- breakfast** Eat breakfast.  
*I often have toast for my **breakfast**.*
- dawn** An opening time period.  
*He set off at **dawn**.*
- day** A day assigned to a particular purpose or observance.  
*My student **days**.*
- daybreak** The time in the morning when daylight first appears; dawn.  
*She set off at **daybreak**.*
- daytime** The time after sunrise and before sunset while it is light outside.  
*She was alone in the **daytime**.*
- evening** An evening characterized by a particular event or activity.  
*The **evening** meal.*
- friday** The sixth day of the week; the fifth working day.

<b>hour</b>	The distance travelled in one hour. <i>Rates of pay were low starting at 3 20 an <b>hour</b>.</i>
<b>lunch</b>	Take someone out for lunch. <i>At what time are you <b>lunching</b>.</i>
<b>lunchtime</b>	The time in the middle of the day when lunch is eaten. <i>The <b>lunchtime</b> television news.</i>
<b>midday</b>	The middle of the day. <i>He awoke at <b>midday</b>.</i>
<b><u>midnight</u></b>	Twelve o'clock at night. <i>The <b>midnight</b> hours.</i>
<b><u>morning</u></b>	Every morning. <i>They talked until <b>morning</b>.</i>
<b><u>night</u></b>	A shortening of nightfall. <i>It vanished into the <b>night</b>.</i>
<b>nightfall</b>	The onset of night; dusk. <i>We had to get back by <b>nightfall</b>.</i>
<b>noon</b>	The middle of the day. <i>The service starts at twelve <b>noon</b>.</i>
<b>o'clock</b>	According to the clock.
<b>sunday</b>	United States evangelist (1862-1935).
<b><u>sunny</u></b>	(of a place) receiving much sunlight. <i>A <b>sunny</b> smile.</i>
<b><u>sunrise</u></b>	The time in the morning when the sun appears or full daylight arrives. <i>High technology <b>sunrise</b> industries.</i>
<b>sunset</b>	(of a programme, agency, regulation, etc.) expire or be terminated automatically at the end of a fixed period unless renewed by legislative action. <i>The wireless service providers that operate these networks are <b>sunsetting</b> them.</i>
<b>thursday</b>	The fifth day of the week; the fourth working day.
<b><u>tomorrow</u></b>	The next day, the day after, following the present day. <i><b>Tomorrow</b> s Grand Prix in Brazil.</i>
<b>tonight</b>	On the present or approaching evening or night. <i>Are you doing anything <b>tonight</b>.</i>
<b>tuesday</b>	The third day of the week; the second working day.
<b><u>twilight</u></b>	The period of the evening when twilight is visible between daylight and darkness. <i>In the <b>twilight</b> of the empire.</i>

- wake** Be awake be alert be there.  
*His voice **wakes** desire in others.*
- wednesday** The fourth day of the week; the third working day.
- weekday** Any day except Sunday (and sometimes except Saturday).  
*The **weekday** rush hour.*
- yesterday** In the recent past.  
***Yesterday** s best sellers.*
