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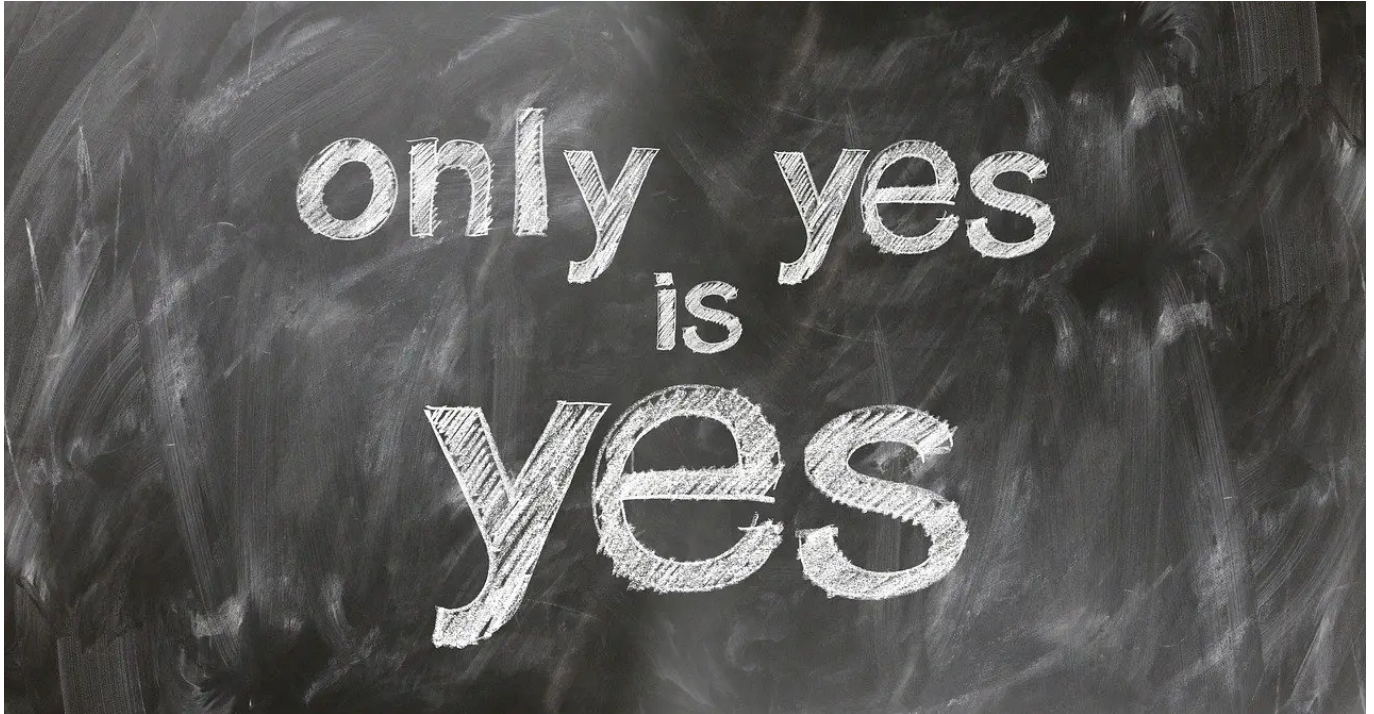
The synonyms of “Affirmations” are: avouchment, avowal, assertion, statement

Affirmations as a Noun

Definitions of "Affirmations" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “affirmations” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The act of affirming or asserting or stating something.*
- *A solemn declaration that serves the same purpose as an oath (if an oath is objectionable to the person on religious or ethical grounds.*
- *A statement asserting the existence or the truth of something.*
- *A judgment by a higher court that the judgment of a lower court was correct and should stand.*
- *(religion) a solemn declaration that serves the same purpose as an oath (if an oath is objectionable to the person on religious or ethical grounds.*



Synonyms of "Affirmations" as a noun (4 Words)

- assertion** The act of affirming or asserting or stating something.
*The **assertion** of his legal rights.*
- avouchment** A statement asserting the existence or the truth of something.
- avowal** A statement asserting the existence or the truth of something.
- statement** (computer science) a line of code written as part of a computer program.
*The ministers issued a joint **statement** calling for negotiations.*



Associations of "Affirmations" (30 Words)

affirm	To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true. <i>The Court of Appeal affirmed a decision of the High Court.</i>
arguable	Able to be argued or asserted. <i>It was arguable that the bank had no authority to honour the cheques.</i>
assert	Postulate positively and assertively. <i>The letter asserts a free society.</i>
asserting	Relating to the use of or having the nature of a declaration.
assertion	The act of affirming or asserting or stating something. <i>His assertion that his father had deserted the family.</i>
assurance	Certainty about something. <i>He gave an assurance that work would begin on Monday.</i>

<u>assure</u>	Assure somebody of the truth of something with the intention of giving the listener confidence. <i>Tony assured me that there was a supermarket in the village.</i>
<u>aver</u>	To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true. <i>The defendant does not aver any performance by himself.</i>
avow	Admit openly and bluntly; make no bones about. <i>He avowed that he had voted Labour in every election.</i>
<u>certain</u>	Certain to occur destined or inevitable Benjamin Franklin. <i>Certain members have not paid their dues.</i>
claim	Lay claim to as of an idea. <i>They struck in support of their claim for a shorter work day.</i>
<u>clarify</u>	Make (a statement or situation) less confused and more comprehensible. <i>Clarify the butter.</i>
confidently	In a self-assured way that expresses faith in oneself or one's abilities or qualities. <i>He confidently predicts a change of fortune.</i>
<u>contend</u>	Struggle to surmount (a difficulty). <i>He contended that Communism had no future.</i>
declamation	Vehement oratory. <i>Lines written for a school declamation.</i>
<u>declaration</u>	An announcement of a combination held in certain card games. <i>The declaration of war.</i>
declarative	Relating to the mood of verbs that is used simple in declarative statements. <i>Declarative statements.</i>
declaratory	Relating to the use of or having the nature of a declaration. <i>A declaratory ruling in favour of the applicants.</i>
<u>declare</u>	Declare to be. <i>Pakistan declared at 446 for four.</i>
declared	Declared as fact explicitly stated. <i>They are both declared atheists.</i>
<u>elucidate</u>	Make free from confusion or ambiguity; make clear. <i>In what follows I shall try to elucidate what I believe the problems to be.</i>
evidence	Be or show evidence of. <i>The evidence that smoking causes lung cancer is very compelling.</i>
exaction	Act of demanding or levying by force or authority. <i>The billions flow in through 28 taxes and countless smaller exactions.</i>

- explicit** Of a person stating something in an explicit manner.
*A sexually **explicit** blockbuster.*
- incriminate** Suggest that someone is guilty.
*He refused to answer questions in order not to **incriminate** himself.*
- insist** Postulate positively and assertively.
*I really am all right now Isabel **insisted**.*
- positive** A positive photographic image especially one printed from a negative.
*The less he knows the more **positive** he gets.*
- predicate** One of the two main constituents of a sentence the predicate contains the verb and its complements.
*A word which **predicates** something about its subject.*
- proclaim** Announce officially or publicly.
*He **proclaimed** King James II as King of England.*
- statement** The act of affirming or asserting or stating something.
*This is correct as a **statement** of fact.*
