appealing	Able to attract interest or draw favorable attention- Vincent Starrett. <i>He added an appealing and memorable figure to popular American mythology.</i>
average	Relating to or constituting the middle value of an ordered set of values or the average of the middle two in a set with an even number of values. <i>Of average height for his age.</i>
benevolent	Generous in providing aid to others. <i>A benevolent fund.</i>
<u>benign</u>	(of a climate or environment) mild and favourable. <i>His benign but firm manner.</i>
<u>charming</u>	Very pleasant or attractive. <i>A charming little cottage.</i>
complaisant	Showing a cheerful willingness to do favors for others. <i>To close one's eyes like a complaisant husband whose wife has taken a lover.</i>
compliant	Inclined to comply. <i>Food that is compliant with safety regulations.</i>
concordant	In harmony. <i>The answers were roughly concordant.</i>

conformable	Similar in form or nature; consistent. <i>Personalities conformable to the ambient level of cultural evolution.</i>
congenial	(of a person) pleasing or liked on account of having qualities or interests that are similar to one's own. <i>His need for some congenial company.</i>
consenting	Having given consent. <i>Consenting adults.</i>
consonant	Denoting or relating to a consonant. <i>The bass is consonant with all the upper notes.</i>
delightful	Greatly pleasing or entertaining. <i>A delightful secluded garden.</i>
disposed	Naturally disposed toward. <i>James didn't seem disposed to take the hint.</i>
engaging	Attracting or delighting. <i>An engaging frankness.</i>
enjoyable	Affording satisfaction or pleasure. <i>They had an enjoyable afternoon.</i>
fair	Free from favoritism or self-interest or bias or deception; conforming with established standards or rules. <i>Today will be fair and warm.</i>
fine	Characterized by elegance or refinement or accomplishment. <i>A fine distinction.</i>
friendly	Not seriously or unpleasantly competitive or divisive. <i>A reader friendly novel.</i>
genial	Of or relating to the chin or median part of the lower jaw. <i>Our genial host.</i>
good	Deserving of esteem and respect. <i>Gave the house a good cleaning.</i>
good enough	Capable of pleasing.
good-natured	Having an easygoing and cheerful disposition.
in accord	Directed or bound inward.
in agreement	Directed or bound inward.
likeable	(especially of a person) pleasant, friendly, and easy to like. <i>A very likeable young woman.</i>
nice	(of a person) good-natured; kind. <i>A job requiring nice measurements with a micrometer.</i>

obliging	Showing a cheerful willingness to do favors for others. <i>One of the most obliging stewards.</i>
passable	Just good enough to be acceptable; satisfactory. <i>He spoke passable English.</i>
<u>pleasant</u>	Affording pleasure; being in harmony with your taste or likings. <i>A very pleasant evening.</i>
pleasing	Giving pleasure and satisfaction. <i>A pleasing piece of news.</i>
<u>pleasurable</u>	Affording satisfaction or pleasure. <i>Pleasurable activities.</i>
reasonable	Fairly good; average. <i>Man is by nature reasonable.</i>
<u>satisfactory</u>	Meeting requirements. <i>He didn't get a satisfactory answer.</i>
<u>satisfying</u>	Providing abundant nourishment. <i>These are very satisfying books.</i>
<u>sociable</u>	Inclined to or conducive to companionship with others. <i>Americans are sociable and gregarious.</i>
<u>suitable</u>	Worthy of being chosen especially as a spouse. <i>The parents found the girl suitable for their son.</i>
<u>sympathetic</u>	Relating to or denoting the part of the autonomic nervous system consisting of nerves arising from ganglia near the middle part of the spinal cord supplying the internal organs blood vessels and glands and balancing the action of the parasympathetic nerves. <i>Sympathetic neurons.</i>
<u>tolerable</u>	Able to be endured. <i>The climate is at least tolerable.</i>
<u>tractable</u>	(of a situation or problem) easy to deal with. <i>A tractable student.</i>
up to par	Used up.
up to scratch	Getting higher or more vigorous.
up to standard	Used up.
up to the mark	Operating properly.
<u>willing</u>	Not brought about by coercion or force. <i>He was quite willing to compromise.</i>

happiness	State of well-being characterized by emotions ranging from contentment to intense joy. <i>Tom's heart swelled with happiness.</i>
happy	Satisfied with the quality or standard of. <i>They tended to be happy.</i>
joy	A thing that causes joy. <i>I felt shame that I had ever joyed in his discomfiture or pain.</i>
joyful	Full of or producing joy. <i>A joyful occasion.</i>
laughing	Showing or feeling mirth or pleasure or happiness. <i>Laughing children.</i>
