bunch

A girl's hairstyle in which the hair is tied back into two clumps at the back or on either side of the head.

A **bunch** of trees.

bundle

A large sum of money (especially as pay or profit).

The new printer cost a **bundle**.

clump

A small, compact group of people.

Clumps of earth.

cluster

A group of stars or galaxies forming a relatively close association.

Ten **clusters** from all the primary health centres were selected.

collection

A sum of money raised during a church or charity collection.

A preview of their autumn **collection**.

heap

An untidy collection of objects placed haphazardly on top of each other.

We have **heaps** of room.

<u>hoard</u>	An ancient store of coins or other valuable artefacts. <i>A hoard of Romano British bronzes.</i>
<u>lump</u>	An abnormal protuberance or localized enlargement. <i>Working Only on the lump here and there.</i>
<u>mass</u>	A sequence of prayers constituting the Christian Eucharistic rite. <i>Seaside towns that catered for the masses.</i>
<u>pile</u>	A large amount of something. <i>He s making piles of money.</i>
<u>quantity</u>	The figure or symbol representing a quantity. <i>He had a quantity of ammunition.</i>
<u>stack</u>	A set of storage locations that store data in such a way that the most recently stored item is the first to be retrieved. <i>There s stacks of work for me now.</i>
<u>stockpile</u>	Something kept back or saved for future use or a special purpose. <i>A stockpile of nuclear weapons.</i>
<u>store</u>	A quantity or supply of something kept for use as needed. <i>A grain store.</i>



Usage Examples of "Agglomeration" as a noun

- *The arts centre is an agglomeration of theatres, galleries, shops, restaurants and bars.*



Associations of "Agglomeration" (30 Words)

accrete	Grow together (of plants and organs). <i>The collection of art he had accreted was to be sold.</i>
<u>accumulate</u>	Gradually gather or acquire (a resulting whole). <i>Investigators have yet to accumulate enough evidence.</i>
<u>accumulation</u>	A mass or quantity of something that has gradually gathered or been acquired. <i>The accumulation of wealth.</i>
agglomerate	Collected or formed into a mass. <i>A multimedia agglomerate.</i>
amass	Gather together or accumulate (a large amount or number of material or things) over a period of time. <i>He amassed a fortune estimated at close to a million pounds.</i>
<u>assemble</u>	Collect in one place. <i>A crowd had assembled outside the gates.</i>
bundle	Make into a bundle. <i>He was bundled into a van.</i>
caisson	A chest or wagon for holding or conveying ammunition.
<u>cluster</u>	Gather or cause to gather into a cluster. <i>Noble metal clusters supported on an acidic carrier.</i>
collect	Gather or collect. <i>A small crowd collected at the back door.</i>
collection	A sum of money raised during a church or charity collection. <i>She left the envelope in the office for collection.</i>
compost	Make vegetable matter or manure into compost. <i>Peat free composts.</i>
cumulate	An igneous rock formed by gravitational settling of particles in a magma. <i>The systems cumulate data over a period of years.</i>
deposition	The action of depositing something. <i>The deposition of four expert witnesses.</i>
<u>flock</u>	Come together as in a cluster or flock. <i>Tourists flocked to the shrine where the statue was said to have shed tears.</i>
<u>gather</u>	Collect or gather. <i>She gathered her shawl around her shoulders.</i>

<u>heap</u>	Put objects or a loose substance in a heap. <i>How do you like Maggie I like you heaps better.</i>
<u>hoard</u>	Save up as for future use. <i>Thousands of antiques hoarded by a compulsive collector.</i>
<u>jam</u>	A hold obtained by jamming a part of the body such as a hand or foot into a crack in the rock. <i>The mechanism jammed.</i>
load	Of a ship or vehicle take on a load. <i>The system broke down under excessive loads.</i>
nucleate	Having a nucleus or occurring in the nucleus. <i>Some cells had nucleated.</i>
<u>overload</u>	Become overloaded. <i>An overload of stress.</i>
<u>pack</u>	Load with a pack. <i>A pack of wolves will encircle an ailing prey.</i>
pile	Place or lay as if in a pile. <i>We all piled in and headed off to our mysterious destination.</i>
pileup	Multiple collisions of vehicles.
proton	A stable subatomic particle occurring in all atomic nuclei, with a positive electric charge equal in magnitude to that of an electron.
sheaf	A package of several things tied together for carrying or storing. <i>The corn and barley had to be sheafed and stooked.</i>
<u>stack</u>	Load or cover with stacks. <i>Stack your books up on the shelves.</i>
<u>stacked</u>	(of a task) placed in a queue for subsequent processing. <i>MIDI interface featuring stacked MIDI note numbers.</i>
ton	A unit of weight or volume of sea cargo equal to a metric ton 1 000 kg or 40 cu ft. <i>All of a sudden I had tons of friends.</i>
