affidavit	A written statement confirmed by oath or affirmation, for use as evidence in court. <i>A former employee swore an affidavit relating to his claim for unfair dismissal.</i>
assert	Assert to be true. <i>The company asserts that the cuts will not affect development.</i>
asserting	Relating to the use of or having the nature of a declaration.
assertion	A declaration that is made emphatically (as if no supporting evidence were necessary). <i>The assertion of his legal rights.</i>
assurance	Confidence or certainty in one’s own abilities. <i>The President s assurances were not respected.</i>
assure	Assure somebody of the truth of something with the intention of giving the listener confidence. <i>You would be assured of a welcome.</i>
aver	Allege as a fact in support of a plea. <i>He averred that he was innocent of the allegations.</i>
avow	Admit openly and bluntly; make no bones about. <i>He avowed his change of faith.</i>
certain	Certain to occur destined or inevitable Benjamin Franklin. <i>Be certain to disconnect the iron when you are through.</i>
claim	Ask for legally or make a legal claim to as of debts for example. <i>The accident claimed three lives.</i>
confidently	In a way that expresses little or no doubt about something. <i>I strode confidently up to the rope.</i>
confirm	Administer the religious rite of confirmation to. <i>He had been baptized and confirmed.</i>

<u>conjunction</u>	The grammatical relation between linguistic units words or phrases or clauses that are connected by a conjunction. <i>The conjunctions and oppositions of the planets.</i>
declarative	Relating to the mood of verbs that is used simple in declarative statements. <i>Declarative statements.</i>
declaratory	Relating to the use of or having the nature of a declaration. <i>A declaratory ruling in favour of the applicants.</i>
<u>declare</u>	Declare to be. <i>Pakistan declared at 446 for four.</i>
exaction	Act of demanding or levying by force or authority. <i>Exaction of various dues and fees.</i>
faithfully	In a loyal manner. <i>She translated the novel as faithfully as possible.</i>
<u>indicative</u>	The indicative mood. <i>Having recurrent dreams is not necessarily indicative of any psychological problem.</i>
noun	A word other than a pronoun used to identify any of a class of people places or things common noun or to name a particular one of these proper noun.
<u>predicate</u>	One of the two main constituents of a sentence the predicate contains the verb and its complements. <i>Socrates is a man predicates manhood of Socrates.</i>
<u>proclaim</u>	Affirm or declare as an attribute or quality of. <i>She proclaimed that what I had said was untrue.</i>
<u>purport</u>	The intended meaning of a communication. <i>She is not the person she purports to be.</i>
say	Have or contain a certain wording or form. <i>The registrar says that I owe the school money.</i>
statement	(computer science) a line of code written as part of a computer program. <i>The hope is that they will fill the stands and terraces to make a statement about the importance of this club.</i>
<u>substantiate</u>	Provide evidence to support or prove the truth of. <i>The painting substantiates the feelings of the artist.</i>
swear	An offensive word used especially to express anger a swear word. <i>Maria made me swear I would never tell anyone.</i>
verb	Use a word that is not conventionally used as a verb typically a noun as a verb. <i>Any English noun can be verbed but some are more resistant than others.</i>

verify

Check or regulate (a scientific experiment) by conducting a parallel experiment or comparing with another standard.

*Please **verify** that the doors are closed.*

vow

Make a vow promise.

*I **vowed** that my family would never go hungry.*
