| <b>distress</b>          | Bring into difficulties or distress especially financial hardship.<br><i>A ship in <b>distress</b>.</i>   |
| <b>earache</b>           | Pain inside the ear.<br><i>A child complaining of an <b>earache</b>.</i>  |
| <b><u>halt</u></b>       | Come to a halt stop moving.<br><i>There is growing pressure to <b>halt</b> the bloodshed.</i>   |
| <b>hardship</b>          | Severe suffering or privation.<br><i>The many <b>hardships</b> of frontier life.</i>  |
| <b>headache</b>          | Pain in the head caused by dilation of cerebral arteries or muscle contractions or a reaction to drugs.<br><i>An administrative <b>headache</b>.</i>  |
| <b><u>impasse</u></b>    | A situation in which no progress is possible, especially because of disagreement; a deadlock.<br><i>Reached an <b>impasse</b> on the negotiations.</i>  |
| <b><u>needy</u></b>      | Needy people collectively.<br><i>Those from <b>needy</b> backgrounds.</i>   |
| <b><u>oppression</u></b> | The state of being subject to oppressive treatment.<br><i>A region shattered by <b>oppression</b> and killing.</i>  |
| <b>pain</b>              | Cause mental or physical pain to.<br><i>Her legs had been <b>paining</b> her.</i>   |

| <b><u>plight</u></b>    | A dangerous, difficult, or otherwise unfortunate situation.<br><i>The woeful <b>plight</b> of homeless people.</i>   |
| <b>predicament</b>      | (in Aristotelian logic) each of the ten 'categories', often listed as: substance or being, quantity, quality, relation, place, time, posture, having or possession, action, and passion.<br><i>Finds himself in a most awkward <b>predicament</b>.</i> |
| <b>problem</b>          | An inquiry starting from given conditions to investigate or demonstrate a fact, result, or law.<br><i>What s the <b>problem</b>.</i>   |
| <b>problematic</b>      | Open to doubt or debate.<br><i>The <b>problematics</b> of artificial intelligence.</i>   |
| <b><u>puzzled</u></b>   | Filled with bewilderment.<br><i><b>Puzzled</b> that she left without saying goodbye.</i>   |
| <b><u>quandary</u></b>  | A situation from which extrication is difficult especially an unpleasant or trying one.<br><i>Kate was in a <b>quandary</b>.</i>   |
| <b><u>stalemate</u></b> | Bring to or cause to reach stalemate.<br><i>The war had again reached <b>stalemate</b>.</i>  |
| <b>standstill</b>       | A situation or condition in which there is no movement or activity at all.<br><i>The traffic came to a <b>standstill</b>.</i>  |
| <b>suffering</b>        | Psychological suffering.<br><i><b>Suffering</b> refugees.</i>  |
| <b><u>throb</u></b>     | Tremble convulsively, as from fear or excitement.<br><i>The crowded streets <b>throbbed</b> with life.</i>   |
| <b>toothache</b>        | Pain in a tooth or teeth.<br><i>I ve got <b>toothache</b>.</i>   |
| <b>trouble</b>          | Take the trouble to do something concern oneself.<br><i>She was too concerned with her own feelings to <b>trouble</b> about Clare s.</i>   |
| <b>unaccustomed</b>     | Not familiar or usual; out of the ordinary.<br><i>They finished their supper with <b>unaccustomed</b> speed.</i>   |
