<b>gas-tight</b>	Not allowing air or gas to pass in or out.
<b>impermeable</b>	Not allowing fluid to pass through. <i>A coat <b>impermeable</b> to rain.</i>
<b>incontestable</b>	Incapable of being contested or disputed.

<b>tight</b>	Pulled or drawn tight. <i>David was out of work and money was <b>tight</b>.</i>
<b>unassailable</b>	Immune to attack; incapable of being tampered with. <i>An <b>unassailable</b> lead.</i>
<b>undeniable</b>	Unable to be denied or disputed. <i>It is an <b>undeniable</b> fact that some dogs are easier to train than others.</i>
<b>unquestionable</b>	Not open to question. <i><b>Unquestionable</b> authority.</i>

<b>fixed</b>	Fixed and unmoving Connor Cruise O Brien. <i>How s the club <b>fixed</b> for money now.</i>
<b>full</b>	Gather or pleat fabric so as to make a garment full. <i>A <b>full</b> range of sports facilities.</i>
<b>hermetic</b>	(of a seal or closure) complete and airtight. <i>Obscure and <b>hermetic</b> poems.</i>
<b>hermetically</b>	In a way that is completely airtight. <i><b>Hermetically</b> sealed lives cut off from society.</i>
<b>immobile</b>	Incapable of moving or being moved. <i>She sat <b>immobile</b> for a long time.</i>
