Alleged as an Adjective

Definitions of "Alleged" as an adjective

- *Declared but not proved- Wall Street Journal.*
- *Declared but not proved.*
- *Said, without proof, to have taken place or to have a specified illegal or undesirable quality.*
- *Doubtful or suspect.*

Synonyms of "Alleged" as an adjective (15 Words)

apparent	Clearly visible or understood; obvious. <i>The effects of the drought are apparent to anyone who sees the parched fields.</i>
assumed	Adopted as a basis of reasoning; expected. <i>An assumed cheerfulness.</i>
avowed	That has been asserted, admitted, or stated publicly. <i>An avowed enemy.</i>

declared	Declared as fact explicitly stated. <i>Their declared and their covert objectives.</i>
described	Represented in words especially with sharpness and detail. <i>The vividly described wars.</i>
<u>ostensible</u>	Represented or appearing as such; pretended. <i>The ostensible truth of their theories.</i>
professed	Professing to be qualified. <i>McKinley was assassinated by a professed anarchist.</i>
<u>purported</u>	Appearing or stated to be true, though not necessarily so; alleged. <i>The purported marriage was void.</i>
putative	Purported; commonly put forth or accepted as true on inconclusive grounds. <i>The foundling's putative father.</i>
reported	Having been formally or officially announced or described. <i>An increase in reported crime.</i>
reputed	Generally believed to exist or be something specified, but not definitely the case. <i>Intensive training with reputed coaches.</i>
so-called	Doubtful or suspect.
stated	Declared as fact explicitly stated. <i>Do not exceed the stated dose.</i>
<u>supposed</u>	Mistakenly believed. <i>I'm supposed to be there at ten.</i>
<u>unproven</u>	Not proved. <i>The risks are unproven.</i>

Associations of "Alleged" (30 Words)

announcement	The action of making an announcement. <i>An announcement is appearing in the Morning Post tomorrow.</i>
apocryphal	Being of questionable authenticity. <i>An apocryphal story about a former president.</i>

appear	Come into being or existence or appear on the scene. <i>The paperback edition didn't appear for another two years.</i>
aptly	In a manner that is appropriate or suitable in the circumstances. <i>America's aptly named Sunshine State.</i>
askance	(used especially of glances) directed to one side with or as if with doubt or suspicion or envy. <i>Her eyes with their misted askance look.</i>
askew	Wrong; awry. <i>Rugs lying askew.</i>
assumed	(of a manner or identity) taken on or adopted, sometimes falsely. <i>The assumed result of the election.</i>
declared	Declared as fact explicitly stated. <i>Despite the company's declared good intentions some remained sceptical.</i>
doubtful	Fraught with uncertainty or doubt. <i>I was doubtful of my judgement.</i>
dubious	Open to doubt or suspicion. <i>I was rather dubious about the whole idea.</i>
equivocal	Open to question. <i>The evidence from bacteriologic analysis was equivocal.</i>
explicit	Of a person stating something in an explicit manner. <i>A sexually explicit blockbuster.</i>
flatly	Showing little interest or emotion. <i>I applied the paint flatly.</i>
hypothetical	A hypothetical proposition or statement. <i>Hypothetical situation.</i>
inconclusive	Not leading to a firm conclusion or result; not ending doubt or dispute. <i>Inconclusive evidence.</i>
incredulous	Not disposed or willing to believe; unbelieving. <i>An incredulous gasp.</i>
indeterminate	Having a capacity for continuing to grow at the apex. <i>Of indeterminate age.</i>
publicly	In a manner accessible to or observable by the public; openly. <i>She admitted publicly to being a communist.</i>
putative	Purported; commonly put forth or accepted as true on inconclusive grounds. <i>The putative author of the book.</i>

<u>questionable</u>	Likely to be dishonourable or morally suspect. Questionable motives.
<u>seem</u>	Seem to be true probable or apparent. She seems to be sleeping.
<u>sidelong</u>	Directed to or from one side. Darting eyes looking sidelong out of a wizened face.
<u>skeptical</u>	Denying or questioning the tenets of especially a religion. A skeptical listener.
<u>stated</u>	Declared as fact explicitly stated. Do not exceed the stated dose.
<u>supposed</u>	Required or under orders. The supposed reason for his absence.
<u>suspicious</u>	Having or showing a cautious distrust of someone or something. He was suspicious of her motives.
<u>suspiciously</u>	With a cautious distrust or suspicion of someone or something. What's going on I asked suspiciously .
<u>uncertain</u>	Not able to be relied on; not known or definite. Uncertain of his convictions.
<u>unconditionally</u>	Not subject to a condition. To be loved unconditionally is to be loved for who we are.
<u>unlikely</u>	Having a probability too low to inspire belief. An unlikely story.
