- Extreme physical or mental suffering.





## Synonyms of "Agony" as a noun (9 Words)

affliction	A cause of pain or harm. A crippling <b>affliction</b> of the nervous system.
<u>anguish</u>	Severe mental or physical pain or suffering. She shut her eyes in <b>anguish</b> .
excruciation	The infliction of extremely painful punishment or suffering.
hurt	Emotional pain or distress. Her eyes reflected her unhappiness and <b>hurt</b> .
pain	Great care or trouble. As the intensity increased the sensation changed from tickle to <b>pain</b> .
suffering	Psychological suffering. Weapons that cause unnecessary <b>suffering</b> .
torment	A feeling of intense annoyance caused by being tormented. <i>The torments of the damned.</i>



tortureGreat physical or mental suffering or anxiety.<br/>Dances were absolute torture because I was so small.traumaAny physical damage to the body caused by violence or accident or fracture<br/>etc.<br/>Rupture of the diaphragm caused by blunt trauma.

# Associations of "Agony" (30 Words)

affliction	An instance of one celestial body afflicting another. A crippling <b>affliction</b> of the nervous system.
agonize	Cause to agonize. I didn t <b>agonize</b> over the problem.
<u>anguish</u>	Cause emotional anguish or make miserable. I spent the next two weeks <b>anguish</b> ing about whether I d made the right decision.
annoyed	Aroused to impatience or anger. Kelly was <b>annoyed</b> with him.
cruelly	Excessively. He marries Edgar s sister Isabella and <b>cruelly</b> ill treats her.



distortion	A shape resulting from distortion. <i>Heavy metal guitar players use vacuum tube amplifiers to produce</i> <i>extreme</i> <b>distortion</b> .
distress	Bring into difficulties or distress especially financial hardship. They said the baby was in <b>distress</b> .
dolor	Painful grief.
dun	Make a dun color. The grocer <b>dun</b> ned his customers every day by telephone.
<u>grimace</u>	Make a grimace. She made a <b>grimace</b> at the prospect.
<u>harass</u>	Annoy continually or chronically. Being <b>harass</b> ed at work can leave you feeling confused and helpless.
<u>harassment</u>	The act of tormenting by continued persistent attacks and criticism. So great was his <b>harassment</b> that he wanted to destroy his tormentors.
headache	A continuous pain in the head. She complained of a severe <b>headache</b> .
heaviness	The property of being comparatively great in weight. The <b>heaviness</b> of the dark wood panelling.
hypochondriad	A person who is abnormally anxious about their health.
<u>inflict</u>	Impose something unwelcome on. She is wrong to <b>inflict</b> her beliefs on everyone else.
<u>misery</u>	A state of ill-being due to affliction or misfortune. She was exhausted by her <b>misery</b> and grief.
<u>mistreat</u>	Treat (a person or animal) badly, cruelly, or unfairly. <i>He denied <b>mistreat</b>ing his workers.</i>
pain	Cause mental or physical pain to. She took <b>pain</b> s to see that everyone ate well.
persecute	Cause to suffer. Some religious groups are <b>persecute</b> d in some countries.
rag	Give a decorative effect to a painted surface by applying paint typically of a different colour with a rag. Not a <b>rag</b> of clothing has arrived to us this winter.
relentlessly	In an unceasingly intense or harsh way. He was being bullied <b>relentlessly</b> at school.
sadness	The quality of excessive mournfulness and uncheerfulness. It is one of life s <b>sadness</b> es.



suffering	Psychological suffering. His disregard for the <b>suffering</b> s of his fellow countrymen.
<u>throb</u>	Beat or sound with a strong, regular rhythm; pulsate steadily. <i>Her foot <b>throb</b>bed with pain.</i>
toothache	An ache localized in or around a tooth. I ve got <b>toothache</b> .
torment	A feeling of intense annoyance caused by being tormented. <i>The <b>torment</b>s of the damned</i> .
<u>torture</u>	Subject to torture. Most of the victims had been brutally <b>torture</b> d.
woe	Misery resulting from affliction. To add to his <b>woe</b> s customers have been spending less.
wretchedness	A state of ill-being due to affliction or misfortune. The misery and <b>wretchedness</b> of those slums is intolerable
