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Associations of "Alienating" (30 Words)

alienation	A state of depersonalization or loss of identity in which the self seems unreal, thought to be caused by difficulties in relating to society and the resulting prolonged inhibition of emotion. <i>Most leases contain restrictions against alienation.</i>
alone	Having no one else present. <i>It was a smile for him alone.</i>
antagonize	(of a substance) act as an antagonist of (a substance or its action). <i>Two other drugs antagonized the antidepressant like effect.</i>
complacent	Showing smug or uncritical satisfaction with oneself or one's achievements. <i>He had become complacent after years of success.</i>
detachment	Coming apart. <i>He felt a sense of detachment from what was going on.</i>
dissociate	Part; cease or break association with. <i>These compounds are dissociated by solar radiation to yield atoms of chlorine.</i>
divorce	Get a divorce formally terminate a marriage. <i>Her divorce from her first husband.</i>
estrangle	Cause (someone) to be no longer on friendly terms with someone. <i>Years of boarding school estranged the child from her home.</i>
estrangement	The feeling of being alienated from other people. <i>The growing estrangement of the police from their communities.</i>
insular	Relating to or from an island. <i>Insular illumination of the 6th century.</i>
isolate	A person or thing that has been or become isolated. <i>The governor urged residents to isolate to limit the spread of the virus.</i>
isolated	Marked by separation of or from usually contiguous elements. <i>An isolated pawn.</i>

<u>isolation</u>	A country's withdrawal from international politics. <i>He opposed a policy of American isolation.</i>
loneliness	Sadness resulting from being forsaken or abandoned. <i>The loneliness of the farm.</i>
partition	The act of dividing or partitioning separation by the creation of a boundary that divides or keeps apart. <i>The hall was partitioned to contain the noise of the computers.</i>
<u>quarantine</u>	Place a person or animal in quarantine in order to prevent the spread of an infectious disease. <i>Quarantine laws.</i>
<u>remote</u>	A remote control device. <i>A remote contingency.</i>
schism	Division of a group into opposing factions. <i>Another schism like that and they will wind up in bankruptcy.</i>
seclude	Keep away from others. <i>I secluded myself up here for a life of study and meditation.</i>
<u>secluded</u>	(of a place) not seen or visited by many people; sheltered and private. <i>The gardens are quiet and secluded.</i>
seclusion	The quality of being secluded from the presence or view of others. <i>They enjoyed ten days of peace and seclusion.</i>
<u>segregate</u>	Someone who is or has been segregated. <i>The sun segregates the carbon.</i>
segregation	The separation of paired alleles during meiosis so that members of each pair of alleles appear in different gametes. <i>An official policy of racial segregation.</i>
separate	A separately printed article that originally appeared in a larger publication. <i>The friends separated after the party.</i>
<u>separation</u>	The division of something into constituent or distinct elements. <i>The separation of church and state.</i>
<u>sequester</u>	Set apart from others. <i>The organic sequestering agent EDTA.</i>
severance	Division by cutting or slicing. <i>Employees were offered severance terms.</i>
<u>sole</u>	Put a new sole on to a shoe. <i>Sole the shoes.</i>

solitude

A state of social isolation.

*She savoured her few hours of freedom and **solitude**.*

underpopulated

Having a lower population density than normal or desirable.

*The rocky and **underpopulated** west coast.*
