Alerting as a Noun

Definitions of "Alerting" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “alerting” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A warning serves to make you more alert to danger.*
- *Condition of heightened watchfulness or preparation for action.*
- *A state of readiness to respond.*
- *An automatic signal (usually a sound) warning of danger.*



Synonyms of "Alerting" as a noun (2 Words)

- alert** A warning serves to make you more alert to danger.
*Traffic was halted during the **alert**.*
- alertness** The process of paying close and continuous attention.
*A lack of mental **alertness**.*



Usage Examples of "Alerting" as a noun

- *Alerting was indicated by the desynchronization of the EEG.*



Associations of "Alerting" (30 Words)

advised	Having the benefit of careful prior consideration or counsel. <i>A well advised delay in carrying out the plan.</i>
<u>attentive</u>	Paying close attention to something. <i>The hotel has a pleasant atmosphere and attentive service.</i>
aware	Bearing in mind; attentive to. <i>Became aware of her surroundings.</i>
<u>beware</u>	Be on one's guard; be cautious or wary about; be alert to. <i>We should beware the incompetence of legislators.</i>
<u>careful</u>	Unhurried and with care and dignity. <i>A careful consideration of the facts.</i>
carefully	In a way that deliberately avoids harm or errors; cautiously. <i>They must be carefully handled and stored.</i>

<u>cautious</u>	People who are fearful and cautious. <i>Reserved and cautious never making swift decisions.</i>
<u>chary</u>	Cautiously or suspiciously reluctant to do something. <i>She had been chary of telling the whole truth.</i>
circumspect	Wary and unwilling to take risks. <i>Circumspect</i> actions.
conscientious	Guided by or in accordance with conscience or sense of right and wrong. <i>Conscientious</i> application to the work at hand.
conscious	Knowing and perceiving; having awareness of surroundings and sensations and thoughts. <i>They were growing increasingly security conscious.</i>
<u>discreet</u>	Unobtrusively perceptive and sympathetic. <i>We made some discreet inquiries.</i>
<u>discreetly</u>	In a careful and prudent manner, especially in order to keep something confidential or to avoid embarrassment. <i>She coughed discreetly.</i>
forethought	Planning or plotting in advance of acting. <i>Jim had the forethought to book in advance.</i>
heed	Pay close attention to give heed to. <i>He spends without heed to the consequences.</i>
measured	Having a slow, regular rhythm. <i>She set off with measured tread.</i>
<u>mindful</u>	Bearing in mind; attentive to. <i>A mindful approach to life helps us to let go of the stress that often comes with conflicts in relationships.</i>
observant	Adhering strictly to the rules of a particular religion, especially Judaism. <i>Observant</i> of the speed limit.
<u>perfunctory</u>	Done or produced as a formality only. <i>Perfunctory</i> courtesy.
precaution	A precautionary measure warding off impending danger or damage or injury etc. <i>He put an ice pack on the injury as a precaution.</i>
<u>precision</u>	The quality of being reproducible in amount or performance. <i>Note the meticulous precision of his measurements.</i>
<u>prudent</u>	Acting with or showing care and thought for the future. <i>A prudent manager.</i>

scrupulous	(of a person or process) careful, thorough, and extremely attentive to details. <i>Scrupulous attention to details.</i>
sleepless	Experiencing or accompanied by sleeplessness Shakespeare. <i>The sleepless river.</i>
solicitous	Full of anxiety and concern. <i>Solicitous about her health.</i>
thoughtful	Taking heed giving close and thoughtful attention. <i>How very thoughtful of you.</i>
<u>unobtrusive</u>	Not conspicuous or attracting attention. <i>The service was unobtrusive and efficient.</i>
vigilant	Keeping careful watch for possible danger or difficulties. <i>The vigilant eye of the town watch.</i>
wary	Feeling or showing caution about possible dangers or problems. <i>A wary look.</i>
watchful	Experiencing or accompanied by sleeplessness. <i>They attended dances under the watchful eye of their father.</i>
