Definitions of "Agony" as a noun

- A state of acute pain.
- Intense feelings of suffering; acute mental or physical pain.
- The final stages of a difficult or painful death.
- Extreme physical or mental suffering.





Synonyms of "Agony" as a noun (9 Words)

affliction A cause of pain or harm.

A crippling **affliction** of the nervous system.

Severe mental or physical pain or suffering.

She shut her eyes in **anguish**.

excruciation The infliction of extremely painful punishment or suffering.

hurt Emotional pain or distress.

Her eyes reflected her unhappiness and **hurt**.

pain Great care or trouble.

As the intensity increased the sensation changed from tickle to **pain**.

suffering Psychological suffering.

Weapons that cause unnecessary **suffering**.

torment A feeling of intense annoyance caused by being tormented.

The **torment**s of the damned.



torture Great physical or mental suffering or anxiety.

Dances were absolute **torture** because I was so small.

Any physical damage to the body caused by violence or accident or fracture

<u>trauma</u> etc

Rupture of the diaphragm caused by blunt trauma.



Usage Examples of "Agony" as a noun

- An agony of doubt.
- He crashed to the ground in agony.
- His last agony.





Associations of "Agony" (30 Words)

affliction An instance of one celestial body afflicting another.

A crippling **affliction** of the nervous system.

agonize Cause to agonize.

I didn t **agonize** over the problem.

Cause emotional anguish or make miserable.

anguish I spent the next two weeks **anguish**ing about whether I d made the right

decision.

annoyed Aroused to impatience or anger.

Kelly was annoyed with him.

cruelly Excessively.

He marries Edgar s sister Isabella and cruelly ill treats her.

distortion Heavy metal guitar players use vacuum tube amplifiers to produce

extreme distortion.

distress Bring into difficulties or distress especially financial hardship.

They said the baby was in **distress**.

dolor Painful grief.

dun Make a dun color.

The grocer **dun**ned his customers every day by telephone.

Make a grimace.

She made a **grimace** at the prospect.

harass Annoy continually or chronically.

Being **harass**ed at work can leave you feeling confused and helpless.

harassment The act of tormenting by continued persistent attacks and criticism.

So great was his **harassment** that he wanted to destroy his tormentors.

headache A continuous pain in the head.

She complained of a severe **headache**.

heavinessThe property of being comparatively great in weight.

The **heaviness** of the dark wood panelling.

hypochondriac A person who is abnormally anxious about their health.

inflict Impose something unwelcome on.

She is wrong to **inflict** *her beliefs on everyone else.*

A state of ill-being due to affliction or misfortune.

She was exhausted by her **misery** and grief.

mistreat Treat (a person or animal) badly, cruelly, or unfairly.

He denied **mistreat**ing his workers.

Cause mental or physical pain to.

She took pains to see that everyone ate well.

Cause to suffer.

Some religious groups are **persecute**d in some countries.

Give a decorative effect to a painted surface by applying paint typically of

Not a **rag** of clothing has arrived to us this winter.

relentlessly

In an unceasingly intense or harsh way.

He was being bullied **relentlessly** at school.

The quality of excessive mournfulness and uncheerfulness.

It is one of life s **sadness**es.



suffering Psychological suffering.

His disregard for the **suffering**s of his fellow countrymen.

throb Beat or sound with a strong, regular rhythm; pulsate steadily.

Her foot **throb**bed with pain.

toothache An ache localized in or around a tooth. *I ve got toothache*.

torment A feeling of intense annoyance caused by being tormented.

The **torment**s of the damned.

torture Subject to torture.

Most of the victims had been brutally **torture**d.

woe Misery resulting from affliction.

To add to his **woe**s customers have been spending less.

wretchedness A state of ill-being due to affliction or misfortune.

The misery and **wretchedness** of those slums is intolerable.
