afterthought	An addition that was not included in the original plan. As an <b>afterthought</b> she said Thank you.
afterward	Happening at a time subsequent to a reference time. It didn t happen until <b>afterward</b> .
afterwards	At a later or future time. The offender was arrested shortly <b>afterwards</b> .
always	As a last resort; failing all else. She is <b>always</b> making derogatory remarks.
<u>consequently</u>	Because of the reason given. Flexible workers find themselves in great demand and <b>consequently</b> gain high salaries.
continuous	Continuing in time or space without interruption. Lived in <b>continuous</b> fear.
<u>ensuing</u>	Following immediately and as a result of what went before. She lost track of one of her children during the <b>ensuing</b> chaos.
entire	Constituting the undiminished entirety lacking nothing essential especially not damaged. <i>An entire</i> horse.
entirety	The whole of something. She would have to stay in her room for the <b>entirety</b> of the weekend.
<u>ever</u>	At all times all the time and on every occasion. <i>Having to borrow <b>ever</b> larger sums.</i>
<u>every</u>	Each and all of a series of entities or intervals as specified. <i>Every third seat.</i>
following	Immediately following in time or order. <i>He attracted a worldwide <b>following</b>.</i>



<u>forever</u>	Continually. These puppies need a <b>forever</b> home.
<u>frequently</u>	Regularly or habitually; often. They go abroad <b>frequently</b> .
generic	Characteristic of or relating to a class or group of things; not specific. <i>Generic dance floor fillers.</i>
<u>henceforth</u>	From this time forth; from now on. <i>Henceforth</i> she will be known as Mrs Smith.
intermittently	In an intermittent manner. An <b>intermittently</b> amusing plot.
later	Happening at a time subsequent to a reference time. <i>Later</i> medical science could have saved the child.
next	The next person or thing. <i>The woman in the <b>next</b> room.</i>
occasionally	Now and then or here and there. Very <b>occasionally</b> the condition can result in death.
<u>outright</u>	Immediately or instantly. An <b>outright</b> refusal.
permanency	The property of being able to exist for an indefinite duration.
<u>shortly</u>	For a short time. <i>To put it <b>shortly</b>.</i>
subsequently	After a particular thing has happened; afterwards. The officer decided to stop and <b>subsequently</b> made an arrest.
successively	In proper order or sequence. <i>He served</i> <b>successively</b> as a major and a lieutenant colonel.
<u>then</u>	In that case; therefore. So you re still here <b>then</b> .
<u>totally</u>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (`whole' is often used informally for `wholly. <i>The building was totally destroyed by the fire.</i>
<u>utterly</u>	Completely and without qualification; absolutely. <i>He looked <b>utterly</b> ridiculous.</i>
<u>whole</u>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly. <i>Europe considered as a whole</i> .



whollyTo a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used<br/>informally for wholly.<br/>The distinction is not wholly clear.
