#### Definitions of "Afraid" as an adjective

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "afraid" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- Filled with regret or concern; used often to soften an unpleasant statement.
- Feeling worry or concern or insecurity.
- Anxious about the well-being or safety of.
- Feeling fear or anxiety; frightened.
- Unwilling or reluctant to do something for fear of the consequences.
- Filled with fear or apprehension.
- Having feelings of aversion or unwillingness.
- Worried that something undesirable will occur or be done.





## Synonyms of "Afraid" as an adjective (13 Words)

disinclined	Unwilling; reluctant. <b>Disinclined</b> to say anything to anybody.
fearful	Feeling or showing fear or anxiety. Cast <b>fearful</b> glances at the large dog.
frightened	Thrown into a state of intense fear or desperation. I m not <b>frightened</b> of him.
loath	Strongly opposed. <i>Loath</i> to admit a mistake.
<u>nervous</u>	Of or relating to the nervous system. A sensitive <b>nervous</b> person.
<u>petrified</u>	(of organic matter) changed into a stony substance; ossified. The <b>petrified</b> child clung to her mother.
reluctant	Unwilling and hesitant; disinclined. They were usually <b>reluctant</b> to socialize.



scared	Made afraid. We re both <b>scared</b> of spiders.	
scared stiff	Made afraid.	
scared to death Made afraid.		
slow	Slow to learn or understand lacking intellectual acuity. She was rather a <b>slow</b> reader.	
terrified	Thrown into a state of intense fear or desperation. The <b>terrified</b> horse bolted.	
<u>unwilling</u>	Not disposed or inclined toward. An <b>unwilling</b> smile.	



#### Usage Examples of "Afraid" as an adjective

- Afraid even to turn his head.
- Afraid of snakes.
- I'm afraid you're wrong.



- Afraid to show emotion.
- She was afraid that he would be angry.
- Suddenly looked afraid.
- Afraid to ask questions.
- William was suddenly afraid for her.
- I'm often afraid to go out on the streets.
- I'm afraid I won't be able to come.
- Afraid for his life.
- I am afraid we have witnessed only the first phase of the conflict.
- Afraid of hard work.
- She was afraid that I might be embarrassed.
- Terribly afraid of offending someone.
- She tried to think about the future without feeling afraid.
- He was afraid he would have to let her go.





# Associations of "Afraid" (30 Words)

<u>alarmed</u>	Experiencing a sudden sense of danger.
<u>alarming</u>	Frightening because of an awareness of danger. <i>Our countryside is disappearing at an <b>alarming</b> rate.</i>
appall	Strike with disgust or revulsion.
<u>chilling</u>	Horrifying or frightening. A <b>chilling</b> account of the prisoners fate.
claustrophobia	A morbid fear of being closed in a confined space. The small stuffy room had begun to give him <b>claustrophobia</b> .
confused	Mentally confused unable to think with clarity or act intelligently. <i>Bewildered and confused</i> .
<u>dismayed</u>	Struck with fear, dread, or consternation.
<u>dread</u>	A person with dreadlocks. The band appeals to <b>dread</b> s and baldheads alike.
<u>dreadful</u>	Causing or involving great suffering, fear, or unhappiness; extremely bad or serious. <i>The weather was dreadful.</i>
fainthearted	Lacking conviction or boldness or courage.
fear	Be sorry; used to introduce an unpleasant statement. <i>Fear</i> of unemployment is paralysing the economy.
fearful	Experiencing or showing fear. A <b>fearful</b> glance.
fearfulness	The trait of being afraid.
<u>formidable</u>	Extremely impressive in strength or excellence. A <b>formidable</b> opponent.
fright	Frighten. Ghosts could never af <b>fright</b> her.
frighten	Drive out by frightening. At his age I guess he doesn t <b>frighten</b> any more.
frightened	Afraid or anxious. I m not <b>frightened</b> of him.
<u>frightening</u>	Causing fear or dread or terror. A <b>frightening</b> experience.
phobia	An extreme or irrational fear of or aversion to something. Phobic disorder is a general term for all <b>phobia</b> s.



<u>scare</u>	Become scared. Gosh that gave me a <b>scare</b> .
scared	Made afraid. I m <b>scared</b> stiff of flying.
scary	Provoking fear terror. It was <b>scary</b> the way they bonded with each other.
<u>shocked</u>	Struck with fear, dread, or consternation.
terrible	Causing fear or dread or terror. Despite passing my driving test first time I m a <b>terrible</b> driver.
terrified	Thrown into a state of intense fear or desperation. The <b>terrified</b> horse bolted.
terrify	Fill with terror; frighten greatly. <i>He is terrified of spiders.</i>
<u>terrifying</u>	Causing extreme fear. The <b>terrifying</b> events of the past few weeks.
terror	Terrorism. Weapons of <b>terror</b> .
timidity	Fearfulness in venturing into new and unknown places or activities. She believes everyone can overcome their <b>timidity</b> .
timorous	Timid by nature or revealing timidity. A <b>timorous</b> voice.
