### **Definitions of "Allegiance" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “allegiance” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The act of binding yourself (intellectually or emotionally) to a course of action.*
- *The loyalty that citizens owe to their country (or subjects to their sovereign.*
- *Loyalty or commitment to a superior or to a group or cause.*



## Synonyms of "Allegiance" as a noun (11 Words)

### adherence

The property of sticking together (as of glue and wood) or the joining of surfaces of different composition.

*He moved to Avignon and won the **adherence** of the French king.*

### **bond**

Money that must be forfeited by the bondsman if an accused person fails to appear in court for trial.

*There was a **bond** of understanding between them.*

### commitment

The trait of sincere and steadfast fixity of purpose.

*His long **commitment** to public service.*

### dedication

Complete and wholehearted fidelity.

*The hardback edition contained a fulsome **dedication** to his wife.*

<b><u>devotion</u></b>	Love, loyalty, or enthusiasm for a person or activity. <i>The <b>devotion</b> of his time and wealth to science.</i>
<b>faithfulness</b>	The quality of being faithful. <i><b>Faithfulness</b> in marriage.</i>
<b>fealty</b>	Formal acknowledgement of loyalty to a lord. <i>A property for which she did <b>fealty</b>.</i>
<b>fidelity</b>	Faithfulness to a person, cause, or belief, demonstrated by continuing loyalty and support. <i>His <b>fidelity</b> to liberal ideals.</i>
<b><u>homage</u></b>	Respectful deference. <i>Daniel s films were a <b>homage</b> to her.</i>
<b>loyalty</b>	Feelings of allegiance. <i>His extreme <b>loyalty</b> to the Crown.</i>
<b><u>obedience</u></b>	Compliance with an order, request, or law or submission to another's authority. <i>Vows of poverty chastity and <b>obedience</b>.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Allegiance" as a noun

- *Those wishing to receive citizenship must swear allegiance to the republic.*
- *A complex pattern of cross-party allegiances.*

## Associations of "Allegiance" (30 Words)

<b><u>adherence</u></b>	Attachment or commitment to a person, cause, or belief. <i><b>Adherence</b> to a fat free diet.</i>
<b>assurance</b>	A British term for some kinds of insurance. <i>His <b>assurance</b> in his superiority did not make him popular.</i>
<b><u>commitment</u></b>	A pledge or undertaking. <i>I cannot make such a <b>commitment</b> at the moment.</i>

<b>consecrate</b>	Dedicate to a deity by a vow. <i>A life <b>consecrated</b> to science.</i>
<b><u>covenant</u></b>	An agreement which brings about a relationship of commitment between God and his people The Jewish faith is based on the biblical covenants made with Abraham Moses and David. <i>The landlord <b>covenants</b> to repair the property.</i>
<b>dedicate</b>	Open to public use, as of a highway, park, or building. <i>Volume four is <b>dedicated</b> to wasps.</i>
<b><u>dedication</u></b>	A short message (as in a book or musical work or on a photograph) dedicating it to someone or something. <i>The hardback edition contained a fulsome <b>dedication</b> to his wife.</i>
<b><u>devotion</u></b>	Religious zeal; the willingness to serve God. <i>She went to her <b>devotions</b>.</i>
<b>encyclical</b>	Intended for wide distribution. <i>An <b>encyclical</b> letter.</i>
<b>engagement</b>	A fight or battle between armed forces. <i>She d broken off her <b>engagement</b> to Paul.</i>
<b><u>faith</u></b>	A strongly held belief. <i>Keep the <b>faith</b>.</i>
<b>faithfully</b>	In a manner that is true to the facts or the original. <i>He swore that he would serve the king <b>faithfully</b>.</i>
<b>faithfulness</b>	The quality of being faithful; fidelity. <i><b>Faithfulness</b> in marriage.</i>
<b>fealty</b>	A feudal tenant's or vassal's sworn loyalty to a lord. <i>They owed <b>fealty</b> to the Earl rather than the King.</i>
<b>fiance</b>	A man who is engaged to be married.
<b>fidelity</b>	The degree of exactness with which something is copied or reproduced. <i>His <b>fidelity</b> to liberal ideals.</i>
<b><u>loyal</u></b>	Unwavering in devotion to friend or vow or cause- Campaign song for William Henry Harrison. <i>He remained <b>loyal</b> to the government.</i>
<b>loyalty</b>	A strong feeling of support or allegiance. <i>His extreme <b>loyalty</b> to the Crown.</i>
<b><u>manifesto</u></b>	A public declaration of policy and aims, especially one issued before an election by a political party or candidate. <i>He may fudge key issues in the Labour <b>manifesto</b>.</i>

<b>oath</b>	A commitment to tell the truth especially in a court of law to lie under oath is to become subject to prosecution for perjury. <i>He was muttering foul <b>oaths</b>.</i>
<b><u>pact</u></b>	A written agreement between two states or sovereigns. <i>The country negotiated a trade <b>pact</b> with the US.</i>
<b>piety</b>	The quality of being religious or reverent. <i>Acts of <b>piety</b> and charity.</i>
<b><u>pledge</u></b>	Bind or secure by a pledge. <i>I <b>pledged</b> 10 a month to my favorite radio station.</i>
<b>renege</b>	Go back on a promise, undertaking, or contract. <i>There s one of them anyhow that didn t <b>renege</b> him.</i>
<b><u>sincerity</u></b>	A quality of naturalness and simplicity. <i>The simple <b>sincerity</b> of folk songs.</i>
<b>subservience</b>	The condition of being less important than something else. <i>Is it a case of the <b>subservience</b> of the divine to political beliefs.</i>
<b>troth</b>	A solemn pledge of fidelity. <i>A token of <b>troth</b>.</i>
<b>unswerving</b>	Not changing or becoming weaker; steady or constant. <i><b>Unswerving</b> loyalty.</i>
<b><u>unwavering</u></b>	Not wavering; steady or resolute. <i><b>Unwavering</b> loyalty.</i>
<b>wholehearted</b>	Showing or characterized by complete sincerity and commitment. <i><b>Wholehearted</b> commitment.</i>
