| afterthought | An addition that was not included in the original plan. <i>As an afterthought she said Thank you.</i> |
| afterward | Happening at a time subsequent to a reference time. <i>It didn't happen until afterward.</i> |
| afterwards | At a later or future time. <i>The offender was arrested shortly afterwards.</i> |
| always | As a last resort; failing all else. <i>She is always making derogatory remarks.</i> Because of the reason given. |
| consequently | <i>Flexible workers find themselves in great demand and consequently gain high salaries.</i> |
| continuous | Continuing in time or space without interruption. <i>Lived in continuous fear.</i> |
| ensuing | Following immediately and as a result of what went before. <i>She lost track of one of her children during the ensuing chaos.</i> |
| entire | Constituting the undiminished entirety lacking nothing essential especially not damaged. <i>An entire horse.</i> |
| entirety | The whole of something. <i>She would have to stay in her room for the entirety of the weekend.</i> |
| ever | At all times all the time and on every occasion. <i>Having to borrow ever larger sums.</i> |
| every | Each and all of a series of entities or intervals as specified. <i>Every third seat.</i> |
| following | Immediately following in time or order. <i>He attracted a worldwide following.</i> |

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| <u>forever</u> | Continually. <i>These puppies need a forever home.</i> |
| <u>frequently</u> | Regularly or habitually; often. <i>They go abroad frequently.</i> |
| generic | Characteristic of or relating to a class or group of things; not specific. Generic dance floor fillers. |
| <u>henceforth</u> | From this time forth; from now on. Henceforth she will be known as Mrs Smith. |
| intermittently | In an intermittent manner. <i>An intermittently amusing plot.</i> |
| later | Happening at a time subsequent to a reference time. Later medical science could have saved the child. |
| <u>next</u> | The next person or thing. <i>The woman in the next room.</i> |
| <u>occasionally</u> | Now and then or here and there. <i>Very occasionally the condition can result in death.</i> |
| <u>outright</u> | Immediately or instantly. <i>An outright refusal.</i> |
| permanency | The property of being able to exist for an indefinite duration. |
| <u>shortly</u> | For a short time. <i>To put it shortly.</i> |
| subsequently | After a particular thing has happened; afterwards. <i>The officer decided to stop and subsequently made an arrest.</i> |
| successively | In proper order or sequence. <i>He served successively as a major and a lieutenant colonel.</i> |
| <u>then</u> | In that case; therefore. <i>So you re still here then.</i> |
| <u>totally</u> | To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’). <i>The building was totally destroyed by the fire.</i> |
| <u>utterly</u> | Completely and without qualification; absolutely. <i>He looked utterly ridiculous.</i> |
| <u>whole</u> | To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly. <i>Europe considered as a whole.</i> |
