Associations of "Aiming" (30 Words)

accusatory	Containing or expressing accusation- O.Henry. <i>He pointed an accusatory finger in her direction.</i>
aimless	Aimlessly drifting. <i>An aimless existence.</i>
animus	A feeling of ill will arousing active hostility. <i>The reformist animus came from within the Party.</i>
aspiration	A hope or ambition of achieving something. <i>Bathing solutions were changed by careful aspiration.</i>
deliberately	In a careful and unhurried way. <i>She was working deliberately.</i>
designed	Done or made or performed with purpose and intent. <i>Style is more than the deliberate and designed creation.</i>
goal	An instance of sending the ball into or over the goal especially as a unit of scoring in a game. <i>He achieved his goal of becoming King of England.</i>
heading	A horizontal passage made in preparation for building a tunnel. <i>He crawled on a heading of 90 degrees until he came to the track.</i>
impersonal	(of a verb) used only with a formal subject (in English usually it) and expressing an action not attributable to a definite subject (as in it is snowing). <i>An impersonal tower block.</i>
incriminate	Bring an accusation against; level a charge against. <i>He refused to answer questions in order not to incriminate himself.</i>
intended	The person one intends to marry; one's fiancé or fiancée. <i>She used to be my intended.</i>
intent	Intention or purpose. <i>With alarm she realized his intent.</i>

<u>intention</u>	A thing intended; an aim or plan. <i>Good intentions are not enough.</i>
intentionality	Expressive of intentions.
knowingly	With full knowledge and deliberation. <i>Amy looked at me knowingly.</i>
mean	Mean or intend to express or convey. <i>They mean no harm.</i>
objective	The objective case. Objective evidence.
<u>opportunist</u>	Opportunistic. <i>Most burglaries are committed by casual opportunists.</i>
<u>propose</u>	Propose or intend. <i>Roy Thomson was proposed as chairman.</i>
<u>purport</u>	The pervading meaning or tenor. <i>The letter purports to express people s opinion.</i>
purpose	The quality of being determined to do or achieve something firmness of purpose. <i>There was a new sense of purpose in her step as she set off.</i>
purposeful	Intentional. <i>If his sudden death was not accidental it must have been purposeful.</i>
purposely	On purpose; intentionally. <i>She had purposely made it difficult.</i>
purposive	Having or showing or acting with a purpose or design. Purposive behavior.
reconfirm	Confirm again. <i>Berghofer resigned but was reconfirmed as mayor of Dresden shortly afterwards.</i>
skillfully	With skill. <i>Fragments of a nearly complete jug skillfully restored at the institute of archaeology.</i>
squarely	In a direct and uncompromising manner. <i>The responsibility lies squarely with them.</i>
<u>target</u>	The location of the target that is to be hit. <i>They were the target for a wave of abuse from the press.</i>
teleology	The explanation of phenomena in terms of the purpose they serve rather than of the cause by which they arise. <i>No theory of history can do without teleology.</i>
