- *Be able to spare or give up.*
- *Have (a resource such as money or time) available or to spare.*
- *Have the financial means to do something or buy something.*
- *Provide or supply (an opportunity or facility).*

Be identical to; be someone or something.

bear

Contain or hold; have within.

*Steamboats **bear** the traveller out of Kerrerra Sound.*

bear the expense of

Cause to be born.

bestow

Bestow a quality on.

***Bestow** an honor on someone.*

carry

Take further or advance.

*You must **carry** your camping gear.*

furnish

Provide or equip with furniture.

*She was able to **furnish** me with details of the incident.*

give

Give as medicine.

*Milk is sometimes added to **give** a richer cheese.*

grant	Allow to have. Grant a privilege.
have the money for	Have a personal or business relationship with someone.
have the wherewithal for	Organize or be responsible for.
<u>impart</u>	Transmit (knowledge or skills). <i>The teachers imparted a great deal of knowledge to their pupils.</i>
make available	Cause to be enjoyable or pleasurable.
meet the expense of	Experience as a reaction.
offer	Present or proffer something for someone to accept or reject as desired. <i>Villagers have gone to offer prayers for the souls of the sailors.</i>
open	Become open. <i>Do not open with fewer than twelve points.</i>
pay for	Make a compensation for.
present	Present somebody with something usually to accuse or criticize. <i>We cannot present this knowledge to our formal reason.</i>
produce	(of a place or process) yield, grow, or supply. Produce a movie.
provide	Make a possibility or provide opportunity for permit to be attainable or cause to remain. <i>New qualifications must provide for changes in technology.</i>
purvey	Spread or promote (an idea, view, etc). <i>We didn't want to purvey gloom and doom.</i>
render	Give up surrender. Render thanks.
spare the price of	Save or relieve from an experience or action.
stand	Withstand the force of something. <i>I can't stand brandy.</i>
supply	Make (something needed or wanted) available to someone; provide. <i>When she died no one could supply her place.</i>
<u>sustain</u>	Bear (the weight of an object) without breaking or falling. <i>The money will sustain our good cause.</i>
yield	Give or supply. <i>He yielded to the demands of his partners.</i>

- *We could never have afforded to heat the place.*
- *Only aristocrats could afford to stoop to such practices.*
- *The rooftop terrace affords beautiful views.*
- *They were afforded the luxury of bed and breakfast.*
- *The best that I could afford was a first-floor room.*
- *I can't afford to spend two hours with this person.*
- *It was taking up more time than he could afford.*

allocate	Distribute (resources or duties) for a particular purpose. <i>In past years we didn't allocate enough funds to infrastructure maintenance.</i>
amortization	A period in which a debt is reduced or paid off by regular payments. <i>75 of the mortgages have an amortization of 25 years or less.</i>
award	Give, especially as an honor or reward. <i>The award of an honorary doctorate.</i>
bestow	Bestow a quality on. <i>The office was bestowed on him by the monarch of this realm.</i>
bestowal	A gift that is bestowed or conferred.
cede	Relinquish possession or control over. <i>In 1874 the islands were ceded to Britain.</i>

concession	The right, given by a company, to sell goods, especially in a particular place. <i>Railcard holders can obtain concessions.</i>
contribute	Contribute to some cause. <i>The government imposed a tax on fuels which contributed to global warming.</i>
donation	A voluntary gift (as of money or service or ideas) made to some worthwhile cause. <i>The donation of carpets chairs and cutlery.</i>
empower	Give or delegate power or authority to. <i>Members are empowered to audit the accounts of limited companies.</i>
enable	Render capable or able for some task. <i>This skill will enable you to find a job on Wall Street.</i>
endow	Furnish with an endowment. <i>The country is well endowed with mineral resources.</i>
endowment	The capital that provides income for an institution. <i>His natural endowments were his height and intelligence.</i>
endue	Give qualities or abilities to. <i>Our sight would be endued with a far greater sharpness.</i>
entitle	Give (something) a particular title. <i>A satire entitled The Rise of the Meritocracy.</i>
finance	The management of money and credit and banking and investments. <i>The health service is financed almost entirely by the taxpayer.</i>
give	Give food to. <i>This is a place that will not improve with time I give it three weeks.</i>
grant	A right or privilege that has been granted. <i>Her request was granted.</i>
impart	Make (information) known. <i>Shiitake mushrooms impart a wonderfully woody flavour to the salad.</i>
invest	Make an investment. <i>The passage of time has invested the words with an unintended humour.</i>
laureate	Someone honored for great achievements; figuratively someone crowned with a laurel wreath. <i>A Nobel laureate.</i>
lend	Have certain characteristics of qualities for something; be open or vulnerable to. <i>Banks lend only to their current account customers.</i>

mortgage	A deed effecting a mortgage. <i>A 60 000 mortgage.</i>
offering	The verbal act of offering. <i>Offerings during Lent will always be gratefully received.</i>
payable	A liability account showing how much is owed for goods and services purchased on credit. <i>A note payable on demand.</i>
presentation	A visual representation of something. <i>Cesarean sections are sometimes the result of abnormal presentations.</i>
provide	Make a possibility or provide opportunity for permit to be attainable or cause to remain. <i>New qualifications must provide for changes in technology.</i>
situation	The location and surroundings of a place. <i>Found herself in a very fortunate situation.</i>
<u>sponsorship</u>	The position of being a sponsor. <i>The company's sponsorship of the tournament.</i>
yield	Move in order to make room for someone for something. <i>I yielded the point.</i>
