| <b>purpose</b>            | The quality of being determined to do or achieve something firmness of purpose.<br><i>There was a new sense of <b>purpose</b> in her step as she set off.</i>                 |
| <b>purposeful</b>         | Intentional.<br><i>If his sudden death was not accidental it must have been <b>purposeful</b>.</i>                                                                            |
| <b>purposely</b>          | On purpose; intentionally.<br><i>She had <b>purposely</b> made it difficult.</i>                                                                                              |
| <b>purposive</b>          | Having or showing or acting with a purpose or design.<br><b>Purposive</b> behavior.                                                                                           |
| <b>reconfirm</b>          | Confirm again.<br><i>Berghofer resigned but was <b>reconfirmed</b> as mayor of Dresden shortly afterwards.</i>                                                                |
| <b>skillfully</b>         | With skill.<br><i>Fragments of a nearly complete jug <b>skillfully</b> restored at the institute of archaeology.</i>                                                          |
| <b>squarely</b>           | In a direct and uncompromising manner.<br><i>The responsibility lies <b>squarely</b> with them.</i>                                                                           |
| <b><u>target</u></b>      | The location of the target that is to be hit.<br><i>They were the <b>target</b> for a wave of abuse from the press.</i>                                                       |
