- *Grievously affected especially by disease.*



## Synonyms of "Afflicted" as an adjective (2 Words)

**impaired** Affected by alcohol or drugs to the extent of losing control over one's faculties or behaviour.

*Impaired* eyesight.

**stricken** (of a person's face or appearance) showing great distress.  
*She looked at Anne's stricken face contorted with worry.*

## Associations of "Afflicted" (30 Words)

**abscess** Symptom consisting of a localized collection of pus surrounded by inflamed tissue.

*Once the abscesses burst they usually discharge for several days before gradually healing up.*

**aching** Arousing, experiencing, or expressive of intense sorrow or longing.  
*My aching head.*

**chaotic** In a state of complete confusion and disorder.  
*The political situation was chaotic.*

<b>diminished</b>	Diminished in size or strength as a result of disease or injury or lack of use. <i>A <b>diminished</b> fifth.</i>
<b>dysfunctional</b>	Impaired in function; especially of a bodily system or organ. <i><b>Dysfunctional</b> families.</i>
<b>eviscerate</b>	Take away a vital or essential part of. <i>The goat had been skinned and neatly <b>eviscerated</b>.</i>
<b>glucose</b>	A syrup containing glucose and other sugars made by hydrolysis of starch and used in the food industry.
<b>hurt</b>	Hurt the feelings of. <i>Ambulances for the <b>hurt</b> men and women.</i>
<b>ill</b>	Presaging ill fortune P B Shelley. <i>It <b>ill</b> befits a man to betray old friends.</i>
<b>impaired</b>	Mentally or physically unfit. <i>Sight <b>impaired</b> children.</i>
<b>injured</b>	Harmed, damaged, or impaired. <i><b>Injured</b> feelings.</i>
<b>irreversibly</b>	In an irreversible manner. <i>Our landscape will be <b>irreversibly</b> damaged.</i>
<b>lacerate</b>	Tear or make deep cuts in (flesh or skin). <i>The point had <b>lacerated</b> his neck.</i>
<b>marred</b>	Blemished by injury or rough wear. <i>Walls <b>marred</b> by graffiti.</i>
<b>mentally</b>	In your mind. <i>Soldiers become physically and <b>mentally</b> exhausted.</i>
<b>operation</b>	The performance of some composite cognitive activity an operation that affects mental contents. <i>He reopened his <b>operation</b> under a different name.</i>
<b>painfully</b>	In or as if in pain. <i>She moved <b>painfully</b> forward.</i>
<b>peritonitis</b>	Inflammation of the peritoneum, typically caused by bacterial infection either via the blood or after rupture of an abdominal organ.
<b>pneumonia</b>	Lung inflammation caused by bacterial or viral infection in which the air sacs fill with pus and may become solid Inflammation may affect both lungs double pneumonia or only one single pneumonia.

<b>rehabilitate</b>	Help to readapt, as to a former state of health or good repute. <i>The campaign aims to <b>rehabilitate</b> the river s flood plain.</i>
<b><u>scarred</u></b>	Deeply affected or marked by mental or physical pain or injury. <i>Could her <b>scarred</b> mind ever be free of fear.</i>
<b>sepsis</b>	The presence of pus-forming bacteria or their toxins in the blood or tissues.
<b>sick</b>	People who are sick. <i>Visiting the <b>sick</b> and the elderly.</i>
<b>sore</b>	Upset and angry. <i>They were <b>sore</b> afraid.</i>
<b>suffer</b>	Undergo or suffer. <i>He <b>suffered</b> intense pain.</i>
<b>transformed</b>	Given a completely different form or appearance. <i>Shocked to see the <b>transformed</b> landscape.</i>
<b>wearisome</b>	Causing one to feel tired or bored. <i>They insisted on his presence at <b>wearisome</b> musical soir es.</i>
<b>wheelchair</b>	A movable chair mounted on large wheels; for invalids or those who cannot walk; frequently propelled by the occupant.
<b><u>wounded</u></b>	People who are wounded. <i>A <b>wounded</b> soldier.</i>
