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## Associations of "All along" (30 Words)

<b>absolutely</b>	Used to emphasize a strong or exaggerated statement. <i>He <b>absolutely</b> adores that car.</i>
<a href="#"><u>altogether</u></a>	With everything considered (and neglecting details). <i><b>Altogether</b> it was a great evening.</i>
<b>always</b>	Without interruption. <i>Isabel had <b>always</b> been in rude health.</i>
<a href="#"><u>anyhow</u></a>	In a careless or haphazard way. <i>I think they re asleep <b>anyhow</b> they re quiet.</i>
<a href="#"><u>collectively</u></a>	In conjunction with; combined. <i>The audience <b>collectively</b> winced.</i>
<b>complete</b>	Perfect and complete in every respect having all necessary qualities. <i>A <b>complete</b> meal.</i>
<b>completely</b>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’). <i>Was <b>completely</b> at fault.</i>
<b>entire</b>	Constituting the undiminished entirety lacking nothing essential especially not damaged Bacon. <i>My plans are to travel the <b>entire</b> world.</i>
<b>entirely</b>	Without any others being included or involved. <i>We have an <b>entirely</b> different outlook.</i>
<b>entirety</b>	The state of being total and complete. <i>He read the article in its <b>entirety</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>ever</u></a>	At all times all the time and on every occasion. <i>Why <b>ever</b> did you do it.</i>
<a href="#"><u>every</u></a>	Each and all of the members of a group considered singly and without exception. <i>Had <b>every</b> hope of success.</i>

<b>everywhere</b>	To or in any or all places. <i>You find fast food stores <b>everywhere</b>.</i>
<b>fully</b>	To the greatest degree or extent; completely or entirely; ('full' in this sense is used as a combining form. <i>He didn't <b>fully</b> understand.</i>
<b>gamut</b>	The lowest note in the gamut scale. <i>The orchestral <b>gamut</b>.</i>
<b>generic</b>	Relating to a genus. <i>Substituting <b>generics</b> for brand name drugs.</i>
<b>incessantly</b>	Without interruption; constantly. <i>She talked about him <b>incessantly</b>.</i>
<b><u>lifelong</u></b>	Lasting or remaining in a particular state throughout a person's life. <i>A <b>lifelong</b> Conservative.</i>
<b><u>outright</u></b>	Without restrictions or stipulations or further payments. <i>An <b>outright</b> refusal.</i>
<b>penetrable</b>	Admitting of penetration or passage into or through. <i>The outer membrane is <b>penetrable</b>.</i>
<b>perfectly</b>	Completely and without qualification; used informally as intensifiers. <i><b>Perfectly</b> clean glass bottles.</i>
<b><u>solely</u></b>	Without any others being included or involved. <i>Did it <b>solely</b> for money.</i>
<b><u>stark</u></b>	Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers. <i>The ridge formed a <b>stark</b> silhouette against the sky.</i>
<b><u>thoroughly</u></b>	Completely and absolutely good is sometimes used informally for thoroughly. <i>She was soon <b>thoroughly</b> bored.</i>
<b><u>total</u></b>	Add up in number or quantity. <i>A <b>total</b> failure.</i>
<b><u>totally</u></b>	Completely; absolutely. <i>They came from <b>totally</b> different backgrounds.</i>
<b>unsuited</b>	Not right or appropriate. <i>He was totally <b>unsuited</b> for the job.</i>
<b><u>utterly</u></b>	Completely and without qualification; used informally as intensifiers. <i>He looked <b>utterly</b> ridiculous.</i>
<b><u>whole</u></b>	Acting together as a single undiversified whole. <i><b>Whole</b> in mind and body.</i>

**wholly**

To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly.

*The distinction is not **wholly** clear.*
