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

## **Affirmations as a Noun**

### **Definitions of "Affirmations" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “affirmations” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The act of affirming or asserting or stating something.*
- *A solemn declaration that serves the same purpose as an oath (if an oath is objectionable to the person on religious or ethical grounds.*
- *A statement asserting the existence or the truth of something.*
- *A judgment by a higher court that the judgment of a lower court was correct and should stand.*
- *(religion) a solemn declaration that serves the same purpose as an oath (if an oath is objectionable to the person on religious or ethical grounds.*



### Synonyms of "Affirmations" as a noun (4 Words)

- assertion** The act of affirming or asserting or stating something.  
*The **assertion** of his legal rights.*
- avouchment** A statement asserting the existence or the truth of something.
- avowal** A statement asserting the existence or the truth of something.
- statement** (computer science) a line of code written as part of a computer program.  
*The ministers issued a joint **statement** calling for negotiations.*



## Associations of "Affirmations" (30 Words)

<b>affirm</b>	To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true. <i>The Court of Appeal <b>affirmed</b> a decision of the High Court.</i>
<b>arguable</b>	Able to be argued or asserted. <i>It was <b>arguable</b> that the bank had no authority to honour the cheques.</i>
<b>assert</b>	Postulate positively and assertively. <i>The letter <b>asserts</b> a free society.</i>
<b>asserting</b>	Relating to the use of or having the nature of a declaration.
<b>assertion</b>	The act of affirming or asserting or stating something. <i>His <b>assertion</b> that his father had deserted the family.</i>
<b>assurance</b>	Certainty about something. <i>He gave an <b>assurance</b> that work would begin on Monday.</i>

<b><u>assure</u></b>	Assure somebody of the truth of something with the intention of giving the listener confidence. <i>Tony <b>assured</b> me that there was a supermarket in the village.</i>
<b><u>aver</u></b>	To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true. <i>The defendant does not <b>aver</b> any performance by himself.</i>
<b>avow</b>	Admit openly and bluntly; make no bones about. <i>He <b>avowed</b> that he had voted Labour in every election.</i>
<b><u>certain</u></b>	Certain to occur destined or inevitable Benjamin Franklin. <i><b>Certain</b> members have not paid their dues.</i>
<b>claim</b>	Lay claim to as of an idea. <i>They struck in support of their <b>claim</b> for a shorter work day.</i>
<b><u>clarify</u></b>	Make (a statement or situation) less confused and more comprehensible. <i><b>Clarify</b> the butter.</i>
<b>confidently</b>	In a self-assured way that expresses faith in oneself or one's abilities or qualities. <i>He <b>confidently</b> predicts a change of fortune.</i>
<b><u>contend</u></b>	Struggle to surmount (a difficulty). <i>He <b>contended</b> that Communism had no future.</i>
<b>declamation</b>	Vehement oratory. <i>Lines written for a school <b>declamation</b>.</i>
<b><u>declaration</u></b>	An announcement of a combination held in certain card games. <i>The <b>declaration</b> of war.</i>
<b>declarative</b>	Relating to the mood of verbs that is used simple in declarative statements. <i><b>Declarative</b> statements.</i>
<b>declaratory</b>	Relating to the use of or having the nature of a declaration. <i>A <b>declaratory</b> ruling in favour of the applicants.</i>
<b><u>declare</u></b>	Declare to be. <i>Pakistan <b>declared</b> at 446 for four.</i>
<b>declared</b>	Declared as fact explicitly stated. <i>They are both <b>declared</b> atheists.</i>
<b><u>elucidate</u></b>	Make free from confusion or ambiguity; make clear. <i>In what follows I shall try to <b>elucidate</b> what I believe the problems to be.</i>
<b>evidence</b>	Be or show evidence of. <i>The <b>evidence</b> that smoking causes lung cancer is very compelling.</i>
<b>exaction</b>	Act of demanding or levying by force or authority. <i>The billions flow in through 28 taxes and countless smaller <b>exactions</b>.</i>

- explicit** Of a person stating something in an explicit manner.  
*A sexually **explicit** blockbuster.*
- incriminate** Suggest that someone is guilty.  
*He refused to answer questions in order not to **incriminate** himself.*
- insist** Postulate positively and assertively.  
*I really am all right now Isabel **insisted**.*
- positive** A positive photographic image especially one printed from a negative.  
*The less he knows the more **positive** he gets.*
- predicate** One of the two main constituents of a sentence the predicate contains the verb and its complements.  
*A word which **predicates** something about its subject.*
- proclaim** Announce officially or publicly.  
*He **proclaimed** King James II as King of England.*
- statement** The act of affirming or asserting or stating something.  
*This is correct as a **statement** of fact.*
