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Associations of "All the while" (30 Words)

absolutely	With no qualification, restriction, or limitation; totally. <i>White collar crime increased both absolutely and in comparison with other categories.</i>
altogether	Taking everything into consideration; on the whole. <i>An altogether new approach.</i>
always	As a last resort; failing all else. <i>Always arrives on time.</i>
anyhow	In a careless or haphazard way. <i>I think they re asleep anyhow they re quiet.</i>
collectively	As a group; as a whole. <i>The vast range of resources that the American people collectively own.</i>
complete	Complete a pass. <i>A complete gentleman.</i>
completely	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’). <i>Was completely at fault.</i>
entire	Constituting the undiminished entirety lacking nothing essential especially not damaged. <i>Was able to keep the collection entire during his lifetime.</i>
entirely	Solely. <i>The traffic seemed to consist entirely of black cabs.</i>
entirety	The state of being total and complete. <i>He read the article in its entirety.</i>
ever	At all times all the time and on every occasion. <i>Don t you ever regret giving up all that money.</i>
every	Each and all of a series of entities or intervals as specified. <i>Every person is mortal.</i>

everywhere	To or in any or all places. <i>Sandwich bars are everywhere.</i>
frequently	Regularly or habitually; often. <i>They go abroad frequently.</i>
fully	Completely or entirely; to the fullest extent. <i>They were fully or amply fed.</i>
gamut	The lowest note in the gamut scale. <i>A face that expressed a gamut of emotions.</i>
generic	Wine that does not meet the minimum qualifications and standards for use of a designation by appellation of origin (where the grapes are grown) or by varietal content; may only be labeled by proprietary (made-up) name, by general color (such as `vin rouge`, `vino rosso`, `rotwein`, `red wine`, etc.), or by general class (as `vin ordinaire`, `vin de table`, `vino da tavola`, `tafelwein`, `table wine`, etc.). <i>Generic dance floor fillers.</i>
incessantly	Without interruption. <i>She talked about him incessantly.</i>
lifelong	Continuing through life. <i>From lifelong habit.</i>
outright	Immediately or instantly. <i>He was killed outright.</i>
perfectly	Used for emphasis, especially in order to assert something that has been challenged or doubted. <i>The ring fitted perfectly.</i>
solely	Not involving anyone or anything else; only. <i>Did it solely for money.</i>
stark	Completely. <i>Stark staring mad.</i>
thoroughly	Completely and absolutely good is sometimes used informally for thoroughly. <i>We searched the files thoroughly.</i>
total	Comprising the whole number or amount. <i>A total disaster.</i>
totally	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (`whole` is often used informally for `wholly`. <i>A totally new situation.</i>
unsuited	Not easy to combine harmoniously. <i>He was totally unsuited for the job.</i>

utterly Completely and without qualification; absolutely.
***Utterly** miserable.*

whole Acting together as a single undiversified whole.
*A **whole** person again.*

wholly To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly.
*He was **wholly** convinced.*
