<b>abate</b>	Make less active or intense. <i>The storm <b>abated</b>.</i>
<b>allay</b>	Diminish or put at rest (fear, suspicion, or worry). <i>The report attempted to educate the public and <b>allay</b> fears.</i>
<b>assuage</b>	Make (an unpleasant feeling) less intense. <i>The letter <b>assuaged</b> the fears of most members.</i>
<b>attenuate</b>	Become weaker, in strength, value, or magnitude. <i>Her intolerance was <b>attenuated</b> by an unexpected liberalism.</i>
<b>blunt</b>	Make dull or blunt. <i>Terror <b>blunted</b> her feelings.</i>
<b>control</b>	Exercise authoritative control or power over. <i>He had to <b>control</b> his temper.</i>

<b>damp</b>	Reduce or stop the vibration of (the strings of a piano or other musical instrument) so as to reduce the volume of sound. <i>An ensemble of drums including a foot <b>damped</b> instrument.</i>
<b>deaden</b>	Make vapid or deprive of spirit. <i><b>Deaden</b>ed wine.</i>
<b>dilute</b>	Reduce the value of (a shareholding) by issuing more shares in a company without increasing the values of its assets. <i>Bleach can be <b>diluted</b> with cold water.</i>
<b>diminish</b>	Cause to seem less impressive or valuable. <i>The trial has aged and <b>diminished</b> him.</i>
<b>dull</b>	Make dull in appearance. <i>Age had <b>dulled</b> the surface.</i>
<b>ease</b>	Of share prices interest rates etc decrease in value or amount. <i>Tokyo s dominance of government was deemed to <b>ease</b> efficient contact making.</i>
<b>facilitate</b>	Make (an action or process) easy or easier. <i>You could <b>facilitate</b> the process by sharing your knowledge.</i>
<b>help</b>	Help to some food help with food or drink. <i>I m sorry to put you to any inconvenience but it can t be <b>helped</b>.</i>
<b>lessen</b>	Make smaller. <i>The warmth of the afternoon <b>lessened</b>.</i>
<b>lighten</b>	Reduce the weight on; make lighter. <i><b>Lighten</b> the burden of caring for her elderly parents.</i>
<b>lull</b>	Become quiet or less intensive. <i>The rarity of earthquakes there has <b>lulled</b> people into a false sense of security.</i>
<b>mitigate</b>	Make (something bad) less severe, serious, or painful. <i>Drainage schemes have helped to <b>mitigate</b> this problem.</i>
<b>moderate</b>	Make less strong or intense; soften. <i><b>Moderate</b> your speed.</i>
<b>modify</b>	Make less severe or harsh or extreme. <i>Please <b>modify</b> this letter to make it more polite.</i>
<b>mollify</b>	Appease the anger or anxiety of (someone). <i>She managed to <b>mollify</b> the angry customer.</i>
<b>pacify</b>	Cause to be more favorably inclined; gain the good will of. <i>The U N troops are working to <b>pacify</b> Bosnia.</i>

<b>palliate</b>	Disguise the seriousness of (an offence). <i>This eliminated or at least <b>palliated</b> suspicions aroused by German unity.</i>
<b>placate</b>	Make (someone) less angry or hostile. <i>They attempted to <b>placate</b> the students with promises.</i>
<b>quell</b>	Overcome or allay. <i><b>Quell</b> my hunger.</i>
<b>reduce</b>	Reduce in size reduce physically. <i><b>Reduce</b> a problem to a single question.</i>
<b>relieve</b>	Relieve oneself of troubling information. <i>The bird s body is black <b>relieved</b> only by white under the tail.</i>
<b>soften</b>	Make less severe or harsh. <i>The bread will <b>soften</b> if you pour some liquid on it.</i>
<b>soothe</b>	Give moral or emotional strength to. <i>A shot of brandy might <b>soothe</b> his nerves.</i>
<b>still</b>	Make or become still quieten. <i>The din in the hall <b>stilled</b>.</i>
<b>sweeten</b>	Make sweeter, more pleasant, or more agreeable. <i>There is no way to <b>sweeten</b> the statement.</i>
<b>take the edge off</b>	Make a film or photograph of something.
<b>temper</b>	Make more temperate acceptable or suitable by adding something else moderate. <i>Their idealism is <b>tempered</b> with realism.</i>
<b>tone down</b>	Vary the pitch of one's speech.
<b>weaken</b>	Lessen in force or effect. <i>Fault lines had <b>weakened</b> and shattered the rocks.</i>

<b>facilitate</b>	Make easier. <i>Schools were located in the same campus to <b>facilitate</b> the sharing of resources.</i>
<b>lessen</b>	Decrease in size, extent, or range. <i>The warmth of the afternoon <b>lessened</b>.</i>
<b>licensee</b>	Someone to whom a license is granted.
<b>mitigate</b>	Make less severe or harsh. <i>There had been a provocation that <b>mitigated</b> the offence to a degree.</i>
<b>mitigation</b>	A partial excuse to mitigate censure; an attempt to represent an offense as less serious than it appears by showing mitigating circumstances. <i>The identification and <b>mitigation</b> of pollution.</i>
<b>mollification</b>	The act of appeasing someone or causing someone to be more favorably inclined. <i>His unsuccessful <b>mollification</b> of the mob.</i>
<b>mollify</b>	Make more temperate, acceptable, or suitable by adding something else. <i>The women hoped to <b>mollify</b> the harsh wilderness environment.</i>



<b>pacify</b>	Fight violence and try to establish peace in (a location). <i>He had to <b>pacify</b> angry spectators.</i>
<b>palliate</b>	Lessen or to try to lessen the seriousness or extent of. <i>This eliminated or at least <b>palliated</b> suspicions aroused by German unity.</i>
<b>palliation</b>	To act in such a way as to cause an offense to seem less serious.
<b>placate</b>	Make (someone) less angry or hostile. <i>They attempted to <b>placate</b> the students with promises.</i>
<b>quench</b>	An act of quenching a very hot substance. <b>Quench</b> a rebellion.
<b>rarefy</b>	Weaken the consistency of (a chemical substance). <i>As the shell continues to expand and <b>rarefy</b> astronomers may eventually be able to see characteristic gamma rays from the radioactivity within.</i>
<b>relent</b>	Give in, as to influence or pressure. <i>The rain <b>relented</b>.</i>
<b>relieve</b>	Relieve oneself of troubling information. <i>Train your dog to <b>relieve</b> itself where you want it to.</i>
<b>remission</b>	A payment of money sent to a person in another place. <i>The scheme allows for the partial <b>remission</b> of tuition fees.</i>
<b>remit</b>	Law the act of remitting especially the referral of a law case to another court. <i>The request for an investigation was <b>remitted</b> to a special committee.</i>
