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| breakfast | Eat breakfast. <i>I often have toast for my breakfast.</i> |
| dawn | An opening time period. <i>He set off at dawn.</i> |
| day | A day assigned to a particular purpose or observance. <i>My student days.</i> |
| daybreak | The time in the morning when daylight first appears; dawn. <i>She set off at daybreak.</i> |
| daytime | The time after sunrise and before sunset while it is light outside. <i>She was alone in the daytime.</i> |
| <u>evening</u> | An evening characterized by a particular event or activity. <i>The evening meal.</i> |
| friday | The sixth day of the week; the fifth working day. |

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| hour | The distance travelled in one hour. <i>Rates of pay were low starting at 3 20 an hour.</i> |
| lunch | Take someone out for lunch. <i>At what time are you lunching.</i> |
| lunchtime | The time in the middle of the day when lunch is eaten. <i>The lunchtime television news.</i> |
| midday | The middle of the day. <i>He awoke at midday.</i> |
| <u>midnight</u> | Twelve o'clock at night. <i>The midnight hours.</i> |
| <u>morning</u> | Every morning. <i>They talked until morning.</i> |
| <u>night</u> | A shortening of nightfall. <i>It vanished into the night.</i> |
| nightfall | The onset of night; dusk. <i>We had to get back by nightfall.</i> |
| noon | The middle of the day. <i>The service starts at twelve noon.</i> |
| o'clock | According to the clock. |
| sunday | United States evangelist (1862-1935). |
| <u>sunny</u> | (of a place) receiving much sunlight. <i>A sunny smile.</i> |
| <u>sunrise</u> | The time in the morning when the sun appears or full daylight arrives. <i>High technology sunrise industries.</i> |
| sunset | (of a programme, agency, regulation, etc.) expire or be terminated automatically at the end of a fixed period unless renewed by legislative action. <i>The wireless service providers that operate these networks are sunsetting them.</i> |
| thursday | The fifth day of the week; the fourth working day. |
| <u>tomorrow</u> | The next day, the day after, following the present day. <i>Tomorrow s Grand Prix in Brazil.</i> |
| tonight | On the present or approaching evening or night. <i>Are you doing anything tonight.</i> |
| tuesday | The third day of the week; the second working day. |
| <u>twilight</u> | The period of the evening when twilight is visible between daylight and darkness. <i>In the twilight of the empire.</i> |

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| wake | Be awake be alert be there. <i>His voice wakes desire in others.</i> |
| wednesday | The fourth day of the week; the third working day. |
| weekday | Any day except Sunday (and sometimes except Saturday). <i>The weekday rush hour.</i> |
| yesterday | In the recent past. <i>Yesterday s best sellers.</i> |
