### **Definitions of "Airborne" as an adjective**

- *Transported by air.*

**in flight** Currently fashionable.

**in the air** Currently fashionable.

## Associations of "Airborne" (30 Words)

<b>aeronaut</b>	A traveller in a hot-air balloon, airship, or other flying craft.
<b><a href="#">aircraft</a></b>	A vehicle that can fly.
<b>airman</b>	Someone who operates an aircraft.
<b><a href="#">airplane</a></b>	An aircraft that has a fixed wing and is powered by propellers or jets. <i>The flight was delayed due to trouble with the <b>airplane</b>.</i>
<b>airport</b>	Relating to or denoting light popular fiction such as is offered for sale to travellers in airports. <i>An <b>airport</b> thriller.</i>
<b>butterfly</b>	Flutter like a butterfly. <i>A <b>butterfly</b> clip.</i>

<b>cabin</b>	Confine to a small space such as a cabin. <i>She lay in her <b>cabin</b> on a steamer.</i>
<b>fledged</b>	(of a young bird) having wing feathers that are large enough for flight; able to fly. <i>A newly <b>fledged</b> Detective Inspector.</i>
<b>flight</b>	A formation of aircraft in flight. <i>The history of space <b>flight</b>.</i>
<b>fly</b>	Release a bird to fly especially a hawk for hunting or a pigeon for racing. <i>Rumors and accusations are <b>flying</b>.</i>
<b>flying</b>	Used in names of animals that can glide by using winglike membranes or other structures e.g flying squirrel. <i><b>Flying</b> was still an exciting adventure for him.</i>
<b>footloose</b>	Able to travel freely and do as one pleases due to a lack of responsibilities or commitments. <i>Americans have always been a <b>footloose</b> people always moving on.</i>
<b>hangar</b>	House an aircraft in a hangar. <i>The army choppers that were <b>hangared</b> out at Springs.</i>
<b>helicopter</b>	Transport by helicopter. <i>He was <b>helicoptered</b> out with a bleeding ulcer.</i>
<b>hover</b>	Be suspended in the air, as if in defiance of gravity. <i>Army helicopters <b>hovered</b> overhead.</i>
<b>immigrate</b>	Migrate to a new environment. <i>Many people <b>immigrated</b> at the beginning of the 20th century.</i>
<b>levitate</b>	Cause to rise in the air and float, as if in defiance of gravity. <i>I swear to God he <b>levitated</b> over the bar.</i>
<b>maneuverable</b>	Capable of maneuvering or changing position. <i>A highly <b>maneuverable</b> ship.</i>
<b>mobile</b>	Relating to mobile phones handheld computers and similar technology. <i>A cup of tea from the <b>mobile</b> canteen.</i>
<b>moth</b>	A clothes moth. <i>I store my sweaters in plastic bags to protect them from <b>moths</b>.</i>
<b>parachute</b>	Drop from an aircraft by parachute. <i>The saviour of many pilots has been the <b>parachute</b>.</i>
<b>paratrooper</b>	A soldier in the paratroops.
<b>pilot</b>	Be the pilot of an aircraft or ship. <i>Many expected him to get the job as Desert Orchid s <b>pilot</b>.</i>

<b>plane</b>	Cut or remove with or as if with a plane. <i><b>Plane</b> the top of the door.</i>
<b>pterodactyl</b>	A pterosaur of the late Jurassic period, with a long slender head and neck and a very short tail.
<b>sortie</b>	Come out from a defensive position to make an attack. <i>We ll soon know if they <b>sortie</b>.</i>
<b>terminal</b>	Suffering from or relating to a terminal disease. <i>Battery <b>terminals</b>.</i>
<b>volant</b>	With wings extended in a flying position. <i>Newly <b>volant</b> young.</i>
<b>wing</b>	The wing of a bird as food. <i>The convent was at some distance but fear would <b>wing</b> her steps.</i>
<b>winged</b>	Having wings or as if having wings of a specified kind. <i>On <b>winged</b> feet.</i>
