotion in his work.</i>
unification	An occurrence that involves the production of a union. <i>The costs of German unification.</i>
<u>union</u>	Of trade unions. <i>A currency union between the two countries.</i>
unite	Act in concert or unite in a common purpose or belief. <i>The Democratic Party platform united several splinter groups.</i>
<u>united</u>	Of or relating to two people who are married to each other. <i>Women acting together in a united way.</i>
