## **Alienation as a Noun**

### **Definitions of "Alienation" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “alienation” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *(law) the voluntary and absolute transfer of title and possession of real property from one person to another.*
- *Separation resulting from hostility.*
- *The state or experience of being alienated.*
- *(in Marxist theory) a condition of workers in a capitalist economy, resulting from a lack of identity with the products of their labour and a sense of being controlled or exploited.*
- *A state of depersonalization or loss of identity in which the self seems unreal, thought to be caused by difficulties in relating to society and the resulting prolonged inhibition of emotion.*
- *The transfer of the ownership of property rights.*
- *The voluntary and absolute transfer of title and possession of real property from one person to another.*
- *An effect sought by some dramatists, whereby the audience remains objective and*

*does not identify with the actors.*

- *The feeling of being alienated from other people.*
- *The action of alienating; the action of causing to become unfriendly.*

<b>conveyance</b>	The action of making an idea, feeling, or impression known or understandable to someone. <i>A busy centre for the <b>conveyance</b> of agricultural produce from the Billingshurst area.</i>
<b>cutting off</b>	The act of diluting something.
<b>detachment</b>	Coming apart. <i>He felt a sense of <b>detachment</b> from what was going on.</i>

<b>devolution</b>	The process of declining from a higher to a lower level of effective power or vitality or essential quality. <i>The <b>devolution</b> of the gentlemanly ideal into a glorification of drunkenness.</i>
<b>disaffection</b>	Disloyalty to the government or to established authority. <i>The widespread <b>disaffection</b> of the troops.</i>
<b><u>distance</u></b>	The distance from the winning post which a horse must have reached when the winner finishes in order to qualify for a subsequent heat. <i>He stormed home by a <b>distance</b> in the Handicap Chase.</i>
<b>division</b>	Biology a group of organisms forming a subdivision of a larger category. <i>A growing sense of <b>division</b> between north and south.</i>
<b><u>divorce</u></b>	The legal dissolution of a marriage. <i>Her <b>divorce</b> from her first husband.</i>
<b><u>estrangement</u></b>	The fact of no longer living with one's spouse or partner; separation. <i>A parent's rights in the event of divorce or <b>estrangement</b>.</i>
<b>handing over</b>	The cards held in a card game by a given player at any given time.
<b><u>isolation</u></b>	A state of separation between persons or groups. <i><b>Isolation</b> from family and friends may also contribute to anxiety.</i>
<b>parting</b>	The act of departing politely. <i>His hair was dark with a side <b>parting</b>.</i>
<b>passing on</b>	The end of something.
<b><u>separation</u></b>	The distance between things. <i>The <b>separation</b> of church and state.</i>
<b>severance</b>	The action of ending a connection or relationship. <i>The <b>severance</b> and disestablishment of the Irish Church.</i>
<b>transfer</b>	A small coloured picture or design on paper which can be transferred to another surface by being pressed or heated. <i>A <b>transfer</b> of wealth to the EU's poorer nations.</i>
<b>turning away</b>	The act of turning away or in the opposite direction.
<b>withdrawal</b>	The act of withdrawing. <i>The nurse was expert at the <b>withdrawal</b> of blood.</i>

## Associations of "Alienation" (30 Words)

<b><u>alienate</u></b>	Transfer ownership of (property rights) to another person or group. <i>An urban environment which would <b>alienate</b> its inhabitants.</i>
<b>alone</b>	Having no help or participation from others. <i>Cannot live by bread <b>alone</b>.</i>
<b><u>antagonize</u></b>	Cause (someone) to become hostile or angry. <i>Two other drugs <b>antagonized</b> the antidepressant like effect.</i>
<b><u>boredom</u></b>	The feeling of being bored by something tedious. <i>I ll die of <b>boredom</b> if I live that long.</i>
<b><u>complacent</u></b>	Contented to a fault with oneself or one's actions. <i>You can t afford to be <b>complacent</b> about security.</i>
<b><u>couple</u></b>	Connect (two electrical components) using electromagnetic induction, electrostatic charge, or an optical link. <i>Just a <b>couple</b> more questions.</i>
<b>detachment</b>	The state of being isolated or detached. <i>He felt a sense of <b>detachment</b> from what was going on.</i>

<b><u>dissociate</u></b>	Part; cease or break association with. <i>These compounds are <b>dissociated</b> by solar radiation to yield atoms of chlorine.</i>
<b><u>divorce</u></b>	Get a divorce formally terminate a marriage. <i>Her <b>divorce</b> from her first husband.</i>
<b>estrangle</b>	Cause (someone) to be no longer on friendly terms with someone. <i>He became <b>estranged</b> from his father.</i>
<b><u>estrangement</u></b>	The feeling of being alienated from other people. <i>A parent's rights in the event of divorce or <b>estrangement</b>.</i>
<b>insular</b>	Lacking contact with other people. <i>People living restricted and sometimes <b>insular</b> existences.</i>
<b>isolate</b>	A culture of microorganisms isolated for study. <i>Social <b>isolates</b> often become careless of their own welfare.</i>
<b>isolated</b>	Under forced isolation especially for health reasons. <i><b>Isolated</b> incidents of student unrest.</i>
<b><u>isolation</u></b>	An instance of isolating something, especially a compound or microorganism. <i><b>Isolation</b> from family and friends may also contribute to anxiety.</i>
<b>loneliness</b>	The state of being alone in solitary isolation. <i>Feelings of depression and <b>loneliness</b>.</i>
<b><u>privacy</u></b>	A state in which one is not observed or disturbed by other people. <i>She returned to the <b>privacy</b> of her own home.</i>
<b><u>quarantine</u></b>	Place a person or animal in quarantine in order to prevent the spread of an infectious disease. <i>I <b>quarantine</b> all new fish for one month.</i>
<b><u>remote</u></b>	A remote control device. <i>Chances of a lasting peace became even more <b>remote</b>.</i>
<b>schism</b>	Division of a group into opposing factions. <i>The widening <b>schism</b> between Church leaders and politicians.</i>
<b>seclude</b>	Keep (someone) away from other people. <i>I <b>secluded</b> myself up here for a life of study and meditation.</i>
<b>seclusion</b>	The act of secluding yourself from others. <i>They enjoyed ten days of peace and <b>seclusion</b>.</i>
<b><u>segregate</u></b>	Someone who is or has been segregated. <i>This neighborhood is <b>segregated</b>.</i>

- separate** A separately printed article that originally appeared in a larger publication.  
*Girls and boys in **separate** classes.*
- separation** The social act of separating or parting company.  
*Religion involved the **separation** of the sacred and the profane.*
- sequester** Form a chelate or other stable compound with (an ion, atom, or molecule) so that it is no longer available for reactions.  
*If the budget deal hadn t gone through there would have been a **sequester** of at least 100 billion.*
- severance** The act of severing.  
*The **severance** and disestablishment of the Irish Church.*
- sole** Put a new sole on.  
*The join between the upper and the **sole**.*
- solitude** A lonely or uninhabited place.  
*The battle to preserve beloved **solitudes** flared up all over the country.*
- underpopulated** Having a lower population density than normal or desirable.  
*The richly endowed but **underpopulated** Ivory Coast.*
