<a href="#">anywhere</a>	At or in or to any place anyplace is used informally for anywhere. <i>He could get <b>anywhere</b> from three to seven years.</i>
<b>at</b>	100 at equal 1 kip in Laos.
<b>entirety</b>	The state of being total and complete. <i>He read the article in its <b>entirety</b>.</i>
<a href="#">every</a>	Each and all of a series of entities or intervals as specified. <i><b>Every</b> party is welcome.</i>
<b>everywhere</b>	Common or widely distributed. <i>I ve looked <b>everywhere</b>.</i>
<a href="#">exceed</a>	Be better than; surpass. <i>Production costs have <b>exceeded</b> 60 000.</i>
<b>gamut</b>	The lowest note in the gamut scale. <i>A face that expressed a <b>gamut</b> of emotions.</i>
<b>in</b>	Expressing the situation of being enclosed or surrounded by something. <i>Large shoulder pads are <b>in</b>.</i>
<b>locate</b>	Assign a location to. <i>Engineers were working to <b>locate</b> the fault.</i>
<b>location</b>	A workplace away from a studio at which some or all of a movie may be made. <i>The <b>location</b> of new housing beyond the existing built up areas.</i>
<b>nowhere</b>	Having no prospect of progress or success. <i>The constable was <b>nowhere</b> to be seen.</i>
<b>outdistance</b>	Leave (a competitor or pursuer) far behind. <i>He <b>outdistanced</b> the other runners.</i>
<b>outdo</b>	Be or do something to a greater degree. <i>The men tried to <b>outdo</b> each other in their generosity.</i>

<b>outpace</b>	Go, rise, or improve faster than. <i>Import growth <b>outpaced</b> export growth in the second quarter.</i>
<b>outstrip</b>	Go far ahead of. <i>Supply far <b>outstripped</b> demand.</i>
<b>overreach</b>	An injury to a forefoot of a horse resulting from its having overreached. <i>The horse <b>overreached</b> jumping the first hurdle.</i>
<b>overstep</b>	Be superior or better than some standard. <i>You must not <b>overstep</b> your borrowing limit.</i>
<b><u>plethora</u></b>	An excess of a bodily fluid, particularly blood. <i>A <b>plethora</b> of committees and subcommittees.</i>
<b>redundance</b>	The attribute of being superfluous and unneeded.
<b>roomy</b>	Having ample space. <i>The cabin is <b>roomy</b> and well planned.</i>
<b>somewhere</b>	In or at or to some place someplace is used informally for somewhere. <i>They moved to <b>somewhere</b> in Spain.</i>
<b><u>spare</u></b>	Kept in reserve especially for emergency use. <i>Few people had <b>spare</b> cash for inessentials.</i>
<b>superabundance</b>	A quantity that is more than what is appropriate.
<b><u>surpass</u></b>	Be or do something to a greater degree. <i>One line of soldiers <b>surpassed</b> the other.</i>
<b><u>there</u></b>	In that matter. <i><b>There</b> s a restaurant round the corner.</i>
<b>transcend</b>	Surpass (a person or achievement). <i>This was an issue <b>transcending</b> party politics.</i>
<b><u>transgress</u></b>	(of the sea) spread over (an area of land). <i>The sea <b>transgresses</b> along the West coast of the island.</i>
<b>ubiquitous</b>	Present, appearing, or found everywhere. <i>Cowboy hats are <b>ubiquitous</b> among the male singers.</i>
<b>ubiquity</b>	The fact of appearing everywhere or of being very common. <i>The growing <b>ubiquity</b> of advertising.</i>
<b><u>whatever</u></b>	No matter what happens. <i>Give me <b>whatever</b> peaches you don t want.</i>
