Definitions of "Allegiance" as a noun

- *The act of binding yourself (intellectually or emotionally) to a course of action.*
- *The loyalty that citizens owe to their country (or subjects to their sovereign).*
- *Loyalty or commitment to a superior or to a group or cause.*



Synonyms of "Allegiance" as a noun (11 Words)

adherence

The property of sticking together (as of glue and wood) or the joining of surfaces of different composition.

*He moved to Avignon and won the **adherence** of the French king.*

bond

Money that must be forfeited by the bondsman if an accused person fails to appear in court for trial.

*There was a **bond** of understanding between them.*

commitment

The trait of sincere and steadfast fixity of purpose.

*His long **commitment** to public service.*

dedication

Complete and wholehearted fidelity.

*The hardback edition contained a fulsome **dedication** to his wife.*

<u>devotion</u>	Love, loyalty, or enthusiasm for a person or activity. <i>The devotion of his time and wealth to science.</i>
faithfulness	The quality of being faithful. <i>Faithfulness in marriage.</i>
fealty	Formal acknowledgement of loyalty to a lord. <i>A property for which she did fealty.</i>
fidelity	Faithfulness to a person, cause, or belief, demonstrated by continuing loyalty and support. <i>His fidelity to liberal ideals.</i>
<u>homage</u>	Respectful deference. <i>Daniel s films were a homage to her.</i>
loyalty	Feelings of allegiance. <i>His extreme loyalty to the Crown.</i>
<u>obedience</u>	Compliance with an order, request, or law or submission to another's authority. <i>Vows of poverty chastity and obedience.</i>



Usage Examples of "Allegiance" as a noun

- *Those wishing to receive citizenship must swear allegiance to the republic.*
- *A complex pattern of cross-party allegiances.*

Associations of "Allegiance" (30 Words)

- adherence** Attachment or commitment to a person, cause, or belief.
***Adherence** to a fat free diet.*
- assurance** A British term for some kinds of insurance.
*His **assurance** in his superiority did not make him popular.*
- commitment** A pledge or undertaking.
*I cannot make such a **commitment** at the moment.*

consecrate	Dedicate to a deity by a vow. <i>A life consecrated to science.</i>
<u>covenant</u>	An agreement which brings about a relationship of commitment between God and his people The Jewish faith is based on the biblical covenants made with Abraham Moses and David. <i>The landlord covenants to repair the property.</i>
dedicate	Open to public use, as of a highway, park, or building. <i>Volume four is dedicated to wasps.</i>
<u>dedication</u>	A short message (as in a book or musical work or on a photograph) dedicating it to someone or something. <i>The hardback edition contained a fulsome dedication to his wife.</i>
<u>devotion</u>	Religious zeal; the willingness to serve God. <i>She went to her devotions.</i>
encyclical	Intended for wide distribution. <i>An encyclical letter.</i>
engagement	A fight or battle between armed forces. <i>She d broken off her engagement to Paul.</i>
<u>faith</u>	A strongly held belief. <i>Keep the faith.</i>
faithfully	In a manner that is true to the facts or the original. <i>He swore that he would serve the king faithfully.</i>
faithfulness	The quality of being faithful; fidelity. <i>Faithfulness in marriage.</i>
fealty	A feudal tenant's or vassal's sworn loyalty to a lord. <i>They owed fealty to the Earl rather than the King.</i>
fiance	A man who is engaged to be married.
fidelity	The degree of exactness with which something is copied or reproduced. <i>His fidelity to liberal ideals.</i>
<u>loyal</u>	Unwavering in devotion to friend or vow or cause- Campaign song for William Henry Harrison. <i>He remained loyal to the government.</i>
loyalty	A strong feeling of support or allegiance. <i>His extreme loyalty to the Crown.</i>
<u>manifesto</u>	A public declaration of policy and aims, especially one issued before an election by a political party or candidate. <i>He may fudge key issues in the Labour manifesto.</i>

oath	A commitment to tell the truth especially in a court of law to lie under oath is to become subject to prosecution for perjury. <i>He was muttering foul oaths.</i>
<u>pact</u>	A written agreement between two states or sovereigns. <i>The country negotiated a trade pact with the US.</i>
piety	The quality of being religious or reverent. <i>Acts of piety and charity.</i>
<u>pledge</u>	Bind or secure by a pledge. <i>I pledged 10 a month to my favorite radio station.</i>
renege	Go back on a promise, undertaking, or contract. <i>There s one of them anyhow that didn t renege him.</i>
<u>sincerity</u>	A quality of naturalness and simplicity. <i>The simple sincerity of folk songs.</i>
subservience	The condition of being less important than something else. <i>Is it a case of the subservience of the divine to political beliefs.</i>
troth	A solemn pledge of fidelity. <i>A token of troth.</i>
unswerving	Not changing or becoming weaker; steady or constant. <i>Unswerving loyalty.</i>
<u>unwavering</u>	Not wavering; steady or resolute. <i>Unwavering loyalty.</i>
wholehearted	Showing or characterized by complete sincerity and commitment. <i>Wholehearted commitment.</i>
