Synonyms of "Airtight" as an adjective (14 Words)

air-tight	Having no weak points.
closed	With shutters closed. <i>You re facing the situation with a closed mind.</i>
gas-tight	Not allowing air or gas to pass in or out.
impermeable	Not allowing fluid to pass through. <i>A coat impermeable to rain.</i>
incontestable	Incapable of being contested or disputed.

incontrovertible	Impossible to deny or disprove. <i>Incontrovertible proof.</i>
indisputable	Not open to question; obviously true. <i>A far from indisputable fact.</i>
irrefutable	Impossible to deny or disprove. <i>An irrefutable argument.</i>
sealed	(of walls) covered with a coat of plaster. <i>The package is still sealed.</i>
shut tight	Used especially of mouth or eyes.
tight	Pulled or drawn tight. <i>David was out of work and money was tight.</i>
unassailable	Immune to attack; incapable of being tampered with. <i>An unassailable lead.</i>
undeniable	Unable to be denied or disputed. <i>It is an undeniable fact that some dogs are easier to train than others.</i>
unquestionable	Not open to question. <i>Unquestionable authority.</i>

<u>definite</u>	(of a person) certain or sure about something. <i>You re very definite about that.</i>
<u>firmly</u>	Without doubt; definitely. <i>The council is firmly committed to raising standards in education.</i>
fixed	Fixed and unmoving Connor Cruise O Brien. <i>How s the club fixed for money now.</i>
full	Gather or pleat fabric so as to make a garment full. <i>A full range of sports facilities.</i>
hermetic	(of a seal or closure) complete and airtight. <i>Obscure and hermetic poems.</i>
hermetically	In a way that is completely airtight. <i>Hermetically sealed lives cut off from society.</i>
immobile	Incapable of moving or being moved. <i>She sat immobile for a long time.</i>
<u>irreversible</u>	Not able to be undone or altered. <i>Irreversible momentum toward revolution.</i>
loaded	Charged with associative significance and often meant to mislead or influence. <i>1989 Ford 250 LXT low miles loaded.</i>
<u>packed</u>	Pressed together or compressed. <i>A packed theater.</i>
perfect	Of a tense denoting a completed action or a state or habitual action which began in the past The perfect tense is formed in English with have or has and the past participle as in they have eaten and they have been eating present perfect they had eaten past perfect and they will have eaten future perfect. <i>The equipment was in perfect condition.</i>
seal	Affix a seal to. <i>The monarchy is the seal of the unbroached integrity of the Isles.</i>

<u>sealed</u>	Covered with a coat of plaster. <i>A sealed move in chess.</i>
<u>shut</u>	Move so that an opening or passage is obstructed make shut. <i>They ought to shut the path up to that terrible cliff.</i>
<u>stiff</u>	In a stiff manner. <i>They face stiff fines and a possible jail sentence.</i>
<u>sure</u>	Definitely or positively sure is sometimes used informally for surely. <i>A sure or trusted friend.</i>
<u>thorough</u>	Performed comprehensively and completely; not superficial or partial. <i>Planners need a thorough understanding of the subject.</i>
thoroughgoing	Exemplifying a specified characteristic fully; absolute. <i>A thoroughgoing chocoholic.</i>
tight	Pulled or drawn tight. <i>A tight parking spot.</i>
unmoving	Not stirring any emotion. <i>Claudia sat unmoving behind her desk.</i>
waterproof	Not permitting the passage of water. <i>She put on boots and a waterproof.</i>
