Definitions of "Alerting" as a noun

- A state of readiness to respond.
- An automatic signal (usually a sound) warning of danger.





Synonyms of "Alerting" as a noun (2 Words)

alert A warning serves to make you more alert to danger. *Traffic was halted during the alert*.






Usage Examples of "Alerting" as a noun

Associations of "Alerting" (30 Words)

advised Having the benefit of careful prior consideration or counsel.

A well **advised** delay in carrying out the plan.

Paying close attention to something.

The hotel has a pleasant atmosphere and **attentive** service.

aware Bearing in mind; attentive to.

Became aware of her surroundings.

Be on one's guard; be cautious or wary about; be alert to.

We should **beware** the incompetence of legislators.

Careful Unhurried and with care and dignity.

A **careful** consideration of the facts.

carefully

In a way that deliberately avoids harm or errors; cautiously.

They must be **carefully** handled and stored.



People who are fearful and cautious.

Reserved and *cautious* never making swift decisions.

chary Cautiously or suspiciously reluctant to do something.

She had been **chary** of telling the whole truth.

circumspect Wary and unwilling to take risks.

Circumspect actions.

conscientious Guided by or in accordance with conscience or sense of right and wrong.

Conscientious application to the work at hand.

Knowing and perceiving; having awareness of surroundings and sensations

conscious and thoughts.

They were growing increasingly security **conscious**.

discreet Unobtrusively perceptive and sympathetic.

We made some **discreet** inquiries.

In a careful and prudent manner, especially in order to keep something

discreetly confidential or to avoid embarrassment.

She coughed discreetly.

forethought

Planning or plotting in advance of acting.

Jim had the **forethought** to book in advance.

heed Pay close attention to give heed to.

He spends without **heed** to the consequences.

measured Having a slow, regular rhythm.

She set off with **measured** tread.

Bearing in mind; attentive to.

mindful A **mindful** approach to life helps us to let go of the stress that often comes

with conflicts in relationships.

observant Adhering strictly to the rules of a particular religion, especially Judaism.

Observant of the speed limit.

perfunctoryDone or produced as a formality only.

Perfunctory courtesy.

A precautionary measure warding off impending danger or damage or

precaution injury etc.

He put an ice pack on the injury as a **precaution**.

The quality of being reproducible in amount or performance.

Note the meticulous **precision** of his measurements.

Acting with or showing care and thought for the future.

A prudent manager.



(of a person or process) careful, thorough, and extremely attentive to

scrupulous details.

Scrupulous attention to details.

Experiencing or accompanied by sleeplessness Shakespeare. sleepless

The **sleepless** river.

Full of anxiety and concern. solicitous

Solicitous about her health.

Taking heed giving close and thoughtful attention. thoughtful

How very **thoughtful** of you.

Not conspicuous or attracting attention. unobtrusive The service was **unobtrusive** and efficient.

Keeping careful watch for possible danger or difficulties. vigilant

The **vigilant** eye of the town watch.

Feeling or showing caution about possible dangers or problems. wary

A wary look.

Experiencing or accompanied by sleeplessness. watchful

They attended dances under the **watchful** eye of their father.
