fright	A sudden intense feeling of fear. <i>I jumped up in fright.</i>
<u>horror</u>	Something that inspires horror something horrible. <i>The painting that others found so beautiful was a horror to him.</i>
<u>nervousness</u>	The quality or state of being nervous. <i>There was a trace of nervousness in his voice.</i>

<u>panic</u>	A state of widespread financial alarm provoking hasty action. <i>She hit him in panic.</i>
perturbation	A secondary influence on a system that causes it to deviate slightly. <i>Frank's atheism was more than a perturbation to Michael.</i>
shock	A sudden jarring impact. <i>The armies met in the shock of battle.</i>
<u>siren</u>	Eel-like aquatic North American salamander with small forelimbs and no hind limbs; have permanent external gills. <i>Ambulance sirens.</i>
terror	Terrorism. <i>Weapons of terror.</i>
<u>trepidation</u>	Trembling movements or motion. <i>The men set off in fear and trepidation.</i>
