<b>average</b>	Relating to or constituting the middle value of an ordered set of values or the average of the middle two in a set with an even number of values. <i>Of <b>average</b> height for his age.</i>
<b>benevolent</b>	Generous in providing aid to others. <i>A <b>benevolent</b> fund.</i>
<b><u>benign</u></b>	(of a climate or environment) mild and favourable. <i>His <b>benign</b> but firm manner.</i>
<b><u>charming</u></b>	Very pleasant or attractive. <i>A <b>charming</b> little cottage.</i>
<b>complaisant</b>	Showing a cheerful willingness to do favors for others. <i>To close one's eyes like a <b>complaisant</b> husband whose wife has taken a lover.</i>
<b>compliant</b>	Inclined to comply. <i>Food that is <b>compliant</b> with safety regulations.</i>
<b>concordant</b>	In harmony. <i>The answers were roughly <b>concordant</b>.</i>

<b>conformable</b>	Similar in form or nature; consistent. <i>Personalities <b>conformable</b> to the ambient level of cultural evolution.</i>
<b>congenial</b>	(of a person) pleasing or liked on account of having qualities or interests that are similar to one's own. <i>His need for some <b>congenial</b> company.</i>
<b>consenting</b>	Having given consent. <i><b>Consenting</b> adults.</i>
<b>consonant</b>	Denoting or relating to a consonant. <i>The bass is <b>consonant</b> with all the upper notes.</i>
<b>delightful</b>	Greatly pleasing or entertaining. <i>A <b>delightful</b> secluded garden.</i>
<b>disposed</b>	Naturally disposed toward. <i>James didn't seem <b>disposed</b> to take the hint.</i>
<b>engaging</b>	Attracting or delighting. <i>An <b>engaging</b> frankness.</i>

<b>friendly</b>	Not seriously or unpleasantly competitive or divisive. <i>A reader <b>friendly</b> novel.</i>
<b>genial</b>	Of or relating to the chin or median part of the lower jaw. <i>Our <b>genial</b> host.</i>
<b>good</b>	Deserving of esteem and respect. <i>Gave the house a <b>good</b> cleaning.</i>
<b>good enough</b>	Capable of pleasing.
<b>good-natured</b>	Having an easygoing and cheerful disposition.
<b>in accord</b>	Directed or bound inward.
<b>in agreement</b>	Directed or bound inward.
<b>likeable</b>	(especially of a person) pleasant, friendly, and easy to like. <i>A very <b>likeable</b> young woman.</i>
<b>nice</b>	(of a person) good-natured; kind. <i>A job requiring <b>nice</b> measurements with a micrometer.</i>

<b>obliging</b>	Showing a cheerful willingness to do favors for others. <i>One of the most <b>obliging</b> stewards.</i>
<b>passable</b>	Just good enough to be acceptable; satisfactory. <i>He spoke <b>passable</b> English.</i>
<u><b>pleasant</b></u>	Affording pleasure; being in harmony with your taste or likings. <i>A very <b>pleasant</b> evening.</i>
<b>pleasing</b>	Giving pleasure and satisfaction. <i>A <b>pleasing</b> piece of news.</i>
