Definitions of "Agonized" as an adjective

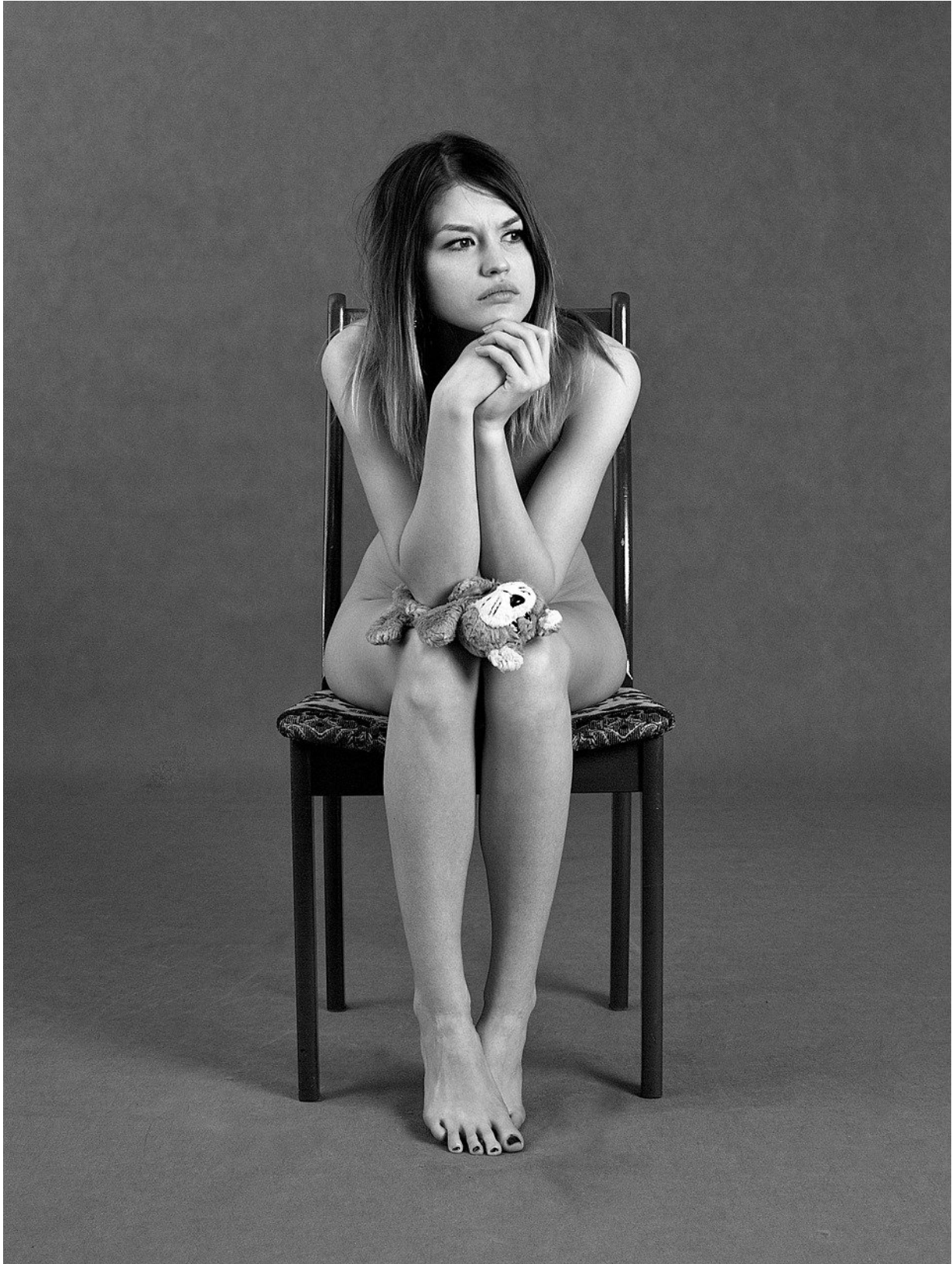
According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “agonized” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

<u>adversity</u>	A state of misfortune or affliction. <i>Resilience in the face of adversity.</i>
ail	Aromatic bulb used as seasoning. <i>Exercise is good for whatever ails one.</i>
<u>anguish</u>	Cause emotional anguish or make miserable. <i>Philip gave a cry of anguish.</i>
<u>deadlock</u>	Secure a door with a deadlock. <i>The meeting is deadlocked.</i>
difficulty	The state or condition of being difficult. <i>They agreed about the difficulty of the climb.</i>
<u>dilemma</u>	A situation in which a difficult choice has to be made between two or more alternatives, especially ones that are equally undesirable. <i>The insoluble dilemma of adolescence.</i>
<u>discomfort</u>	A state of unease, worry, or embarrassment. <i>He appeared to be discomforted by the questioning.</i>
distress	Bring into difficulties or distress especially financial hardship. <i>A ship in distress.</i>
earache	Pain inside the ear. <i>A child complaining of an earache.</i>
<u>halt</u>	Come to a halt stop moving. <i>There is growing pressure to halt the bloodshed.</i>
hardship	Severe suffering or privation. <i>The many hardships of frontier life.</i>
headache	Pain in the head caused by dilation of cerebral arteries or muscle contractions or a reaction to drugs. <i>An administrative headache.</i>
<u>impasse</u>	A situation in which no progress is possible, especially because of disagreement; a deadlock. <i>Reached an impasse on the negotiations.</i>
<u>needy</u>	Needy people collectively. <i>Those from needy backgrounds.</i>
<u>oppression</u>	The state of being subject to oppressive treatment. <i>A region shattered by oppression and killing.</i>
pain	Cause mental or physical pain to. <i>Her legs had been paining her.</i>

<u>plight</u>	A dangerous, difficult, or otherwise unfortunate situation. <i>The woeful plight of homeless people.</i>
predicament	(in Aristotelian logic) each of the ten 'categories', often listed as: substance or being, quantity, quality, relation, place, time, posture, having or possession, action, and passion. <i>Finds himself in a most awkward predicament.</i>
problem	An inquiry starting from given conditions to investigate or demonstrate a fact, result, or law. <i>What s the problem.</i>
problematic	Open to doubt or debate. <i>The problematics of artificial intelligence.</i>
<u>puzzled</u>	Filled with bewilderment. <i>Puzzled that she left without saying goodbye.</i>
<u>quandary</u>	A situation from which extrication is difficult especially an unpleasant or trying one. <i>Kate was in a quandary.</i>
<u>stalemate</u>	Bring to or cause to reach stalemate. <i>The war had again reached stalemate.</i>
standstill	A situation or condition in which there is no movement or activity at all. <i>The traffic came to a standstill.</i>
suffering	Psychological suffering. <i>Suffering refugees.</i>
<u>throb</u>	Tremble convulsively, as from fear or excitement. <i>The crowded streets throbbed with life.</i>
toothache	Pain in a tooth or teeth. <i>I ve got toothache.</i>
trouble	Take the trouble to do something concern oneself. <i>She was too concerned with her own feelings to trouble about Clare s.</i>
unaccustomed	Not familiar or usual; out of the ordinary. <i>They finished their supper with unaccustomed speed.</i>
unpleasantness	The feeling caused by disagreeable stimuli; one pole of a continuum of states of feeling. <i>She hated unpleasantness though she wouldn t back down from a fight.</i>
