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Associations of "All along" (30 Words)

absolutely	Used to emphasize a strong or exaggerated statement. <i>He absolutely adores that car.</i>
<u>altogether</u>	With everything considered (and neglecting details). <i>Altogether it was a great evening.</i>
always	Without interruption. <i>Isabel had always been in rude health.</i>
<u>anyhow</u>	In a careless or haphazard way. <i>I think they re asleep anyhow they re quiet.</i>
<u>collectively</u>	In conjunction with; combined. <i>The audience collectively winced.</i>
complete	Perfect and complete in every respect having all necessary qualities. <i>A complete meal.</i>
completely	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’). <i>Was completely at fault.</i>
entire	Constituting the undiminished entirety lacking nothing essential especially not damaged Bacon. <i>My plans are to travel the entire world.</i>
entirely	Without any others being included or involved. <i>We have an entirely different outlook.</i>
entirety	The state of being total and complete. <i>He read the article in its entirety.</i>
<u>ever</u>	At all times all the time and on every occasion. <i>Why ever did you do it.</i>
<u>every</u>	Each and all of the members of a group considered singly and without exception. <i>Had every hope of success.</i>

everywhere	To or in any or all places. <i>You find fast food stores everywhere.</i>
fully	To the greatest degree or extent; completely or entirely; ('full' in this sense is used as a combining form). <i>He didn't fully understand.</i>
gamut	The lowest note in the gamut scale. <i>The orchestral gamut.</i>
generic	Relating to a genus. <i>Substituting generics for brand name drugs.</i>
incessantly	Without interruption; constantly. <i>She talked about him incessantly.</i>
<u>lifelong</u>	Lasting or remaining in a particular state throughout a person's life. <i>A lifelong Conservative.</i>
<u>outright</u>	Without restrictions or stipulations or further payments. <i>An outright refusal.</i>
penetrable	Admitting of penetration or passage into or through. <i>The outer membrane is penetrable.</i>
perfectly	Completely and without qualification; used informally as intensifiers. <i>Perfectly clean glass bottles.</i>
<u>solely</u>	Without any others being included or involved. <i>Did it solely for money.</i>
<u>stark</u>	Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers. <i>The ridge formed a stark silhouette against the sky.</i>
<u>thoroughly</u>	Completely and absolutely good is sometimes used informally for thoroughly. <i>She was soon thoroughly bored.</i>
<u>total</u>	Add up in number or quantity. <i>A total failure.</i>
<u>totally</u>	Completely; absolutely. <i>They came from totally different backgrounds.</i>
unsuited	Not right or appropriate. <i>He was totally unsuited for the job.</i>
<u>utterly</u>	Completely and without qualification; used informally as intensifiers. <i>He looked utterly ridiculous.</i>
<u>whole</u>	Acting together as a single undiversified whole. <i>Whole in mind and body.</i>

wholly

To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly.

*The distinction is not **wholly** clear.*
