- cluster** A group of stars or galaxies forming a relatively close association.

- collection** A sum of money raised during a church or charity collection.

- heap** An untidy collection of objects placed haphazardly on top of each other.

- hoard** An ancient store of coins or other valuable artefacts.

- lump** An abnormal protuberance or localized enlargement.

- mass** A sequence of prayers constituting the Christian Eucharistic rite.
*Seaside towns that catered for the **masses**.*
- pile** A large amount of something.
*He s making **piles** of money.*
- quantity** The figure or symbol representing a quantity.
*He had a **quantity** of ammunition.*
- stack** A set of storage locations that store data in such a way that the most recently stored item is the first to be retrieved.
*There s **stacks** of work for me now.*
- stockpile** Something kept back or saved for future use or a special purpose.
*A **stockpile** of nuclear weapons.*
- store** A quantity or supply of something kept for use as needed.
*A grain **store**.*

accrete	Grow together (of plants and organs). <i>The collection of art he had accreted was to be sold.</i>
accumulate	Gradually gather or acquire (a resulting whole). <i>Investigators have yet to accumulate enough evidence.</i>
accumulation	A mass or quantity of something that has gradually gathered or been acquired. <i>The accumulation of wealth.</i>
agglomerate	Collected or formed into a mass. <i>A multimedia agglomerate.</i>
amass	Gather together or accumulate (a large amount or number of material or things) over a period of time. <i>He amassed a fortune estimated at close to a million pounds.</i>
assemble	Collect in one place. <i>A crowd had assembled outside the gates.</i>
bundle	Make into a bundle. <i>He was bundled into a van.</i>
caisson	A chest or wagon for holding or conveying ammunition.
cluster	Gather or cause to gather into a cluster. <i>Noble metal clusters supported on an acidic carrier.</i>
collect	Gather or collect. <i>A small crowd collected at the back door.</i>
collection	A sum of money raised during a church or charity collection. <i>She left the envelope in the office for collection.</i>
compost	Make vegetable matter or manure into compost. <i>Peat free composts.</i>
cumulate	An igneous rock formed by gravitational settling of particles in a magma. <i>The systems cumulate data over a period of years.</i>
deposition	The action of depositing something. <i>The deposition of four expert witnesses.</i>
flock	Come together as in a cluster or flock. <i>Tourists flocked to the shrine where the statue was said to have shed tears.</i>
gather	Collect or gather. <i>She gathered her shawl around her shoulders.</i>

heap	Put objects or a loose substance in a heap. <i>How do you like Maggie I like you heaps better.</i>
hoard	Save up as for future use. <i>Thousands of antiques hoarded by a compulsive collector.</i>
jam	A hold obtained by jamming a part of the body such as a hand or foot into a crack in the rock. <i>The mechanism jammed.</i>
load	Of a ship or vehicle take on a load. <i>The system broke down under excessive loads.</i>
nucleate	Having a nucleus or occurring in the nucleus. <i>Some cells had nucleated.</i>
overload	Become overloaded. <i>An overload of stress.</i>
pack	Load with a pack. <i>A pack of wolves will encircle an ailing prey.</i>
pile	Place or lay as if in a pile. <i>We all piled in and headed off to our mysterious destination.</i>
pileup	Multiple collisions of vehicles.
proton	A stable subatomic particle occurring in all atomic nuclei, with a positive electric charge equal in magnitude to that of an electron.
sheaf	A package of several things tied together for carrying or storing. <i>The corn and barley had to be sheafed and stooked.</i>
stack	Load or cover with stacks. <i>Stack your books up on the shelves.</i>
stacked	(of a task) placed in a queue for subsequent processing. <i>MIDI interface featuring stacked MIDI note numbers.</i>
ton	A unit of weight or volume of sea cargo equal to a metric ton 1 000 kg or 40 cu ft. <i>All of a sudden I had tons of friends.</i>
