## Allude as a Verb

### Definitions of "Allude" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “allude” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Mention without discussing at length.*
- *Suggest or call attention to indirectly; hint at.*
- *Make a more or less disguised reference to.*
- *(of an artist or a work of art) recall (an earlier work or style) in such a way as to suggest a relationship with it.*

### Synonyms of "Allude" as a verb (42 Words)

<b>advert</b>	Give heed (to).
<b>allude to</b>	Make a more or less disguised reference to.
<b>bring to mind</b>	Cause to happen or to occur as a consequence.

<b>bring up</b>	Cause to come into a particular state or condition.
<b>broach</b>	Open and start using the contents of (a bottle or other container). <i>The salmon <b>broach</b> then fall to slap the water.</i>
<b>call attention to</b>	Declare in the capacity of an umpire or referee.
<b>call to mind</b>	Utter a characteristic note or cry.
<b>call up</b>	Call a meeting; invite or command to meet.
<b><u>cite</u></b>	Advance evidence for. <i>Medics have been <b>cited</b> as a key example of a modern breed of technical expert.</i>
<b>comment on</b>	Make or write a comment on.
<b>conjure up</b>	Ask for or request earnestly.
<b>deal with</b>	Take into consideration for exemplifying purposes.
<b><u>echo</u></b>	Ring or echo with sound. <i>His words <b>echoed</b> John F Kennedy.</i>
<b><u>evoke</u></b>	Evoke or provoke to appear or occur. <i>The sight <b>evoked</b> pleasant memories of his childhood.</i>
<b>go into</b>	Have a particular form.
<b>hint at</b>	Drop a hint; intimate by a hint.
<b><u>imply</u></b>	Suggest that someone is guilty. <i>Salesmen who use jargon to <b>imply</b> superior knowledge.</i>
<b>introduce</b>	Put or introduce into something. <i>Measures were <b>introduced</b> to help families with children.</i>
<b>make an allusion to</b>	Calculate as being.
<b>make mention of</b>	Give rise to; cause to happen or occur, not always intentionally.
<b>make reference to</b>	Reach in time.
<b>mention</b>	Make mention of. <i>He is still regularly <b>mentioned</b> as a possible secretary of state.</i>
<b>mention en passant</b>	Commend.
<b>mention in passing</b>	Commend.
<b><u>name</u></b>	Mention by name. <i>Hundreds of diseases had not yet been isolated or <b>named</b>.</i>
<b>note</b>	Make a written note of. <i>He <b>noted</b> down her address on a piece of paper.</i>
<b>point out</b>	Mark (a psalm text) to indicate the points at which the music changes.

<b>put one in mind of</b>	Attribute or give.
<b>raise</b>	Raise in rank or condition. <i>We <b>raise</b> hogs here.</i>
<b>refer to</b>	Send or direct for treatment, information, or a decision.
<b>speak about</b>	Give a speech to.
<b>speak briefly of</b>	Express in speech.
<b>speak of</b>	Make a characteristic or natural sound.
<b><u>suggest</u></b>	Suggest the necessity of an intervention in medicine. <i>A simpler explanation <b>suggested</b> itself to me.</i>
<b>summon up</b>	Gather or bring together.
<b>talk about</b>	Exchange thoughts; talk with.
<b>talk of</b>	Reveal information.
<b>touch</b>	Strike (a ball) lightly in a specified direction. <i>I was <b>touch</b>ed by your kind letter of sympathy.</i>
<b>touch on</b>	Be equal to in quality or ability.
<b>treat</b>	Provide treatment for. <i>They had to <b>treat</b> with the King.</i>
<b>treat of</b>	Regard or consider in a specific way.
<b>write about</b>	Record data on a computer.

## Usage Examples of "Allude" as a verb

- *We will allude briefly to the main points.*
- *She had a way of alluding to Jean but never saying her name.*
- *The photographs allude to Italian Baroque painting.*
- *He alluded to the problem but did not mention it.*

## Associations of "Allude" (30 Words)

<b>advert</b>	An advertisement.
<b>aforesaid</b>	Being the one previously mentioned or spoken of.
<b><u>allusion</u></b>	The practice of making allusions. <i>An <b>allusion</b> to Shakespeare.</i>
<b><u>attend</u></b>	Be present at (an event, meeting, or function). <i>She <b>attends</b> class regularly.</i>

<b><u>cite</u></b>	Call in an official matter, such as to attend court. <i>Medics have been <b>cited</b> as a key example of a modern breed of technical expert.</i>
<b>connote</b>	Express or state indirectly. <i>Spinsterhood <b>connoted</b> failure.</i>
<b>cue</b>	Give a cue to or for. <i>Ros and Guil <b>cued</b> by Hamlet also bow deeply.</i>
<b><u>denote</u></b>	Stand as a name or symbol for. <i>This mark <b>denotes</b> purity and quality.</i>
<b>describe</b>	Move in a way which follows the outline of (an imaginary geometrical figure). <i>A single light is seen to <b>describe</b> a circle.</i>
<b>description</b>	The action of giving a spoken or written account. <i>The emphasis was placed on explanation rather than <b>description</b>.</i>
<b>explain</b>	Make (an idea or situation) clear to someone by describing it in more detail or revealing relevant facts. <i>He makes athletes <b>explain</b> why they made a mistake.</i>
<b>express</b>	Serve as a means for expressing something. <i>He caught the <b>express</b> to New York.</i>
<b><u>foregoing</u></b>	Especially of writing or speech; going before. <i>The <b>foregoing</b> analysis of the economic class structure.</i>
<b>hint</b>	Drop a hint intimate by a hint. <i>Handy <b>hints</b> on saving energy in your home.</i>
<b><u>implicit</u></b>	Implied though not directly expressed; inherent in the nature of something. <i>The values <b>implicit</b> in the school ethos.</i>
<b><u>imply</u></b>	Suggest that someone is guilty. <i>Salesmen who use jargon to <b>imply</b> superior knowledge.</i>
<b>indicate</b>	Indicate a place direction person or thing either spatially or figuratively. <i>Treatment for shock may be <b>indicated</b>.</i>
<b><u>insinuate</u></b>	Give to understand. <i>I <b>insinuated</b> my shoulder in the gap.</i>
<b>mean</b>	Mean or intend to express or convey. <i>Famous for a <b>mean</b> backhand.</i>
<b>mention</b>	Make mention of. <i>His name was <b>mentioned</b> in connection with the invention.</i>
<b>note</b>	A banknote. <i>The Secretariat sent a diplomatic <b>note</b> to the embassy protesting about the sale of arms.</i>

<b>overtone</b>	A subtle or subsidiary quality, implication, or connotation. <i>The decision may have political <b>overtones</b>.</i>
<b>quote</b>	Put quote marks around. <i><b>Quotes</b> from different insurance companies.</i>
<b>refer</b>	Of a word phrase or symbol describe or denote have as a referent. <i><b>Refer</b> to your notes.</i>
<b>remark</b>	Notice or comment. <i>The landscape familiar since childhood was not worthy of <b>remark</b>.</i>
<b>saying</b>	A collection of short, pithy expressions identified with a particular person, especially a political or religious leader. <i>This is stated in the <b>sayings</b> of the Prophet.</i>
<b>signify</b>	(among black Americans) exchange boasts or insults as a game or ritual. <i>I wasn't <b>signifying</b> at her.</i>
<b>story</b>	A plot or storyline. <i>The <b>story</b> of exposure to lead.</i>
<b>tell</b>	A Swiss patriot who lived in the early 14th century and who was renowned for his skill as an archer; according to legend an Austrian governor compelled him to shoot an apple from his son's head with his crossbow (which he did successfully without mishap). <i>He could <b>tell</b> that she was unhappy.</i>
<b>unknowingly</b>	Without knowledge or intention. <i>Every day we are <b>unknowingly</b> exposed to a variety of pesticides.</i>
